DAYTON-GOOSE CREEK RAILROAD IS INVOLVED

WASHINGTON. Jan. T. Wh-The "recapture" of excess earnings ciause of the transportation act was deginred valid and constitutional today by the supreme court.

The decision was handed down in a case brought by the Dayton-Goose Creek Railway Company of Texas and which a number of important railways joined, pleading that the provision would result in confiscation.

In appealing to the supreme court the railroads contesting the provision contended it was beyond the power of congress to determine what they should do with their earnings, and that to deprive them of legitimate profits was confiscation.

The National Association of Own-ers of Railroad Securities, claiming to represent a large proportion of the outstanding securities of the American railways, with the permiswion of the supreme bourt, joined in defending the clause under attack.

Policy Committee Announces Peace Plan Selected From 22,165 Submitted Name of Author Withheld for Vote

The substantial provisions which constitute the plan selected by the Jury of award, and upon which the vote of the American people is asked, are hereby submitted by the policy committee follows:

I. Enter the permanent court,

That the United States adhere to the Permanent Court of International Justica for the reasons and under the conditions stated by Secretary Hughes and President Harding in February, 1822.

II Cooperate with the League of Nations, without full membership at present.

That without becoming a member of the League of Nations as at present constituted; the United States government should extend its present constituted; the United States government should extend its present cooperation with the League and propose participation in the work of its assembly and council under the following conditions and reasonables.

Safeguarding of Monroe Doctrine.

1. The United States accepts the League of Nations as an instrument of mutual counsel, but it will assume so obligation to interfere with political questions of policy or internal administration of any foreign state.

In uniting its afforts with these countries of the countries

In uniting its efforts with those of other states for the preserva-tion of peace and the promotion of the common welfare, the United States insists upon the safeguarding of the Monroe Dootrine and does not shandon its traditional attitude concerning American independence of the Old World and does not consent to submit its long established policy concerning questions reparted by it as purely American to the recommendation or decision of other powers. No Military or Bronomic Force.

2. The only kind of compulsion which nations can freely engage to apply to each other in the name of peace is that which arises from conference, from moral judgment, from full publicity, and from the power of public opinion.

The United States will assume no obligations under Article X in its present form, or under Article XVI in its present form in the covenant, or in its amended form as now proposed, unless in any particular case congress has authorized such article X and XVI be sither dropped altogether or so amended and chenged as to allminate any suggestion of a general agreement to use coercion for obtaining conformity to the pledges of the devenant.

AUSTIN, Jan. 7.—A policy of re-fusing to license bankers to write insurance, except perhaps in small towns where there is no established insurance agency, which was settled some months ago, has been relier-ated by Issurance Commissioner John M. Scott. A number of such John M. Scott. A number of such requests have been received with the beginning of the new year.

"The laws of this state," said Mr. Scott, 'unequivocably prohibit the issuance of an insurance dicense to a person who by some advantageous relationship or position seeks a license to enable him to write the insurance of his own property or that of his relatives or friends.

"Bankers and loan men seek insurance licenses for the purpose of

surance licenses for the purpose of collecting insurance commissions from borrowers, in addition to the sterest charged. "Property owners, corporation directors and officers buy into successful the director of successful th they will insure the property of themselves or the corporations the represent through such so-called insurance agency, thereby securing a division of the commissions for themselves, accombitating by this subterfuge an indirect rebate, evading the law and doing tedfreetly what the law prohibits being done

directly."

"Automobile dealers seek insurance licenses for the purpose of writing insurance on cars sold to their patrons and dividing with themselves, such commissions as their legitimate profit on the sale

of cars. "Railroad executives secure in surance licenses for the purpose of grafting upon their subordivates for a commission on such inspended as they, in their official positions. may corrall from them, having the last say as to their jobs and the first look in on their pay checks. "Bank employes secure licenses to write insurance, using the information coming to them by rea-son of their positions as to the fitomers to extort commissions from them. There is no more sacred fi-nancial relation existing than that of a bank and its depositors, yet this confidence is violated in order that a selfish bank employe may secure for himself an insurance commission to augment the salary paid him by the bank.


