MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN FISH AND OYSTERS TAKEN ANNUALLY FROM WATERS TEXAS GULF COAST

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 20, 1928. Texas coast, broken from the Louis-iana line to the mouth of the Rio Grande by bays, inlets, lagoons and reefs, offers a paradise to sports-men who like to fish, and larger and larger crowds of tourists haunt and larger crowds of tourists maint the coast each year. But the sport-ing side of the fishing grounds is entirely overshadowed by its com-mercial side and millions of dollars annually are secured for the fish and oysters taken by Texas fisher-

Vagaries of the finny tribe along the gulf often cause disappointment to commercial fishermen, however. During June and July this year, fishing grounds which usually yield heavy catches in summer months were deserted. This condition was were descrited. This condition was not peculiar to Texas, according to information gathered by the state game, fish and oyster commission, Recitation Residual R but prevailed in greater or less degree all along the gulf coast and up the Atlantic seaboard.

In spite of this reported slump, the oyster production on the Texas coast showed an increase of more than 12,000 barrels for the fiscal year ending October 1933, over the total for the previous year, while the fish catch showed an increase of about 200,000 pounds.
