YOUNG LEEDS RETURNS TO AMERICA.

Dispatches a few days ago carried the announcement that young Leeds, whose mother married into the Greek royal family and who himself also took a bride from the royal family is about to return to America. He says he wants to return to the country of his fathers.

The dispatch has caused the Tulsa Tribune to eminisce and comment as follows:

"About 28 years ago an obscure citizen of Richmond. Ind., named Leeds, and his brother announced that they had discovered how to 'make' tip. They established a small factory or two, and soon William McKinley, of high protective tariff fame, was elected to the presidency. Almost at once, another obscure man, but by chance a congressman from Maine-Nelson Dingley-busied himself with framing the highest tariff bill this country has ever known. It was sanctioned by McKinley, the author of the one bill next approaching it in prohibitive customs duties.

"The two obscure Leeds brothers of Richmond. nder the fostering care of this Dingley bill, established the 'American Tinplate Co.,' with a capitalizaden of millions. Their 'tin' was thinly rolled iron sheets coated with real tin imported from the only spot on earth where real tin is found. Wales and a small area of England. The Dingley bill made the further exportation of real tin from Wales prohibitive, as it was intended to do. 




