### Tech's Carlen: Rules Vital For Athletes

Texas Tech University coach Jim Carlen was an appropriate speaker for Friona's all-sports banquet last Saturday.

For Carlen's Red Raider football team and the Friona Chieftains of 1970 had a lot in common.

Carlen told the crowd at the banquet that not a single member of his 1970 varsity, which posted an 8-3 record, was drafted by the pros. This came just minutes after the Friona Booster Club announced that rather than making an "outstanding player" selection as it had in the past, the Fighting Chieftain award was being presented this year to the entire team.

"The fact that our kids really 'got with it' every week brought about our eight wins, when we just as easily might have won only two or three games," Carlen told the group.

What he probably didn't know was that the group of football players he was addressing were pretty close to the same type he had at Texas Tech last fall.

The Chieftains, with no outstanding individuals, could easily have been only 3-7 for the year, but by determination they got their record into the winning ledger at 6-4. Most observers had privately said prior to the season that it would be a successful year if the team won four games.

The Texas Tech coach complimented the young people at the athletic banquet. "From what I see, you can still tell the boys from the girls in Friona, and I compliment you on that," he said.

Carlen told the young people that although they probably thought that a small town had lots of drawbacks, that personally thinks that there are a lot of advantages to small towns.

"People are concerned for others. You have more closeness in a small town," he said.

The Red Raider gridmaster warned against losing from within. "Many times a team whips itself, rather than the winning team whipping them," he said. He said that by enforcing the rules he had set forth, he didn't intend to have his teams "beat themselves."

## NFO MEETING

### Farmers Urged To Seek Better Prices

"Farmers can get any kind of price they want (for their products) once they get together."

Those were the words of Erhard Phingsten of Iowa, national vice president of the National Farmers Organization, as he spoke to a region-wide meeting of NFO members and others interested at a Monday night meeting in Bovina Schools auditorium.

A crowd, estimated to be in the neighborhood of 500, was on hand to hear Phingsten, considered to be an outstanding speaker. People attended from several neighboring counties as well as Parmer.

"The only way farmers are going to get good prices is to go after them themselves," the speaker told his attentive audience.

He explained the danger of "big business" taking over family-size farms by pointing out the possibility of having such corporations as "General Cattle, Standard Corn, United Milo and International Wheat" in control of America's agriculture.

"This is the way we're going now and how we can stop it is with decent farm prices," the Iowa farmer-farm leader said.

"Even the smallest farmer is as independent as a hog on ice when he's making money," the speaker said. But the situation is different when farm prices drop below the profit level, he indicated.

Invited to the meeting, which was preceded by a barbecue in the school cafeteria, were all farmers and businessmen from the 18th Congressional District of Texas and neighboring New Mexico Counties.

Presiding at the meeting was Wayne Magness of Bovina, president of the Parmer County NFO. He introduced Phingsten, who has been national vice president of the NFO since 1963.

Magness said he was pleased with the number of people turning out for the meeting, but said he would have liked to have had the 700-plus seat auditorium filled. "We would have liked to have had more Parmer County people present, he said.

### Three FHS Students Are Winners In VICA Meet

Three Friona High School students won ribbons at the District 6 Vocational-Industrial (VICA) contests at Amarillo last weekend.

Cheryl Patterson won first place in the nurse's aid division. She won out over 19 other contestants. Most of the students in the competition are from schools of AAAA and AAA classification.

Don Phillips, vocational-in-

dustrial instructor at FHS, said it was quite a tribute to Cheryl that she won the contest, over some pretty stiff competition.

Two other local entrants also won ribbons. They were Clyde Schilling, a fourth in the welding competition, and Sammy Vera, fourth in plumbing.

Seven students from Friona took part in the contests, held at Amarillo Vocational College. Others were Gary Duke and Jordan Hurrelson, auto mechanics; Jerry Oden, welding, and Amy Renner, job application.

By winning the district contest, Miss Patterson is eligible to enter the state VICA contests, to be held April 30 in San Antonio.

### Absentee Vote Is Underway

Absentee voting in the Friona School board race is underway at the Superintendent's office. Deadline for voting absentee is March 30. Three men are seeking the two places to be vacated. They are David Grimsley, Leroy Johnson and Joe Fallwell.

In the city council election, absentee voting is being held at the city's administrative offices. Troy Young, Nelson Lewis, Walter Cunningham and Dr. Robert Alexander seek the three seats up for election, and Gary Brown is a candidate for the one-year spot.

Election day for both races is Saturday, April 3. Those expecting to be out of town are urged to vote absentee.

### Lazbuddie Vote Slated

Absentee voting began on Monday in Lazbuddie in Superintendent Sam Barnes' office for the school board election.

Only two names are on the Lazbuddie ballot, for the two places to be vacated. Candidates are James H. Jennings and Don McDonald. McDonald is up for re-election. W.G. Harlan was the other board member whose term is expiring. He did not choose to run again.

# Flying: Fast-Growing Hobby

A new form of recreation is gaining in popularity in Friona. It is flying, and Friona's Benger Air Park is the center of all the activity.

Elvie T. Jennings, owner of the local airport, noted this week that 36 persons had taken flying lessons in Friona during the past six months.

Among the latest new private students at the airport are Redge Priest, Dale Cary, Jerry Brown, Floyd Rector, O.C. Minyon and George Rushing. Of this group, Priest soloed last Saturday.

Included in those who have taken private lessons during recent months are three who enrolled under the GI program, which will pay 90 per cent of all the lesson costs for those discharged from the armed forces after January 31, 1955 and with at least 181 days of active duty after that date.

Airport officials point out that veterans can receive \$135 per month for flying instruction, up to 18 months, or a maximum of \$4680.00.

Private lessons available at the Friona airport include courses for a private pilot's license, commercial pilot's li-

cence, instrument rating, multi-engine rating, flight instructor's rating, instrument flight instructor, agricultural pilot, and airline transport pilot.

As the instructor remarked, the local air school offers everything except for "gliders, helicopters and sea planes."

Chief Instructor at Benger Air Park is Hack Corbell, a professional for eight years who has been flying since he was 13. Corbell has an airline transport rating.

Jennings serves as fill-in instructor, as does Charles Kirk.

The Friona airport is one of the most modern in the country. It has a lighted and paved runway which is 60 feet wide and 3500 feet long--quite a facility for a town the size of Friona. As a comparison, Hereford, a city almost four times as large as Friona, has 4,000 feet of paved runway.

Quite an inventory of planes are based at Benger Air Park, numbering over 20. These include nine planes belonging to the airport, from single-engine two-passenger planes to twin-engine six-passenger aircraft.

Also, there are seven spray planes, and four individually owned planes. Individuals owning a plane based at Benger Air Park are Paul Morgan, Billy Sifford, the Lowellen Brothers and a tri-pacer owned jointly by coaches David Davis, Bob Owen, Ray DeBord and Larry Dyess.

In addition, the Friona Flying Club has recently re-organized, and has nine active members. They include Billy Jones, president, James Petty, secretary-treasurer, Howard Hayes, Kenneth Moore, C.L. Lillard, Floyd Rector, George Rushing, Glenn Herring and Johnny Miller.

The Flying Club also recently purchased a four-passenger Cherokee 235 for the use of its members. The club was organized to save flying expense for its members.

A sample of activities engaged in by local flyers was last Monday night, when four plane-loads of men flew to Lubbock to see the Frazier-Clay heavyweight championship fight by closed circuit telecast in Lubbock.

The flight was not over until almost 11:30 p.m., but by fly-

ing, the group arrived back in Friona by midnight.

The Friona airport also features complete shop facilities, a separate business operated by Matt Brown, an experienced aircraft mechanic. Counting the shop personnel, the airport employs from eight to 14 people, with the peaks coming during spraying season.

This year marks the 25th anniversary for Jennings at the local airport. Carl Maurer established the airport in 1944. Jennings came first as an instructor, during a post World War II boom in flying interest. He later became a partner with Maurer, and still later bought the airport outright.

The field is named for Ira Benger, a Friona pilot who was killed in a bomber crash at El Paso during World War II. Benger was the son of Mrs. John Benger of the Black Community.

Maurer put in the field originally to house a plane he owned jointly with some flying enthusiast friends. At that time there was no airport even at Hereford, and the flyers would have to base their plane either at Amarillo or Portales, because of government regulations.

40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 20, 1931

Maurer's Ready-to-Wear is the only store of its kind in the Friona trade territory. This is a modern store, with fixtures and furnishings which are attractive to the eye of visitors. They carry a complete line of ladies' dresses, coats, hats, shoes, stockings, lingerie and accessories. They also have a men's department. In addition to the ready-to-wear, Mr. Maurer operates the Maurer Machinery Company, dealers in Rock Island and Minneapolis-Moline tractors and farm machinery.

35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 20, 1936

On Sunday night as F.A. Spring and Dan Ethridge were returning to Friona from Lubbock they were met in the neighborhood of the Jesko school by the severe dust storm which swept over this locality that night. The dense wall of dust came upon them so suddenly that before their car could be stopped it had taken to the barbit. Spring walked about a mile until he came to a farm house and secured aid in getting the car back on the road. The group in the car waited at the farm home until the worst of the dust storm had passed.

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 21, 1941

Dr. R. J. McReynolds, who was mentioned in these columns last week as the medical doctor who was located here permanently for the practice of medicine, arrived Monday afternoon with a portion of his office equipment, and he opened his office Tuesday morning for regular practice.

25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 15, 1946

Two Friona men were badly burned in separate fires during the past week. Wilmot (Red) Crow was burned at an explosion at the Friona Locker Plant, and Howard Ford of the O.F. & O. Supply Company was burned while doing some welding.

20 YEARS AGO--MARCH 22, 1951

Friona's crack farm skill demonstration team travelled over 700 miles carrying several pigs and a bale of hay to take first place in the Chapter Farmer division of the state leadership contests for the second straight year. Members of the team were Keith Brock, M.C. Osborn, J. Vonne Fulks, Ralph Reed and Jack Redfean.

15 YEARS AGO--MARCH 16, 1956

There will be 922 students enrolled in Friona schools next year, according to the annual school census which was recently conducted.

Postal receipts, which are generally considered a pretty good indication of a town's prosperity, total \$3732 for the first two months of 1951, according to Postmaster Leo McLellan.

10 YEARS AGO--MARCH 16, 1961

Craig Coon of Friona FFA exhibited the grand champion steer at the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show. Earl Smith, head coach of the Friona Chieftains for the past two seasons, resigned his post. Ben Moorman, who later was to return as police chief, resigned his position effective April 1.

5 YEARS AGO--MARCH 17, 1966

Parmer County Community Hospital has received a grant of \$25,000 from the Mabey Foundation of Tulsa, Oklahoma, it was announced this week by hospital administrator H.E. Barnett.

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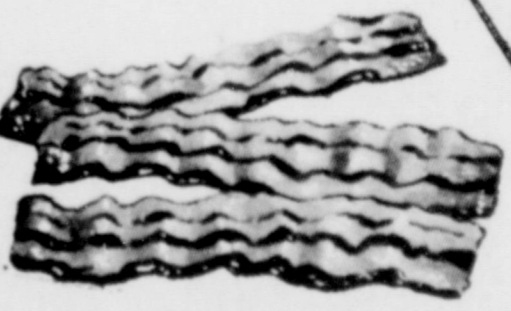

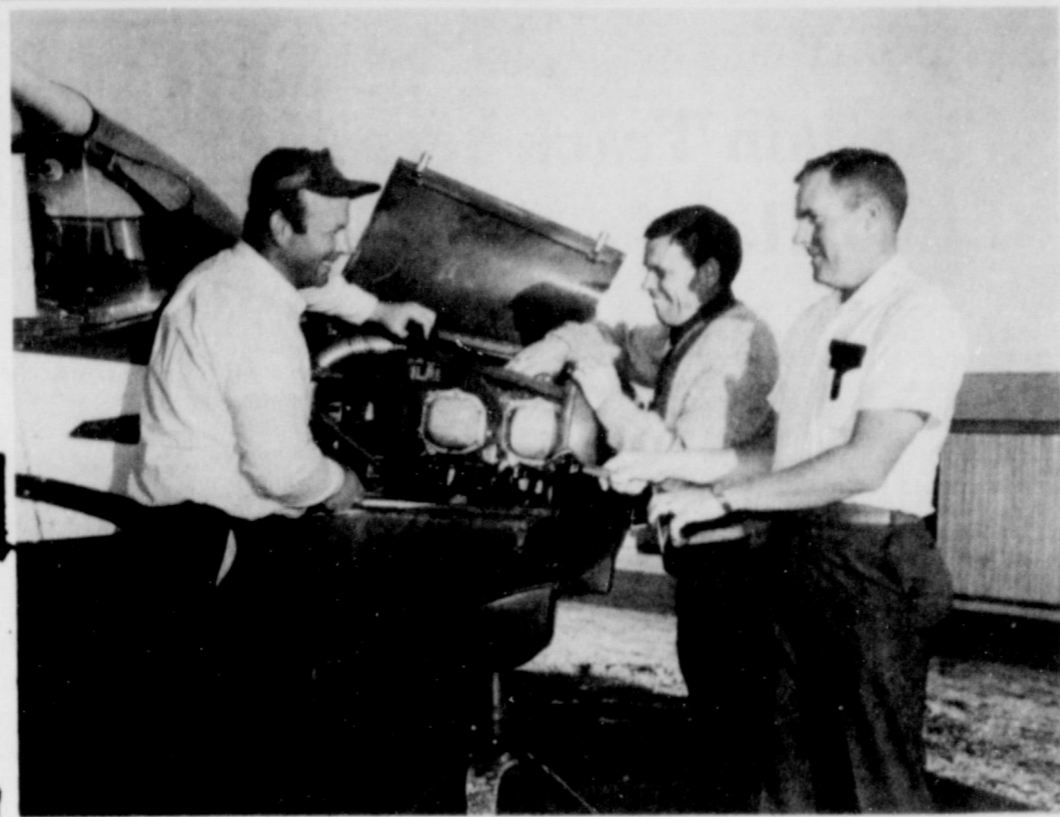

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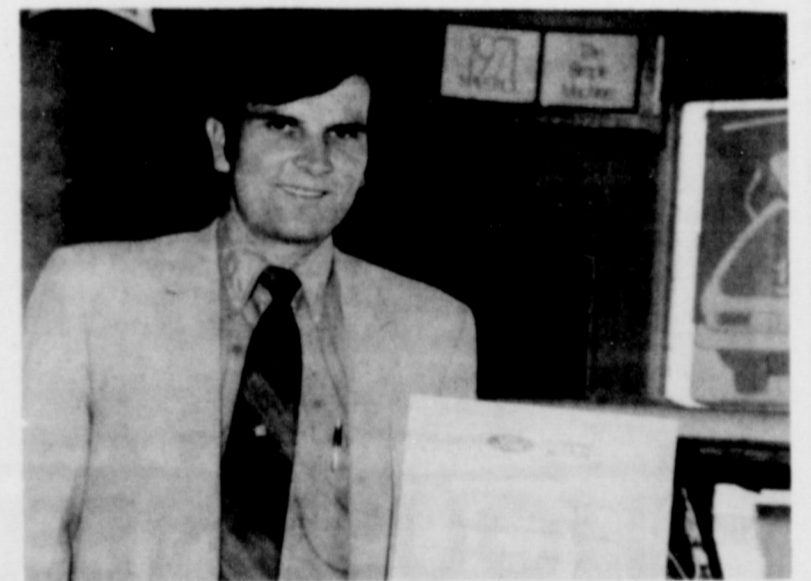

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# Mills Gives Rules On 1971 Farm Program

(Editor's note: Prentice L. Mills, manager of the Parmer County ASCS office, this week released the details of the 1971 farm programs and the rules of participation. Mills' interpretation of the programs follows.)

If a farm is to participate in the cotton, wheat or feed grain program (s) this year, there are certain things that the farm operator is expected (required) to do in order that the farm may be eligible for program benefits. This is written to remind farm operators and landowners of these basic requirements. They are as follows:

First, the farm operator must sign the farm up in the program (s) during the period March 1 through April 9.

Second, there must be an acreage of land set-aside on the farm to satisfy the set-aside requirements for the programs in which the farm is participating. This set-aside acreage must be devoted to an approved conserving use; also, the farm operator is required to control erosion, weeds, insects and rodents on this set-aside acreage.

Third, under the program (s) in which the farm is participating, the operator should make certain that his crop acreages meet the minimum planting requirements for payment and crop history purposes. Of course, the crops must be planted and cared for in a workmanlike manner in order for the farm to be eligible for program benefits.

Fourth, the farm operator is required to measure his acreages accurately and report the acreages to the ASCS office within the reporting period. Wheat acreages must be reported by no later than May 3, Feed grain and cotton acreages must be reported by no later than August 1. Note: Measurement service (by ASCS personnel) is available to those desiring same.

**BASIC REQUIREMENTS FOR SET-ASIDE ACREAGE**—The acreage must be cropland that would produce a crop this year. If the set-aside acreage is not of average productivity for the farm, the farm's program payments will be reduced to reflect this. Here is the way the payment reduction would be computed on a farm where the set-aside acres are considered below average for the farm. Let us use an example farm that has irrigated payment yields and the set-aside acreage is from dryland acreage. This example farm has a 100 acre feed grain base with 120 bushel (irrigated) payment yield established. The set-aside for the farm is 20 acres and is designated on land that cannot be irrigated. The ASC County Committee establishes a dryland yield for the farm (grain sorghum) at 35 bushels per acre. The payment reduction in

this case will be computed by multiplying 29¢ times the difference between the irrigated yield and the dryland yield and then multiplying the result by the 20 acre set-aside under the feed grain program. 120 bu. minus 35 equals 85 bu. difference. 85 bu. x 29¢ equals \$24.65 per acre payment reduction. 20 acres times \$24.65 equals \$493.00 which is the total payment reduction under the feed grain program in this example. This farm has a 45.0 acre wheat allotment with a 44 bushel (irrigated) payment yield established. The set-aside is dryland. The dryland yield for the farm is set at 18 bu. per acre. To arrive at the payment reduction under the wheat program, we multiply 80¢ times the difference between the irrigated and dryland yields and multiply the result by the acres set-aside under the wheat program. This being 33.7 acres. 44 minus 18 equals 26, 26 times 80 equals \$20.80 per acre payment reduction. 33.7 acres times \$20.80 equals \$700.96 payment reduction under the wheat program. This farm has a 30 acre cotton allotment with 550 lb. per acre irrigated yield and a 6 acre set-aside requirement. The set-aside is designated on dryland and the dryland yield is set at 150 lbs. per acre. The payment reduction for cotton is at the rate of 5¢ per pound on the difference between the irrigated and dryland yields for the farm. 550 lbs. minus 150 lbs. equals 400 lbs. 400 lbs. times 5¢ equals

\$20.00. 6 acres times \$20.00 equals \$120.00 payment reduction under the cotton program on this farm. Therefore, the total farm reduction (under the three programs) for having dryland set-aside acres would be \$1313.96.

In the above example we talk of the difference between irrigated and dryland; however, there are cases where the set-

aside may be irrigable and still be considered less productive than average for the farm. In these cases the farm payments will be reduced to reflect the difference in productivity of the lands involved. Let us urge anyone that has a question about the farm programs to visit their ASCS office. The people working there will be glad to assist with your questions.

The 108 performance proven bulls will go on sale at 1:30 p.m. with Bert Reyes as auctioneer. The sale will conclude a Field Day program at the Killgore Beef Cattle Center which begins at 8 a.m. with inspection of bulls.

A highlight of the morning program will be a 10:15 a.m. panel discussion on issues confronting the beef industry moderated by Dr. R. Hollis Klett, superintendent of the center.

Panel members include Dr. C. K. Vincent, associate professor of the Department of Animal Science, Louisiana State University; Joe VanZandt, director of membership relations, Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Amarillo; Dr. Dale Furr, nutritionist for HI-Pro Feeds of Friona, former superintendent of the research center; Kenneth L. Dillidine, manager, Glover Packing Plant, Amarillo; and Dr. William J. Waldrip, general manager of Spade Ranches, Colorado City.

Those attending the Field Day program will be welcomed at 9:50 a.m. by Texas Tech President Grover E. Murray, Tech's new dean of agricultural sciences, Dr. Anson R. Bertrand, will be introduced by Dr. Samuel E. Curl, associate dean and chairman of the Field Day program.

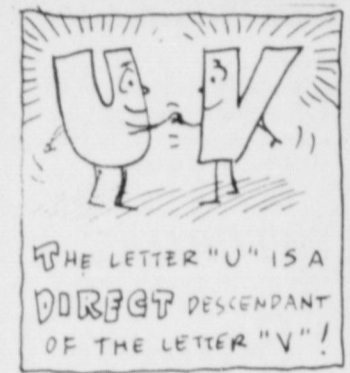
A crop and insect meeting will be held on March 22, 1971, at 7:30 p.m. in the Hub Community Center at Hub.

The meeting will feature three specialists who will discuss topics of interest to all producers. Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Plant Pathologist, will discuss the possibility of corn blight occurring on a large scale in the Panhandle area this coming year. In addition to this he will give his opinion on the occurrence of maize dwarf mosaic virus in grain sorghum for the coming growing season.

Dr. Bill Clymer, Extension Entomologist, will review new control methods for the southwestern corn borer. He will also discuss the most common insects affecting grain sorghum, including spider mites, greenbugs, and corn leaf aphids. Dr. Leon New, Extension Irrigation Specialist, will show recent findings in corn, milo and sugarbeet water use. This will include some of the studies conducted in Parmer and Deaf

Smith counties in 1970. These three men should bring an interesting and worthwhile program. I hope you can attend this meeting on March 22.

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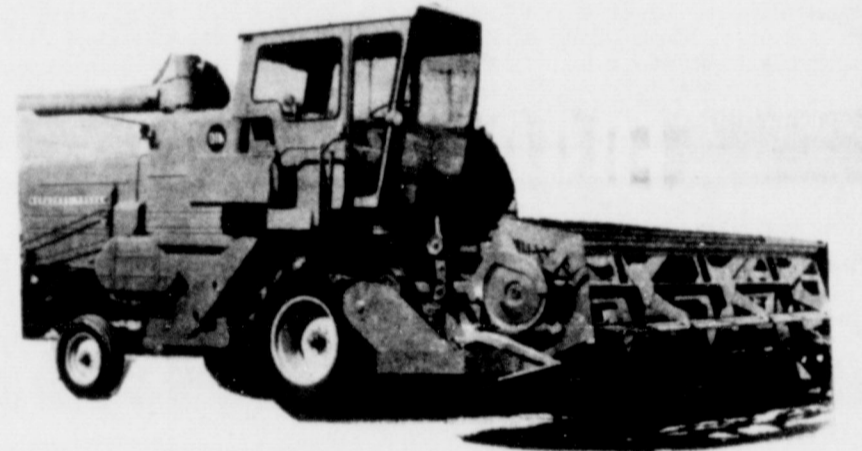


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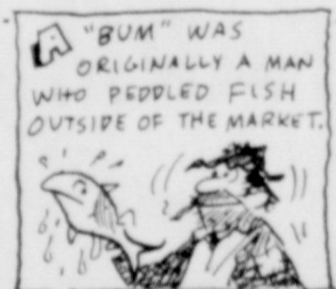

## Wheat Referendum And Board Election Slated

John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, today certified the Texas Wheat Producers Association to conduct a referendum and producer board election in 34 Texas Counties under provisions of the Agricultural Commodity Act of 1969 according to Bill Nelson, TWPA Executive Vice President of Amarillo.

The certification authorizes the association to sponsor and conduct a referendum whereby producers of wheat in the designated area vote on a proposition of self assessment not to exceed five mills per bushels for research, market development, disease and insect control and more efficient production and marketing practices for wheat. A referendum has been set by the Association for Tuesday, May 11, according to Leo Witkowski of Hereford, TWPA farmer-elected president.

Witkowski said that at the same time of the assessment referendum, an election will be held to elect a 9-member producer board to administer the program and direct the use of funds generated. Any producer may have his name placed on the ballot for election to the producer board by having his request signed by ten other producers and submitting it to the association thirty (30) days prior to the election.

Witkowski said that Texas is now eighth in wheat production, but is one of the only major wheat states that has not had a producer funded promotion and development program. He said that now producers will have an opportunity to initiate such activity in an all-outfitted effort to increase individual growers income, by a vote vote.

The Texas Wheat Producers Association was founded in 1950

and has since been funded and directed by producers in the High Plains and Rolling Plains areas that produce over 75 per cent of the States wheat.

In addition to Witkowski and Nelson, other TWPA officers are Dwight Hamilton, Vice President, Olney; Ken Kendrick, Stratford, Vice President; and C.L. Edwards, Panhandle, Secretary-Treasurer. Headquarters offices are located in Suite 600, Bank of the Southwest in Amarillo.

Parmer County is included in the area certified for the referendum and producer board election.

## Judging Team Place Fourth At Pampa

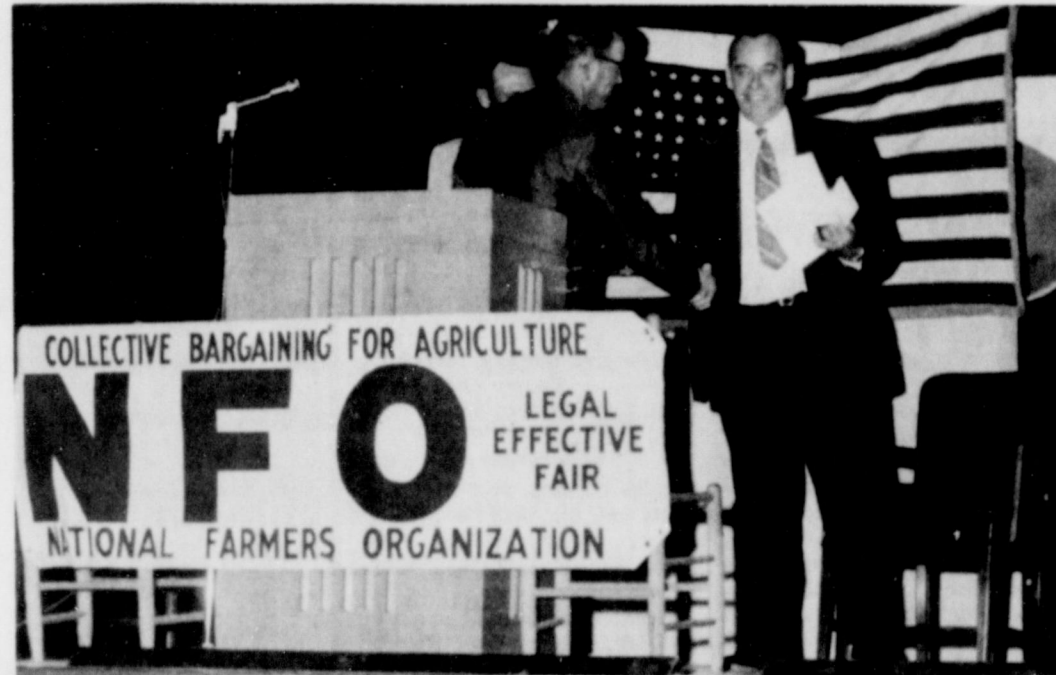

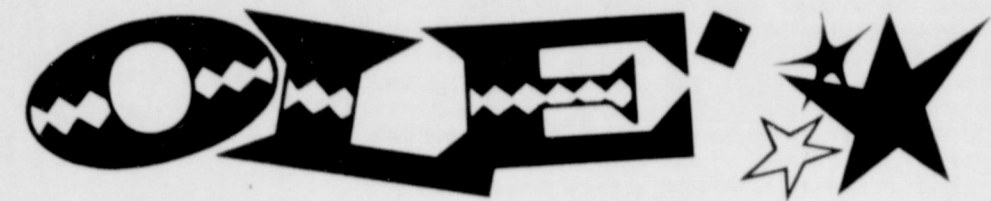
### Son Born To K. Harringtons

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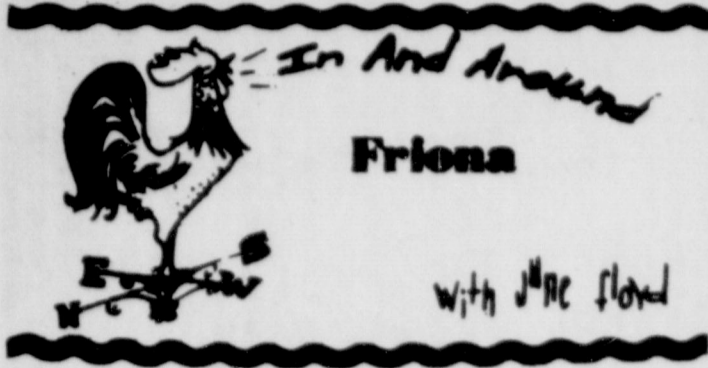
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Right now I'm confused on the subject of ecology and the theory that it is dangerous for us to upset nature's balance as far as wild life is concerned. Then, too, I can't understand why the danger of deer becoming extinct isn't shared by the coyote family.

There are people who would lead us to believe that coyotes shouldn't be killed because they eat rabbits and that if we kill the coyotes, the rabbits will eat our crops. One man who holds to this theory points to the situation in Australia as a good example--no coyotes, hordes of rabbits--he says.

I have no idea how a person would determine the coyote population of an area, but at least two different men saw four in one pack on more than one occasion last week. Two full grown coyotes were killed by farmers on the Frio Draw west of town Friday.

One of the men had lost a baby calf to coyotes a few nights earlier. The carcass, which was minus one hind quarter, indicated to the rancher that there must be a litter of pups somewhere in the area, so he went looking for a den.

I don't know whether he ever found a den or not, but he did find one of the predators.

While visiting briefly with Mrs. Charles Short early this week, I learned that her family is presently living on two continents. Daughter Mary, who is now Mrs. Jerry T. Criswell, has joined her husband, who is stationed in Germany.

The other daughter, Marie, and her husband, Wayne Pate, are now living in Fort Worth. They are both teaching in nearby Decatur.
