New Ball Park Sets Dedication Fete

The countdown is underway for Friona High School seniors and other students anticipating the end of school.

And, if they survive all of the end-of-school activities, plus final examinations, about a week from tomorrow night, some 60 FHS seniors will have completed their high school education.

Enjoy these days, seniors. Someday in the not-too-distant future you'll look back on them as being some of the best times of your lives.

The American Legion Auxiliary points out that wearing a poppy on Poppy Day this Saturday will honor the more than half a million Americans who died and the nearly one million wounded during World Wars I and II, the Korean War and the current Vietnam conflict.

The Legion Auxiliary adopted the poppy as its Memorial flower at the organization's first convention in Kansas City in 1921—exactly 50 years ago this year. After taking this action, the Auxiliary pledged that 100 per cent of the contributions on Poppy Day would be used for rehabilitation and child welfare work.

So, be proud to wear a poppy this Saturday. Wear it as a tribute to those who have given their lives that you may live in freedom.

Last week we were talking about the ecologists, and their mania to "cure" all the ills of pollution in our nation. This week we received information about the drive to halt the sale of phosphate detergents, because they think these products are to blame for all the algae in various lakes and streams.

The information sheet asks whether the ecologists paid any attention to the warnings sounded recently by no less an authority than Dr. Jesse L. Steinfeld, the Surgeon General of the U.S.

During Washington hearings, the nation's No. 1 doctor strongly opposed a Federal Trade Commission proposal that all phosphate detergents carry a label warning against environmental effects. He said such a requirement at this time might cause consumers to try dangerous substitutes, many of which are not only hazardous but even potentially lethal.

new Senior Little League park will be dedicated next Monday night, in special ceremonies at the park beginning at 8:30 p.m.

Prior to the ceremony, members of Friona's two Senior LL

teams, Hi-Plains Feed Yard and Bengier Air Park, will hold a scrimmage game, and following the dedication, at about 8:45 an exhibition softball game between the Friona Noon Lions and the evening Lions will be played.

The two Lions clubs, particularly the Noon Lions, are responsible for the beautiful new park. The Noon Lions adopted the project early last summer, and with a lot of effort and hard work, had the park completed in time for the opening of the 1971 Senior Little League season last Tuesday.

A representative of the Friona Noon Lions will present the deed to the park to the City. A collection will be taken following the ceremony, to apply to the debt on the park. To date, some \$2,500 has been raised for the park fund, and the Lions need about \$2,000 more to pay off the park.

The Lions plan to acknowledge many people who have contributed in any way to make the new park possible. The land was provided by Friona Wheat Growers and Sloan Osborn.

Members of the Friona Noon Lions seeded the park in Bermuda grass last summer, and were successful in getting a good, solid grass coverage by the end of last summer.

Included in the facilities are a chain-link fence, a concession stand complete with restroom facilities and a press box. Adding to the expense of the project were the lights. Some of the light equipment from the old Reeve Field was salvaged, but the Lions had to secure new poles.

The new park is a credit to Friona and its youth baseball park, and those who have not seen it should drive down to Third and Prospect next Monday evening.

Next Wednesday, May 26 is the last regular day of classes. Final examinations are scheduled in high school on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Busses will run at 2:40 p.m. on Tuesday and at 2:10 p.m. Wednesday.

Awards assemblies for all students in Friona schools are slated for the next two days. High school awards fete will be held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday. Grades one and two will be honored at awards assembly at 1 p.m. Thursday at the Grade School Auditorium.

Awards assembly for grades three and four will be at 1 p.m. Friday at the grade school auditorium, and the assembly for grades 5-8 will be held at 2:45 p.m. Friday.

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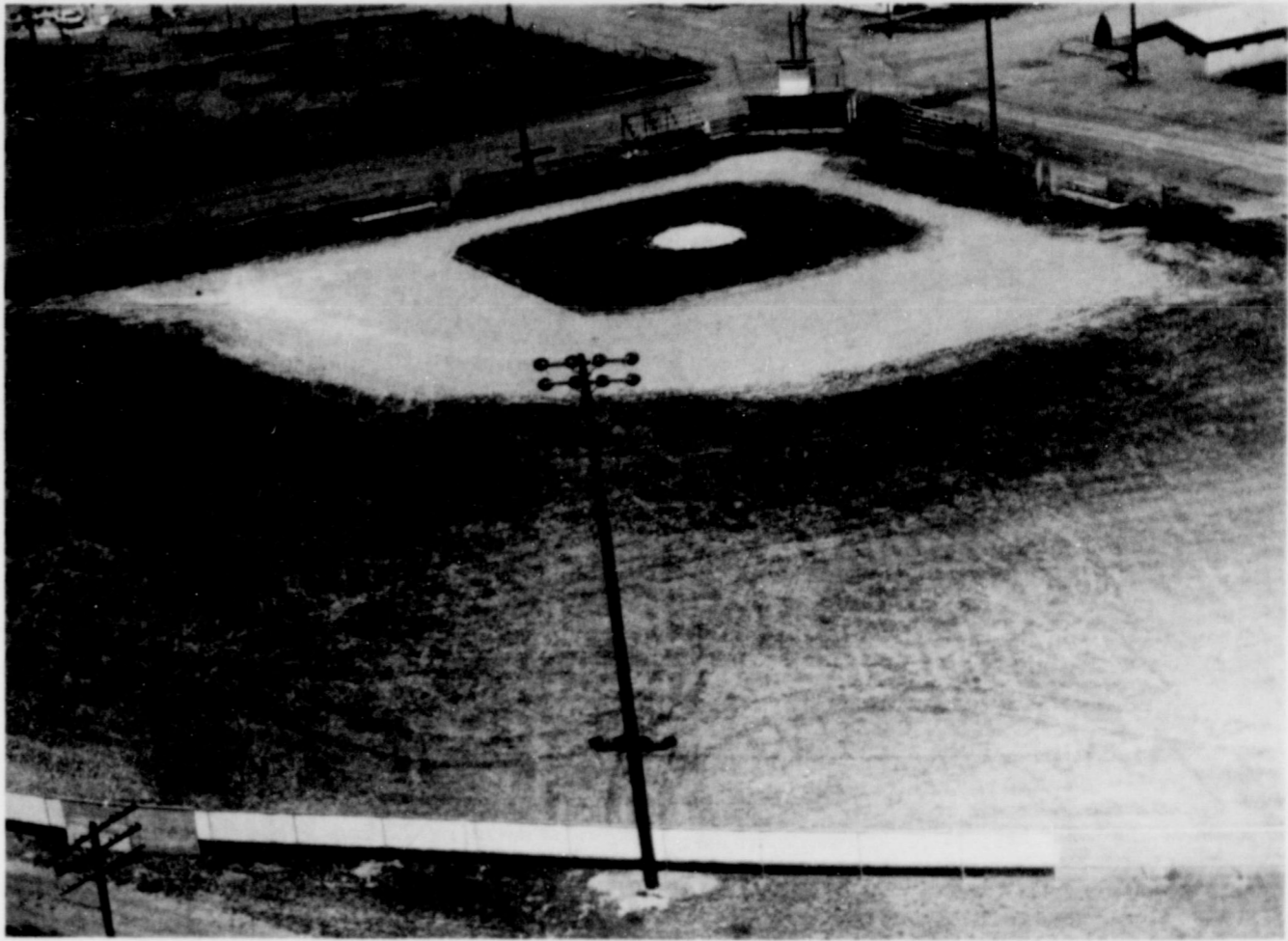

LEASE EXPIRES

Continental Grain Closing In Friona

Continental Grain Company, which has done business in Friona for the past 17 years, announced this week that it would not renew the lease on its Friona facility when it expires the last of this month.

H.H. (Hank) Wheeler, who has served as Continental Grain's manager here for the past five years, said the company would suspend its operations in Friona on Saturday, May 29.

"We want to thank our many friends and customers who have favored us with their business these many years. We think a lot of Friona, and we sure hate to have to terminate our association here," Wheeler stated.

Owner of the elevator, Leo Potishman of Fort Worth, wants to sell the property, but had no definite announcement to make this week.

Contacted by telephone at his ranch near Fort Worth, Potishman told the Friona Star that he is in the process of negotiating the possible sale of the property, but that nothing has been settled at this time.

"There is some buyer interest, because Friona is located in the fastest-growing areas of the state. I love Friona, and want the elevator to be operated by someone who will treat the growers of that area right," Potishman said.

The long-time grain man added that the only reason he is considering selling the property is his advanced age (75).

"If I was a younger man, it wouldn't be for sale at any price," he said.

Potishman said he hoped that new arrangements could be completed by the time Continental's lease expires. "However, nothing is definite at this time, and anyone interested in buying or leasing the elevator should contact me at Fort Worth," he said, leaving the door open for the possibility of leasing, rather than selling the property.

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Local Voters Follow Trend

Friona voters followed the voting trend on the statewide basis on Tuesday in the constitutional amendment election.

Local voters favored only Amendment 4, the "pure water" amendment, and went against the first three.

With a light turnout of just 160 voters in the Friona precinct, the vote was as follows:

Number 1: ("Ethics") For, 66, Against, 94; Number 2: (Welfare) For, 64, Against, 95; Number 3: (constitutional amendments) For, 66, Against, 94; Number 4: (clean water) For, 129, Against, 31.

County totals were: No. 1: For, 149, Against, 257; No. 2: For, 125, Against, 279; No. 3: For, 158, Against, 249; No. 4: For, 279, Against, 127. Total vote: 407.

New Law To Cause More Immunization

Senate Bill 27 was signed into law April 26, 1971 by Governor Smith. This law requires that all school age children, elementary and secondary, hereafter will be required to be immunized against diphtheria, rubella, tetanus, polio and smallpox.

The DPT shot includes diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough immunization up to age six. Those receiving the shot after age six are immunized against diphtheria and tetanus. The rubella and rubella shots will be required only of those pupils who have not had measles.

Parents are urged to have their children immunized anytime during this summer. Special forms will be provided at the Parmer County Community Hospital showing the type of immunization and date. Forms also are available at the School Nurse's office and all principal's offices.

Saturday Is Poppy Day

Members of the Friona American Legion Auxiliary, aided by volunteer workers, will be selling poppies in Friona on Saturday, with funds to aid disabled American war veterans.

Mayor R.L. Fleming declared Saturday as "Poppy Day," and urged every citizen to support the cause by wearing a poppy.

The annual meeting for stockholders of Friona Consumers, Inc. will be held Saturday, May 22 in the High School Cafeteria.

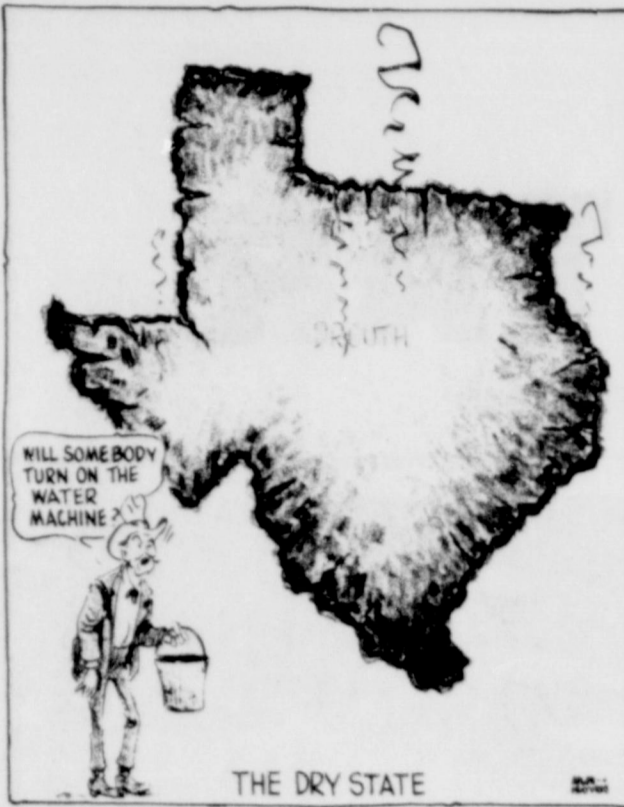

Sometimes The Cure Is Worse Than Ills

Tom Anderson reminds us that there are "27,931 ways" of making a living in America without getting on welfare. Yet welfare is growing 18 times faster than our population. In addition to the 63 million drawing social security and veterans benefits, 11 million Americans are on public assistance, while ten million more receive free doctors' services under Medicare.

Mr. Anderson quotes one campus radical saying to another: "But what happens to our unemployment checks when we overthrow the government?" Perhaps no one has told him that in Communist countries everyone who is able to work must do so unless he wants to starve to death. The government is not only living beyond its income, remarks Anderson, "it is living beyond yours and mine." He compares it to a hungry snake that keeps on swallowing more and more of its tail "until there is no tail—and no snake."

The welfare state causes more problems than it cures.



Pause and Reflect

A little over a century ago two railroad crews met and joined the rails that tied our nation together from east to west. Today, a hundred long, hard years later, we Americans are faced with a problem that can be solved only if we realize that we must approach it from both ends.

To some the generation gap is so deep and wide as to defy the best efforts of all concerned.

Such thinking is brainwashing of the most dangerous sort—exactly what our Communist, ping-pong playing, Soviet influenced, people managers, want us to believe.

We of the White Haired League must not make the mistake of considering all youth to be the Lost Generation.

The young people must realize that we Oldsters have been living under extreme pressures for longer than they have been alive.

There is a meeting ground, and battlefield though it may seem, cooperation and understanding between the ages is our only chance of salvation.

A very graphic demonstration was witnessed recently by yours truly.

I found myself in a situation where hearts, minds, feelings, nerves and actions were each pushed to the limits of endurance.

And who came through the winners?

Six young people by whom I am very proud to be called "Uncle."

Splendid as they are, I do not think that this particular group has any corner on brains or manners.

I think that their generation has a lot to offer.

Whether we live in Virginia or Texas, or wherever, we must "join the rails" to achieve any degree of human progress.

We certainly can't do it if we stand on opposite sides of the gap and yell at each other!

A couple of weeks ago, we learned the hard way the true meaning of the adage "you can't teach an old dog new tricks." We were faced with the necessity of making a quick trip to Richmond, Virginia.

During the six years we have lived in Texas we have made this journey eight times, always by automobile.

Now time and circumstances made motoring impracticable so we turned our attention toward other modes of travel.

Bus transportation was eliminated: 48 hours being required for a one-way trip.

Train travel has gone the way of so many other good old American customs—and here our face turned red!

A recent column praised air travel versus railways—but we are not likely to repeat that performance.

We remember saying that we could fly to Richmond in three and one-half hours for about the same money.

So we can, if we ignore such items as getting to the airports, the Olympic type foot races to far distant loading docks (and the long waits), the weather, and waiting for other people's luggage.

One of our pilots explained the Jet Age in this manner, "Breakfast in London, lunch in New York, dinner in Miami, and baggage in Buenos Aires."

Actually the total elapsed time is about eight hours—allowing for time zone changes.

The cost is about the same as rail or bus, but they take six times longer!

That was our experience, but you know what Ben Franklin said about that, "Experience keeps a dear school, but fools will learn in no other."

But we learned something about "old dogs"—Ye Olde Prairie Prowler should remain just that—a prowler, on foot or in a pick-up!

Air travel is not for us.

We are reminded of the old man who asked the meaning of the term "terra firma"—and we agree with the answer he received, "It means the Earth—and the more firmer, the less terror."

40 YEARS AGO—MAY 22, 1931

The last of the bonds issued for the purpose of building Farmer County's present court house in Farwell have been called in for payment by Walter Lander, county treasurer. The court house was built in 1915 and bonds issued which were payable at the option of the county for a period of 38 years. Good management and growth of the county enabled the administration to pay off these loans in 16 rather than 38 years.

35 YEARS AGO—MAY 22, 1936

20 YEARS AGO—MAY 16, 1951

Fire of undetermined origin early Wednesday morning gutted the high school building of Friona, with total destruction of all that part of the building situated from the study hall north. Early estimates place damage at near \$100,000. The newly completed \$200,000 gymnasium-auditorium, located just south of the fire-ravaged high school building, was not damaged.

15 YEARS AGO—MAY 17, 1956

The first two of a three-unit building program to extend over a five-year period started this week for the Friona Methodist Church, whose members endorsed Sunday at a church conference a \$62,000 figure as an estimated cost of those first two phases of the project. Both projects are considered additions to the church's educational program.

10 YEARS AGO—MAY 18, 1961

The long-awaited opening of Friona's new indoor swimming pool, the first of its kind for this area, is slated for this weekend, announces Truett Johnson, owner of the \$60,000 recreational facility. Open house is slated for this Saturday and Sunday, but the grand opening will be postponed until equipment is received for the snack bar, Johnson says.

Remember back when things were other-wise? I mean the Edsel Ford—"Win With Wilkie" or "I Like Ike" buttons? Probably all of us can and do have memories of times past, some happy and some not, but things which were indicative of the past... I even saw a KNNN bumper sticker the other day... And of course, on the problem of some cars now without enough bumper for the sticker—what will we do? My idea of really being one up on everyone else would be to get all of the bumper stickers supporting all sides of an issue or possibly all of the candidates for a political office and then on the night when the votes were tabulated, stick the winning slogans or names on my bumper and parade around town the next day making everybody think I was one smart cookie... (How would you like a copy of the bumper sticker to display after the next Presidential election, now? See how it works on your ego? Waiting in a bus station the other day in Amarillo for the arrival of a person, I overheard a man at a near table in the coffee shop tell most of the people who came in during his "coffee break" that he had won on all of his city council votes and predicted winning the run off. (And he did). He was notifying everybody of his reasonable logic which had brought him to the winning conclusion... Being the day after the election while the pains of losing were still fresh, it was easy to tell who was in agreement and who wasn't... We like to tell the world when we are right—even on bumper stickers—and we don't usually shout very loud when we are in the loser's circle... That's just human nature—pure and simple. And proud as we may be about this type of "human nature"—with it being a gift from the Almighty to assist our living pangs—still this very attitude can cause us trouble, also. If I haven't lost you by now, let me try again. Most of us—if you don't want me to include

you in this confession, you can turn me off—have a fair idea of what we want and the direction we want to go. (Now don't disagree with me yet since there will be more that you can add in...)

Now, with some of our preconceived ideas we naturally look for, and uphold those things which tend to support our ideals. In like manner, we seek to destroy or "turn off" those things which do not feed us what we want to hear.

This becomes so strong at times that we even misread—or misinterpret—or really do not hear something—until we can actually make ourselves "hear" it saying just what we want it to say.

This is basic to the statement we hear so often, "What you heard me say is what I've said for you, whether I said it or not." Still with me?

It caused the main character in the movie, "Cool Man Luke" to say, as he faced death, "What we have here is a failure to communicate."

Communication comes via voice, feelings, actions, care, concern—there are many ways to communicate.

You see, what we have now is "what are we hearing, now?" How are we responding and what is the source of the idea we are communicating?

Does this bother you or have I communicated with you? Better yet—how is your Man-God response?

President Nixon Has Endorsed MS Campaign

President Richard M. Nixon has proclaimed the period from May 9, Mother's Day through June 20, (Father's Day) as "National Multiple Sclerosis Society Annual Hope Chest Appeal Weeks." It was made known by Mrs. James McLean and Mrs. Ralph Shelton, co-chairmen of the Panhandle chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society.

The proclamation signed by the President in the White House on December 28, was in the form of a resolution passed unanimously by the House of Representatives and the Senate, "urging the people of the United States and educational, philanthropic, scientific, medical, and health care professions and organizations to provide the assistance and resources necessary to discover the cause and cure of multiple sclerosis and to alleviate the suffering of persons stricken by this disease."

City's Monthly Records Released By Outland

Seven building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the month of April, but they were for small jobs for the most part, totalling only \$18,000 -- the smallest monthly total for the calendar year.

The totals brought the building permit figure for the calendar year to \$201,150.00.

Included in the seven permits for April were two storm cellars, a carport and four alterations to residences.

Other monthly records released by City Manager Jake Outland revealed that six new water taps were made, and one service reactivated during the

month, to bring the total number of active water services to 1256.

The east water tower was drained during the first week and the interior of the tank inspected.

A total of 18,784,700 gallons of water were pumped during April, an average of 616,157 gallons per day, an increase of some 10 per cent over the previous month.

Three new sewer taps were also added during the month, bringing the number of active taps to 1216 in the city.

Only three fire alarms were sounded during April, and all were on the same day. Calls were to Friona Battery & Electric for an automobile fire, the second at the high school's athletic field, and the other was at General Telephone Company's storage yard. Damage amounted to less than \$100 in each instance.

Parmer County 4-H members will be calling on local citizens to purchase a bar of World's Finest Chocolate, May 19-31, as part of a state wide effort to raise funds for a Texas 4-H educational center.

The county sales goal is 15 bars per 4-H member, with the bars selling for a dollar each.

A State 4-H Center is badly needed since the Texas 4-H program does not own any type of training or camping facility. The proposed center is being developed by the Texas 4-H Foundation, and will cost approximately 1 million dollars. It will accommodate about 175 people. The center will be a focal point for camping-type programs, 4-H leader training, citizenship seminars, leadership training labs, international 4-H activities, project training and other Extension Service activities. When not in use by 4-H, the center will be available to other groups with educational programs.

While the 4-H'ers themselves make their contribution, a statewide development council composed of business leaders will help raise the balance of the funds.

VIRUS DISEASE OF HORSES MOVING NORTHWARD
U.S. Department of Agriculture animal health officials and livestockmen are keeping a sharp eye out for symptoms of a foreign virus disease of horses that has recently moved closer to the United States.

The disease, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE), has moved northward from South and Central America into southern Mexico where about 6,000 horses were reported killed by the disease. Besides Mexico, the disease has been reported in 16 other countries in South and Central America.

VEE is an infectious disease of the central nervous system of horses that sometimes causes a mortality rate as high as 80-90 percent, according to officials of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service.

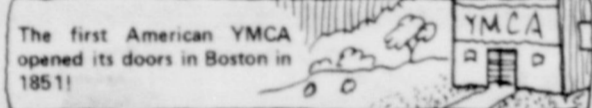
Symptoms include a rapid rise in body temperatures up to 106 degrees accompanied by a rapid pulse rate, loss of appetite, and depression. Often the animal will walk in circles until it falls down. Death may occur in six to eight days. Also, a horse may hang its head, press its head against objects, cause a cross-legged stance, show a "drifting" gait or appear drowsy, say animal health officials.

There are several types of the virus, but the one responsible for the clinical disease in horses isn't found in the United States. Transmission of the virus to man and animals usually occurs through bites of infected mosquitoes, officials added.

Positive diagnosis of VEE is possible only after laboratory tests because it resembles two common types of encephalomyelitis found in the United States.

The U.S. Department of Defense has developed a human live-virus vaccine that has been used to help control VEE in some countries, but its effectiveness and safety has not been fully proven. Presently no vaccine is licensed in this country for use against VEE.

USDA officials pointed out that consideration will be given to the use of an effective vaccine as a possible means of containing the disease if it should enter the country.

UNDERWAY LOCALLY

**Pollution Studies Aimed
At Feed Yard Drainage**

Pollution studies are underway in Parmer County. Scientists from Bushland Experiment Station were in Parmer County last Friday to take soil samples. These were underwater samples taken from the plays lake at Paco Feedyard.

The State Water Quality Board is obtaining information from feedyards, about pollution from plays lakes infiltrating into our underground water supply. The Texas Water Quality Board is responsible for protecting our underground water supplies from contamination.

To aid in this responsibility there are no better qualified people to gather this information than Bushland Experiment Station Scientists.

The scientists came with their boots on. They walked out into the lake and sampled the underwater formations. This will give them data of actual existing conditions.

The scientists gathering information Friday were Dr. Bob

Stewart, Reggie Jones (a Parmer County native), and Nolan Clark.

Herb Evans, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Friona and Bill Teel, manager of Paco Feedyard are cooperating with the study.

Wheat Referendum Passes, According To Early Report

Leo Witkowski, President, Texas Wheat Producers Association said that preliminary results on May 14 from the referendum canvassing committee indicate that the wheat referendum held May 11, had carried with 67.1% of those producers voting on the proposition favoring it. This now provides for producer self-assessment for not more than five mills per bushel for research and market development.

He also said that nine producers had been elected to a board charged with the administration of the new program. Those elected according to preliminary results were: Kenneth Kendrick, Stratford; C.L.

Edwards, Panhandle; Delbert Timmons, Perryton; Leo Witkowski, Hereford; N.F. Renner, Spearman; John Cogdell, Crowell; Dwight Hamilton, Olney; Otis Harman, Tulsa; and W.R. Moore, Jr., Munday.

The wheat producers now join the producers of peanuts, turkeys, grain sorghum and soybeans in having approved self assessment for research and promotion of their commodities in an effort to strengthen farmer income under authority granted by the 61st Texas Legislature in H.B. 764.

Official results will be announced by Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White.

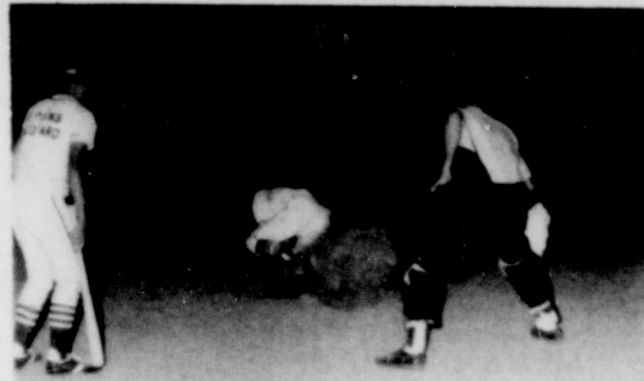

Former Friona Boy Among Boys Ranch Graduates

Don Brecht, a Friona boy who has lived at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch near Hereford for almost 10 years, will graduate from the Boys Ranch High School on May 21.

Don, 18, is one of the 24 seniors who will be receiving diplomas during commencement exercises for the seniors. He has lived at the Ranch for almost 10 years and has been active in chapel choir, the Bible Memory Association, the Boys Ranch Annual Rodeo, Honor Patrol, Vocational Industrial Clubs of America, Fellowship of Christian

Athletes, Boys Ranch Letterman's Club and varsity football, basketball and track. Don is a member of the Junior Staff, which is an organization that works with the adult staff on many of the Ranch's activities, and being selected for the Junior Staff is the highest honor any boy can receive while living at the Ranch. He takes auto-body for his vocation, one of 14 different skills that are offered to the older boys as part of the Ranch's vocational program.

Brecht was named "Athlete of the Year" at Boys Ranch.

He participated in all sports, and set a Ranch record in the broad jump at the regional track meet with a jump of 22 feet, four and one-half inches.

Brecht went on to the state meet and placed fourth. He was selected to the second team all-district offense and defense in football.

Now in its 32nd year, the Ranch has raised and cared for more than 2,500 homeless and troubled boys and is now home for 370 boys. They have been

provided with a home much like the average American family, and in practically all cases without any expense to the parents or any governmental, religious or social agency.

Cal Farley founded Boys Ranch in 1939 at the historic ghost town of Old Tascosa, Texas. Farley died four years ago and has been succeeded by Virgil Patterson, a member of the Ranch Board of Directors for over 20 years.
