## **Bayou Philosopher Comes Out With Improved** Commander Collins a Las Cruces, New Mex., businessman, will fly his Scoreboard To Take Guesswork From Football

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou disucsses football this week, which we doubt he has any business doing.

Dear editar: I know as much about football as I do Constitutional law or the life cycle of the boll weevil, but I've been noticing lately that more and more fans are coming away from football games each week unsatisfied with the results. At any given game, you know beforehand half the fans are gonna come away unhappy over

the outcome, and I never have figured out how an enterprise with > such odds against it could survive. On the other hand. most winters I've never figured out 1 how my cows could survive on the feed they've

got, but somehow they make it. A year or so ago I figured out a plan where both teams could

win, everybody could come away from a game feelin elated and the coachin profession wouldn't be any more hazardous than farmin, but I never got anywhere with it. I have been thinkin about football some more though-why shouldn't a farmer advise on football, everybody else advises farmers on farmin-and was interested in readin a situation up in the East a few Saturday ago. It seems the stadium time clock stopped during the middle of the game and the fans were almost helpless. Didn't know what down it was half the time, couldn't tell how

many yards to go for a first down,

and had a hard time finding out

angle I was thinking about is this: one thing football needs is more elaborate score boards, while at the same time they keep an ear cocked to hear the public announcer's voice tell who carried the ball, who made the tackle, what the penalty was for, where the ball is now resting, etc., but under the plan I've worked out it would not be necessary to watch the players at all. All you'd have to do is listen to the stadium roars and keep your eyes glued on the scoreboard. In addition to showing how many yards was just gained, what down it is, how many minutes left to play, etc. the scoreboard easily could be enlarged to show little moving electrical figures representing all the players on both sides, manipulated by experts in the press box, with each play accurately represented on the scoreboard, which would be in the form of a football field with yardage stripes across it,

The electrical sign business is at such an advanced stage that showing players running up and down on a scoreboard shouldn't be any trick at all to achieve.

If you think this idea has any merit. I offer it to you free.

By the way, I have another idea worked out to allow fans from both sides to come away from every game a lot more satisfied than they are now, and I'll write you about it next week in case you're interested. May do it anyway.

## Amendments **Change Social** Security Law

The 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act, signed into law by President Eisenhower recently will have a direct effect on almost every American family, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager of the Abilene district office of the Social Security Administration.

"Some of the changes take effect immediately," stated Tuley, 'and other changes will not become effective until January 1, 1955. This is the first of a series of informative articles prepared to acquaint the people of this area with just what the changes are and also what they are not."

All Social Security offices want this change to get as wide publicity as possible, trying to reach some 300,000 affected persons over the entire country. Widows and unmarried children under 18 of persons who died before September 1, 1950. can now be paid benefits previously denied, if the deceased had at least 6 quarters of coverage to his credit at the time of death after 1939. A quarter of coverage means being paid at least \$50 in wages for employment covered by the Social Security Act in a calendar quarter after December 31, 1936. Persons covered by Social Security

can receive credit of up to \$4200 per year, starting in 1955, towards future benefits instead of only \$3600 per year as had been the case since 1950, or \$3000 per year for years before 1951.

The coverage of Social Security will be expanded to cover more farm workers than before, more domestic employees than before, added self-employed groups such and on voluntary basis, ministers and Christian Science practitioners. Following articles in this series will give more details on the items mentioned above. Readers are urged to clip and save this article as a source of reference when the question of Social Security comes up later in family or other discussions. To get the most from one's own Social Security account, accurate information as to the things provided and not provided by the law is essential. There's just a little 'mis" between INFORMATION and MISINFORMATION, but that little difference might well serve to cost some family thousands of dollars.



## Winter Winds Pose **New Health Threat**

Austin-The cold winds of winter vill whip up a new threat to Texans' safety. The threat comes from carbon monoxide, which Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, characterizes as being invisible, odorless, and tasteless - but deadly. As cold weather draws near, the danger of carbon monoxide in the home or garage increases. Many people throughout the state are ighting poorly or faulty ventilated neaters and furnaces in their homes or running their cars in closed garages. Closed houses keep the cold out and the deadly fumes in. A few people live to tell about it because someone found them before it was too late. The burning of any fuel that contains carbon may produce carbon monoxide. This is true of coal, coke, wood, oil, kerosene, gasoline and such gaseous fuels as natural or manufactured gas. Last year 7 Texans died of carbon monoxide poisoning, two of them in automobiles. All heating equipment should be vented to a flue. Keep all rooms ventilated. Do not turn the heater higher than it was intended to run. Never leave gas heating appliances burning while you and your family are asleep. Regulate adjustable airmixing valves so that enough air is supplied to insure complete combustion of the gas. If a person is overcome by carbon monoxide they should first be removed to fresh air. In addition open windows and turn off the gas in the room. If the victim has stopped breathing, administer artificial respiration and if possible an inhalator should be used to administer oxygen. Keep the patient warm and lying down until a doctor comes.
