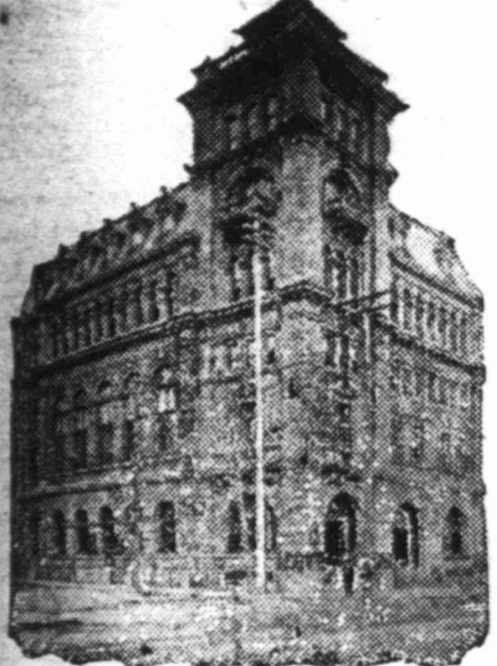

WEST TEXAS GROWING WITH PROSPEROUS TIMES
 Sinking an Oil Well?
Special to The Telegram.
SAN ANGELO, Texas, Jan. 11.—Much interest has been created in San Angelo over a report from Miles to the effect that the Santa Fe is sinking an oil shaft at that place. Messrs. Simon Poff and William Becker, two substantial citizens of San Angelo, visited Miles Friday and returned with the information that the railroad system was making all preliminary preparations and erecting a huge derrick near Miles for the purpose of drilling for water. A fact that throws more light upon the matter is that a two-inch bore well will be drilled and that the Santa Fe has already all the water needed at Miles. The derrick is between sixty and eighty feet high and is a regular oil well structure. All the work connected with the putting down of this deep hole and the building of the derricks, etc., will cost the railroad an estimated amount of \$10,000 to \$12,000, far above any amount that would be judiciously expended simply for engine water by any railroad.

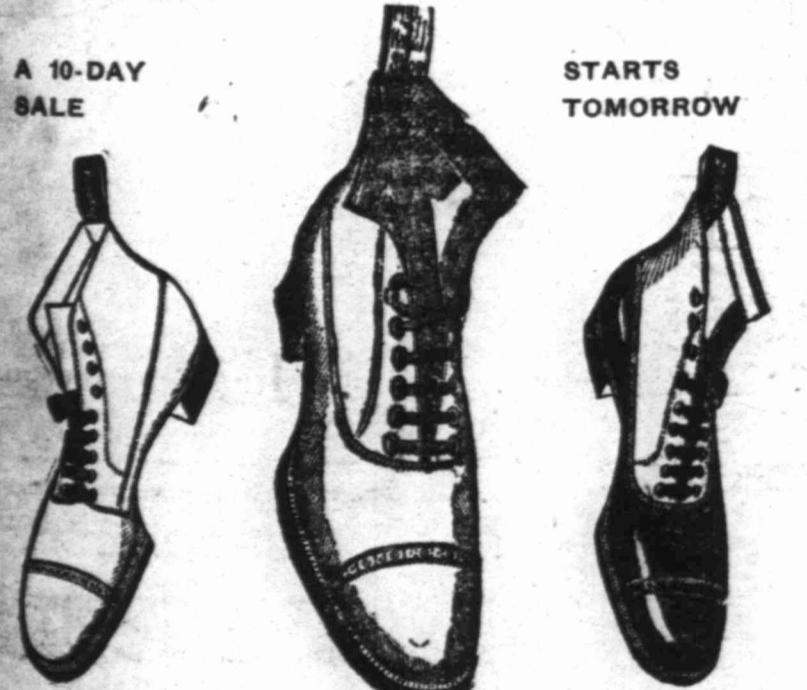

FORT WORTH MAN IS TO TESTIFY

Lived in Brownsville During Soldiers' Riot

L. W. Evans of Fort Worth but more recently a resident of Brownsville, Texas, where he was a quarantine guard under State Health Officer Tabor, has been served with a request to be at San Antonio Feb. 4 to serve as witness for the prosecution in the general court martial of Major Chas. W. Penrose of the Twenty-fifth United States infantry, the negro regiment, a battalion of which is held responsible for murder and the deadly assault on some of the citizens of Brownsville the night of Aug. 13, 1906.

It is the practice, at Brownsville, followed by all of the four saloons there, to serve the better class of Mexicans at the same bars frequented by the Americans.

There were a number of minor incidents which accentuated the ill feeling between the townspeople and the negroes and what was taken to be the intentionally rude jostling of white women on the streets, or even off the sidewalks, by passing negro soldiers.

Mr. Evans related the facts which led to some one knocking a negro soldier off the footway at the custom house, supposed to have been done by Mr. Tate, the soldiers blamed Mr. Esker, Mr. Tate, Mr. Evans and other peace officers for the act.

One evening, returning from the Mexican side, accompanied by Mrs. Evans, Mr. Evans detained at the landing, let his wife ride her pony up to their residence, but a short distance away. The back gate of the yard of the Evans home was opened on the street which ran between the residences and the wall of the post.

Mrs. Evans dismounted at the gate and, hanging the bridle rein over her arm, went into the yard and, as she laid her hat down on the back gallery, a negro soldier who was secreted between the steps of the gallery and the water barrel, grabbed her. She screamed and that and the commotion scared the pony and he jerked her backward.

Alarmed the Neighbors
Mrs. Evans screams alarmed the neighbors, they ran to her assistance, and the negro fled to the refuge of the post. That was the night of Aug. 12. The next day, accompanied by Mayor Coombs of Brownsville, Mr. Evans laid formal complaint before Major Penrose at Fort Brown.

Being a subpoena for a civilian before a court martial, the language of the paper is a request for attendance on the date and at the place named and it is specified that both Mr. and Mrs. Evans are wanted as witnesses for the prosecution. It is signed by Charles S. Hay Jr., captain and acting judge advocate for the department of Texas.

As manifesting the spirit of the negroes after the establishment of separate bars, Mr. Evans stated that it was not an uncommon thing to hear the
