

345 CHILDREN VACCINATED IN FIVE COUNTY SCHOOLS

BAIRD — Mrs. Eulala Ault, R. N., County School Nurse, has reported that in the five schools in Callahan County, about 345 children have been vaccinated against smallpox, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and red measles in the past three months. Of this number, 280 were students in school and 65 were pre-school age children. In

school, vaccinations were given in selected grades.

Construction On FM Road Approved

AUSTIN — A contract for highway construction in the Abilene district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under supervision of District Engineer J. C. Roberts, and will be in Jones and Callahan Counties.

J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc., and Bailey Bridge Company, Inc., of Tye were awarded a contract for grading, structures, flexible base and two-course surface treatment of 5.7 miles of US Highway 180 and Farm to Market 604. Low bid was \$394,923.34.

The project is located at Clear Fork of the Brazos River and from 3.6 miles north of Clyde to the Shackelford County line. C. M. Kitchell of Abilene is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 180 working days.

After checking Mr. Bradford's house, Taylor went to Bradford's office and found him lying on the floor of a back room. A 30-30 rifle was lying next to his body.

Mr. Bradford was born July 24, 1902 in Palo Pinto County. He was a member of the State Legislature for two terms, 1934 to 1938. He was active in Little League and Teenage baseball and was instrumental in obtaining the Clyde Park which bears his name. Mr. Bradford was a 32nd degree Mason.

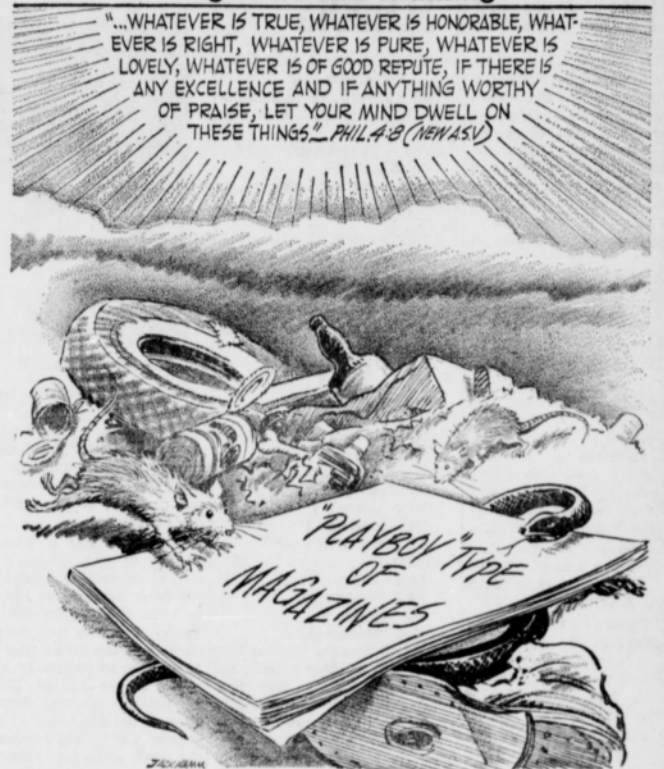

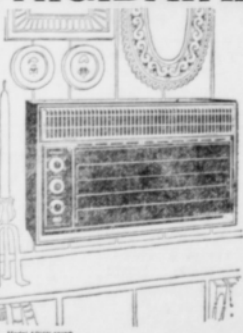

HISTORICAL TOUR OF COUNTY ENJOYED BY MANY SATURDAY

BAIRD — Members of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee and several guests toured the county last Saturday, May 16, visiting places where Historical Markers have been erected.

The tour was directed by B. C. Chrisman, County Chairman, who gave a history of the marker at each stop.

Assembling at the ranch home of Mrs. John Berry, north of Clyde, the group was served coffee and donuts, by Mrs. Berry, assisted by Mrs. A. E. Dyer Sr. and Mrs. Glen Elliott. Near the home is a marker for the Fort Phantom Hill Corn Road, so called because corn and other supplies were carried over this route to Fort Phantom Hill.

Leaving the Berry Ranch, the group stopped at the Jim Prew residence, one of the pioneer homes of Clyde. Proceeding to the Dudley Community, they saw the Bishop Garrett Monument, erected by the Masonic Lodge and the Episcopal Church to mark the spot where, in 1878, the first Episcopal Church service in West Texas was held by Rev. Garrett. This service was in the frontier home of Mr. and Mrs. John Trent, parents of the late Mrs. L. L. Blackburn.

Next stop was at Tecumseh Cemetery, near Oplin, where a plaque marks the grave of the first physician to practice in Callahan County, Dr. J. W. Windham.

Old Belle Plain was visited next, where a large monument gives the history of the first county seat at Belle Plain, and a more recently-erected marker tells of the Belle Plain College, which was in existence during the early 1890's. Also visited was

the former home of John D. Merchant, an early day merchant in that community.

After lunch in Baird, the trippers saw the former residence of Dr. John Collier, a pioneer educator and minister; the old rock jail which was moved "stone by stone" from Belle Plain to Baird not long after 1883; the granite monument on the courthouse lawn honoring James H. Callahan, and the Camp Pecan monument, also at the courthouse, honoring the "routier Guards" who protected settlers during the Civil War; and lastly the Presbyterian Church, organized in 1865, now housed in the oldest church building in the county.

Upon leaving Baird, the group stopped at Callahan City Cemetery, second oldest in the county, and then at the site of the old settlement, once, very briefly the county seat.

Next place visited was Cottonwood, where a marker stands at the location of Cottonwood Springs. The group also visited the home built by the late Dr. Griffin, and later occupied by a pioneer school teacher, the late H. S. Varner.

Final stop was at Treadway Park in Cross Plains, where a plaque marks the route of the Fort Mason - Camp Cooper Military Road, established before the Civil War, and said to have been traveled on several occasions by Lt. Col. Robert E. Lee.

and losing pitchers were Larry Windham and E. Hall.

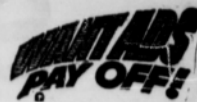
