WASHINGTON, D. C.—Since the Congress adjourned last week, there is opportunity to catch up on a lot of "loose ends". There were a great many things which could not be done during the last weeks of a very hectic session. Most everything which could be put off during this period must be done now.

It will be towards the end of this month of August before I will return to my Congressional District.

It is encouraging to note that the Commissioner of Narcotics reports a steady decline in the users of drugs.

When the first Narcotics Control Law was passed in 1909, one out of every 400 Americans was a drug addict. Today the figure stands at one in 3,000, which means a total of about 60,000 addicts in this country. The increase in drug addicts among adolescents sharply increased following World War II and reached a peak in 1951.

A Senate Judiciary Subcommittee is now studying ways to strengthen our Narcotic Control Law. The Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives is to conduct a study between now and the first of the year to find ways to prevent illegal narcotics from coming into the United States.

Water conservation will continue to be high on the list of important legislation during the next session of Congress. Not too long ago, only people in areas of scarce rainfall were critically aware of the situation. The entire country now has a concern.

With our growth of population and the increasing use of water, we are now at a stage where there is, in certain areas, severe competition for supplies.

The demand for water will increase with every step in the growth of our population and every step of our scientific discoveries and inventions. Industrial needs are expected to rise in the next twenty years by 130 billion gallons per day; domestic consumption by 7 billion gallons per day.

At the same time, water is being withdrawn at the rate of 180 billion gallons per day, and sewage and industrial waste are being discharged into streams, lakes, and coastal waters.

In 1824 Congress first appropriated funds for constructing water improvements. Between then and 1954 the Federal Government appropri-

ated about \$143 billion for water resource projects. Of this sum appropriated, about \$9.5 billion has been spent since 1941. In addition, projects now authorized will cost about \$18.5 billion. Projects being discussed would bring the total to over \$70 billion.

The day is here when there must be a clearly stated national water policy. It is the fault of the Congress that there are overlapping agencies and activities dealing with this vital natural resource. There must be a clarification of responsibility if a job for the future is to be done.

We often hear about the enormous cost of the farm price support programs. Officials of the Department of Agriculture show that during the 22-year period of the farm price support system, the total cost has been 60 cents per person per year.

The cost of supporting the six basic commodities (corn, wheat, cotton, peanuts, tobacco, and rice) has been 11 cents per person per year.

Among the relics discovered in the tombs of the pharaohs of Ancient Egypt were some records of the pharaohs' advisers. Some of the titles found were: "Advisor to the King", "Close Advisor to the King", "Only Close Advisor to the King", and "Only Real Close Advisor to the King."

Comments around Washington have been that those titles sound somewhat familiar today. For instance, at the White House there is an "Assistant to the President", a "Deputy Assistant to the President", and "Assistant to the Assistant to the President, and two "Assistants to the Deputy Assistant to the President."

AREA OIL NEWS

A Caddo discovery completed seven miles north of Cross Plains was placed in the regular field. It is J. E. Cohnally, et al, of Abilene No. 1 J. T. Hewes, G. Padillo Survey 4.

Daily pumping potential was 40.17 barrels of oil and 40 percent water from 2,964-72 and 3,000-04 feet.

N. M. Dillard, et al, of Cross Plains No. 2 Jackson & McClure was spotted four miles west of Cross Plains in the McGraw (Cross Plains Sand) Field. Having a proposed depth of 1,700 feet with rotary, it spots 270 feet from the north and 685 feet from the east lines of Block 96, Comal CSL Survey 181.

Spotted in the same field was J. K. Dobbs of Fort Worth No. 3 J. L. Baum. The 1,300-foot rotary try is 250 feet from the north and west lines of the east - half in Montgomery Survey 853.

Completed in the regular field one mile north of Cross Cut was Howard King, et al, of Abilene No. 1 Willie E. Koenig, W. B. Travis Survey 148.

Daily potential was 62 barrels of 43 gravity oil and 20 per cent water. It is pumping from 24 perforations on 1,392-97 feet with the casing set on bottom at 1,430 feet.

Completed in the McGraw (Cross Plains Sand) Field was N. M. Dillard, et al, of Cross Plains No. 1 Jackson & McClure, four miles west of Cross Plains in Block 96, Comal CSL Survey 181.

Daily potential was 91.2 barrels of 42.3 gravity oil, flowing through a 13-64-inch choke with packer on casing and 150 pounds on tubing. Flow was from 49 perforations at 1,579-89 feet. Casing was set on bottom at 1,610 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 200-1.
