

## **R. C. GILMORE INSTALLS NEW SPRINKLER-TYPE IRRIGATION** SYSTEM ON HIS FARM LOCATED IN THE COTTONWOOD COMMUNITY



A project that is being watched with more than casual interest by farmers and businessmen of this area, is the sprinkler-type irrigation system which has recently been installed on the farm of R. C. Gilmore, located just north of the Cottonwood community.

Gilmore, owner and operator of the Gilmore Automotive Service here, purchased the farm from Miss Missouri Strahan in August of last year and moved to Cross Plains from Snyder in September of last year. Shortly after buying the farm he purchased the former Copeland Garage building from Bill Copeland and opened the automotive. service firm.

When asked how he struck upon the idea of irrigating the farm, he stated that it came about through accident. While cleaning out an old well on the place he discovered that there was an "ocean" of water under the place at a very shallow depth.

After giving the matter considerable thought, he said that he engaged the services of his brother R. G. Gilmore, owner and operator of heavy dirt-moving equipment here, to move onto location with a clam shell and dig him a well to see if sufficient water was under-(Continued on back page)



3. Pattern of Farming.

In order to maintain residue on

the surface in cultivated land, spe-

cial tillage equipment is necessary.

To keep the residue on the surface,

subsurface tillage tools that loosen

and pulverize the soil without bury-

ing the residue are used. In order

to keep the residue on the surface

until the next crop is large enough

to protect the soil, both tillage and

planting operations must be done

without burying the residue.

This is the second in a series of articles on wind erosion. this information is prepared by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. II. Preventative Treatment.

1. Cover and litter. A minimum of 2,00 pounds of cover and litter per acre managed for

erosion control enables farmers and ranchers to farm and ranch at a profit.

Nature controls both wind erosion and water erosion by preserving a mulch on the land. When we try to understand the needs of nature and supply these needs, we will be rewarded with higher yields. Nature will take over much of the heavier work of raming by keeping the soil loose and permeable to water and roots, thus eliminating the necessity for some of the cultivation. When cultivation is needed it will be much easier in a soil that is in good

physical condition. Scientists and many farmers recognize mulch farming as one of the greatest techniques for holding soil. Mulch farming means working with mulch, raising crops through it, working the ground under it, but never working it under. Mulch farming, also called stubble farming, is a necessity on land that is subject to wind erosion and is being used more and more for the control of wind erosion. It has other values. It gets water into the soil and conserves it there. It slows evaporation of water from the soil. It prevents extreme changes in soil temperature, maintaining a temperature more favorable to plant

#### growth than is found in a bare soil. 2. Soil Conditioning. For maximum production soils must be kept in good physical condition and a high state of fertility. This probably is of even greater importance with mulch farming than with clean tillage practices. However, mulch farming can be managed in such a way that it will build up nitrogen, encourage activity of beneficial soil organisms, help control weeds and improve the

physical condition of the soil. Cover crops for mulch farming can be used to remove excess moisture. For example, vetch on the land to be followed by cotton will take a lot of moisture from the soil in the spring before cotton planting time. In a wet spring season







## J. A. Caton, Former **Businessman**, Dies In Dallas, Monday


