# Friona Flashbacks

## 40 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 9, 1932

Friona schools opened Monday with total enrollment of 550. There were 198 in high school on the opening day, and 352 in the grade school, making a total of 550, or an increase of 50 over last year's total enrollment.

Coach Bill Stevens of Friona High School reports that he has about a half hundred good husky boys who are aspirants for the 1932-33 football squad.

Mrs. Bertha Harry, Merle and Ruth moved to Lubbock Saturday evening, where they will remain at least during the coming term of school.

## 30 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 4, 1942

Both the Lakeview grade and high school students will attend the Friona schools this year. The trustees of the Lakeview school district called a mass meeting of the patrons of that school for a discussion of the teacher situation and the state aid set-up of the district, and when it was learned that they could not maintain a two-teacher school, they voted to bring all pupils of the district to the Friona school this year. One additional teacher was required in the grade school in order to take care of the added enrollment.

## 20 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 4, 1952

First load of 1952 milo was delivered last Thursday August 28th at the Santa Fe Grain Company. N.A. Curry brought in the load of over 9,000 pounds, receiving \$3.00 per hundred. Curry farms west of Friona on the former Lonnie Baxter farm.

Twenty-seven Friona FFA members, with director J.T. Gee, have returned from a trip through New Mexico and Colorado, spending nights at Cannon City, Salida, Denver, Colorado Springs and Raton.

## 10 YEARS AGO--SEPTEMBER 6, 1962

Construction work started Tuesday on a farm-to-market road connecting Parmer and Deaf Smith County highways. The new road will begin on State Highway 214 six miles north of Friona, and will extend north and east 7.951 miles to FM Highway 1058, connecting Friona with the "Harrison Highway," which runs east and west in Deaf Smith County. Sunday evening at 7 p.m., Rev. Ervin A. Binger will be installed as pastor at Immanuel Lutheran Church in the Rhea Community.

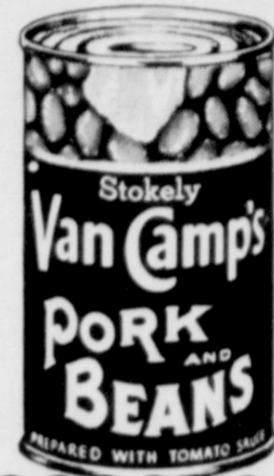

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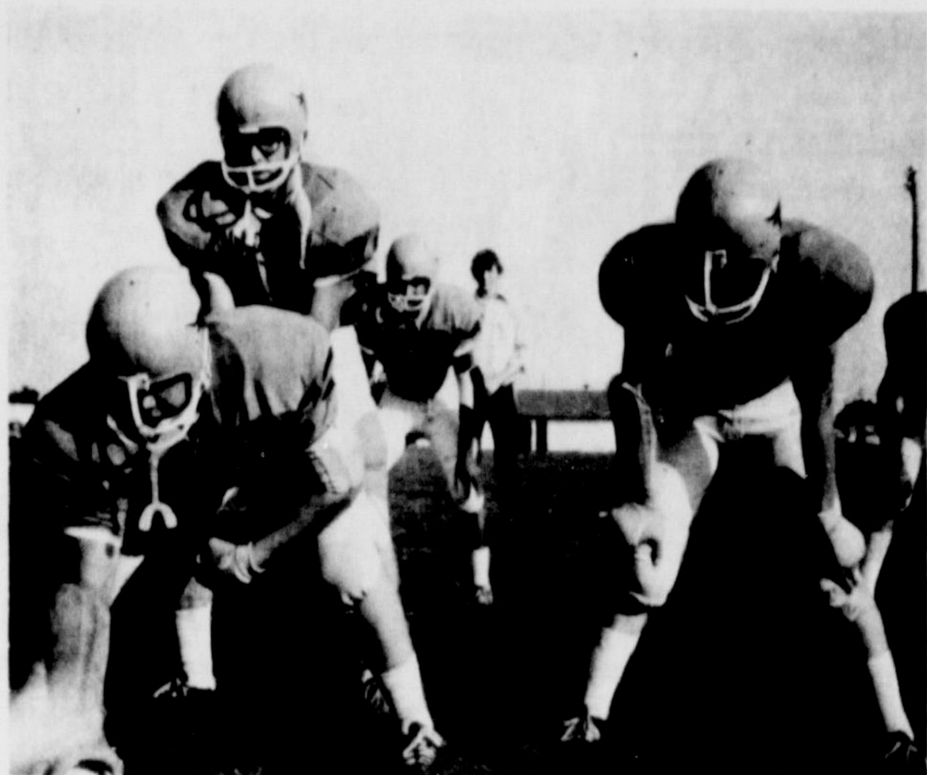

Barber, another senior, is a very dangerous runner. He is also described as one of the better broken field runners on the team.

Mike Winders - Senior guard Winders is filling in for Cox. He is a fine, quick player with a lot of desire.

Doyle Weir - a senior tackle, Weir is our most outstanding lineman. He looked real good Friday in our scrimmage with Bovina.

Donnie Coker - A senior end, he is our smallest player, but he is one of the toughest.

Bart Burnett - Sophomore end Burnett is inexperienced, but he has a lot of desire. He, too, will see a lot of action.

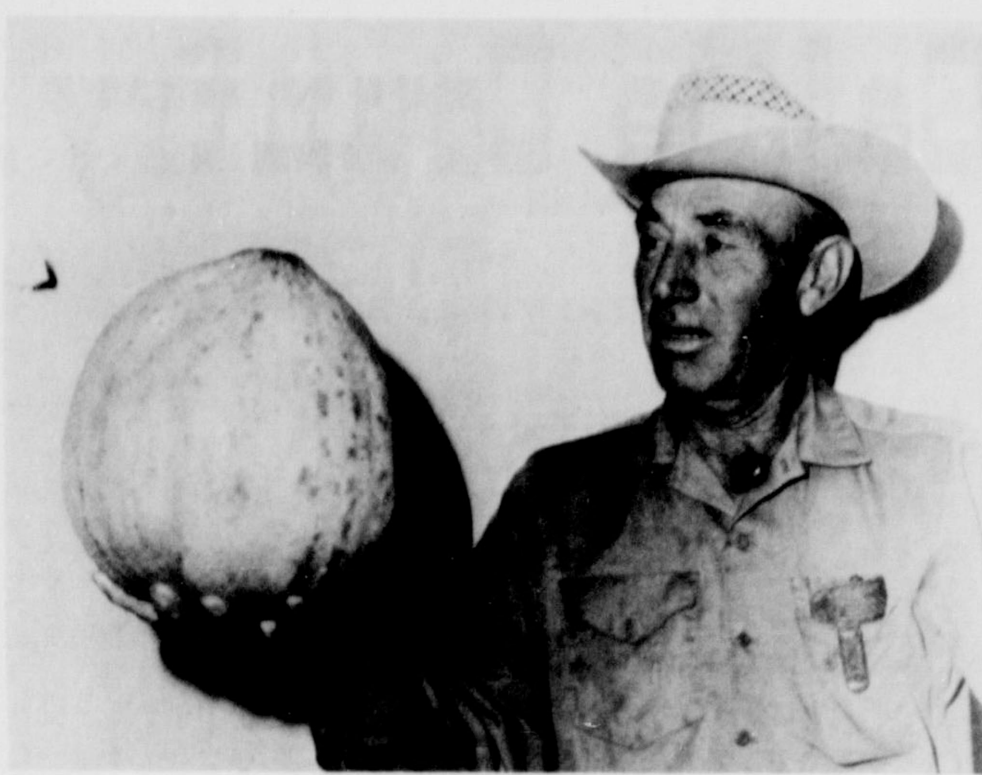
Danny Clark - This sophomore is running in a new position as quarterback. We feel as soon as he gets some experience he will be a good quarterback.

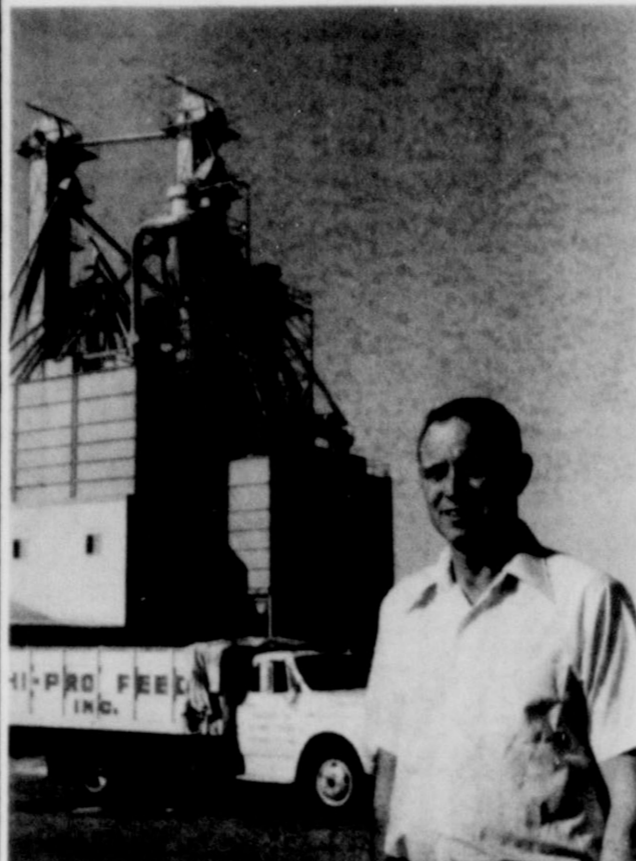

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## Hi-Pro Feeds Features Modern Feeding Concept

When Hi-Pro Feeds says it has the most modern feed mill in the country, it's not just an idle statement dreamed up for advertising purposes.

Not only does the company have some of the most up-to-date mixing equipment available, but it also makes use of an in-house computer which tells their customer which ingredients to use for the best nutrient content as well as those which will yield them the top value for their money.

And last but not least, Hi-Pro has a staff of professionals who know their business inside out, who work full time toward making sure the information fed to the computers is correct and timely from a cost standpoint.

Hi-Pro Feeds opened here in September of 1967 with veterinary supplies. Its mill was completed and used for the first time in May of 1969. The company now has five veterinary supply offices. Other outlets are located in Etter, Abilene, Texarkana and Garden City, Kansas.

The company employs approximately 55, of which 45 are employed at the Friona location. Hi-Pro serves the area with mixed feed. Their primary business is mixing feedlot supplements, serving the feedlots of the Friona area.

The mill is literally one of the most modern to be found in the United States, operated by IBM punch cards. Everything is put in the mill on a quality control basis.

Hi-Pro's mill covers about 13,000 square feet of space on the eastern edge of Friona. The company's office covers another 4,500 square feet. The company's annual payroll is in excess of \$375,000 per year.

Ron Davenport, 37, is general manager of Hi-Pro. With a B.S. from New Mexico State University and a M.S. from Colorado State, both in animal science, Ron is well qualified in the area of feedlot supplements. He spent two years on the faculty at Texas Tech University's School of Agriculture prior to taking the position at Hi-Pro.

Dr. Dale Furr is the nutritionist at Hi-Pro Feeds. Dr. Furr, who received his PhD from Oklahoma State University in nutrition, was added to the local staff in May of 1969. He formerly was in charge of the Texas Tech research station at Pantex.

Dr. Furr's primary job is to figure the "least cost ration" as a service to Hi-Pro customers, determining the best rations from a nutritional standpoint at the most economical price.

Dr. Furr says the computer, which was installed as an additional customer service the first part of this year, is proving to be quite a time saver in figuring the best possible rations for the company's customers.

Data is fed into the computer on each of Hi-Pro's customers. Each customer has a specific number, and they each have a "separate memory bank" in the computer.

Each possible ingredient is fed into the machine as to its (1) nutrient composition, (2) cost factor and (3) nutrient specifications. On a typical least-cost formulation, the computer can supply from 60,000 to 80,000 comparisons in eight to ten seconds.

Without the computer, it would take several months using regular calculators, to come up with these com-

parisons, Dr. Furr says.

There is space in the computer for 2,047 ingredients.

Information is fed into the computer by means of a keyboard, which resembles a standard electric typewriter keyboard.

The computer has three component parts: a visual screen, the computer itself and a printer, which supplies a printed record of the solutions, if such is required.

The system gives an approximate price for a given ration, with a high and a low range. It also tells the company what it can afford to pay for grain.

"Least you think our operation is entirely mechanical, I should point out that a person still has to decide if a particular ration is going to be palatable to the cattle. This is included in the ingredient restrictions which will limit certain ingredients to a maximum percentage per ton," Dr. Furr points out.

The nutritionist is available to work with anyone that Hi-Pro sells to, either as a nutritionist, or as a consultant to feedlot nutritionists.

Hi-Pro also has its own consulting veterinarian, who is Dr. Bud Farr. Keith Black works with inventory control for the mill, another factor which the computer keeps current, with each batch of feed which is mixed, those totals come off the company inventory.

If you haven't ever visited Hi-Pro, it would be worth your time to come see their operation, whether you are a potential customer or not. We think you will be impressed.

## Chiefs Tie Eagles In Tough Scrimmage Tilt

The Friona Chieftains and the Canyon Eagles hooked up in a pre-season scrimmage game that ended in a standoff for both teams last Friday at Chieftain Field.

Each team scored one touchdown each in the varsity scrimmage, while in the B-team scrimmage, the local team outscored the visitors, twice to none.

Canyon, which fielded a big team, moved swiftly to the first score of the session, in about five plays in their first possession. However, for the rest of the workout, the Chieftain defense played respectable, and shut out the Eagles.

Scott Lillard, playing in a halfback position, gave Friona its score in the Chiefs' second series on offense, sprinting 50 yards down the west sideline with a pitchout.

In the team's first series with the football, halfback James Bartlett had run about 35 yards with a pitchout before being tackled. That was the highlight of that particular series.

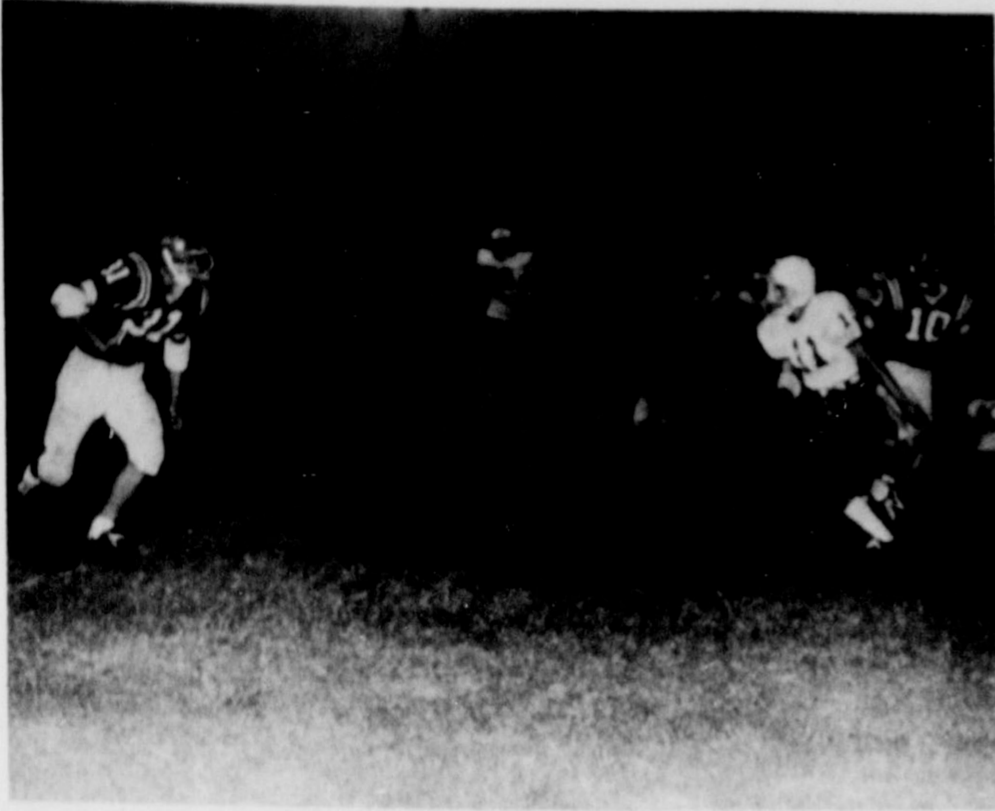
On the team's final possession, the team moved the ball down to about the Canyon 20 before failing to make a first down, and the ball was moved back downfield.

"We were fairly pleased with portions of the scrimmage. There were areas where we thought we could have done better, but considering the fact that Canyon is as big as they are, I suppose we did all right," was Coach Bob Owen's reaction to the scrimmage.

Owen pointed out that with the exception of Lillard's touchdown run and one or two other nice gains, the Canyon defense pretty well crushed Friona's offensive attack.

"There was some pretty good hitting going on, by both sides," Owen concluded.

The game was played in cool, damp weather, following a shower of the night before which had left the field somewhat damp. The game conditions were more like those you'd expect for late in the season, due to the coolness, rather than a pre-season scrimmage.

# Wildcats Picked To Win; Friona Second

The alignment has been changed, but the team at the top could be the same as last year as District 3-AA starts into the 1972 football season.

District 3-AA teams, without other schools from over the state of Texas, jump into the football waters this weekend, and expected to lead the league is the same one which led a year ago: Littlefield.

The Wildcats of coach Jerry Blakely have been nominated for repeat honors in the eyes of opposing district coaches. The decision was unanimous among the other four coaches in the league.

The poll of coaches showed a closeness, too. The voting found Friona finishing second in the preseason voting, followed by Morton, Dimmitt and Olton finished in a deadlock for the fourth spot.

Last year, the district was larger. The eight-team league lost three members, however, when the Interscholastic League realigned for this fall. Leaving for a newly formed District 4-AA were Floydada, Lockney and Abernathy.

Last year, Floydada and Littlefield shared the title with Littlefield advanced to the playoffs via a first-down margin over the Whirlwinds.

The two teams struggled to a 0-0 standoff on the field last November, and penetrations were even, so the decision went down to first downs. And Littlefield had an edge there, 13-9, and the game went into the record books as a victory for Littlefield.

Returning from that championship team are 14 lettermen, with two of them starting on offense and five on defense.

Gone are such standouts as Ralph Funk, Matt Giles, and Dennis Hartley, but returning is tailback J.E. Johnson (185) who was a halfback last year. Johnson is expected to carry most of the running load for the Wildcats, just as Funk shouldered that responsibility last year. Funk (now on the Baylor University varsity) scored 150 points and rushed for over 1700 yards and was a second team all-state selection.

Friona's Bob Owen has quarterback Johnny Bandy on hand

to direct his attack. Friona could be the league's most improved team, with six offensive and defensive regulars back from last year's 3-6-1 team.

Fullback Mario Perea, a member of a talented football family, and halfback James Bartlett could furnish most of the running power in coach Owen's I-formation.

Doug Reed, coach at Morton, lost only five lettermen from the 1971 squad and has eight Indians on hand with starting experience. Depth could be a problem, although 16 lettermen on hand. Coach Reed has shuffled some personnel to strengthen the team.

Last year, the Indians' backfield was experienced, but this time, the veterans are congregated in the line. The Indians get their tests early, as they take on state-ranked Tulla on September 15.

Olton reaches that testing level earlier, playing Tulla in Friday's opener. Tulla is dropping a level from Class AAA this fall.

Olton has seven offensive and defensive regulars back from last year's 4-5-1 team. However, missing will be quarter-

back Steve Stockdale, whose passing was good for 270 completions in his schoolboy career. On hand, however, is hard-running fullback Keith Workman, a 200-pounder who has been starting since his sophomore season.

Expected to step into Stockdale's quarterbacking shoes is junior letterman Vic Alcorn, who lettered in the secondary a year ago.

Dimmitt coach Brown L. Smith could locate only one offensive and defensive starter from last year, but the offensive returnee is quarterback Terry Powell, a 145-pound senior.

Seven lettermen return as coach Smith rebuilds his I-formation offense. Successful B-team (5-4) and freshman (7-2) squads will furnish help for the Bobcats.

This weekend, all five teams get into the opening competition, with Littlefield playing at Class A Silverton. Dimmitt opens at home, hosting Class AAA Muleshoe. Olton's battle with Tulla will be on home soil, and Morton goes against Springlake-Earth, also at home. Friona will have to go to Farwell for its opener.

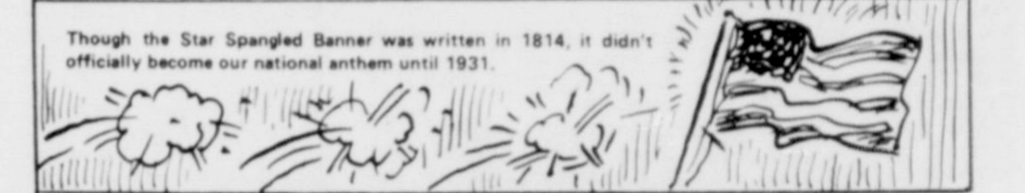
Agent-Tom Jarboe; Safety Officer-Dr. Robert Alexander; Umpire-In-Chief-Waymon Wilkins.

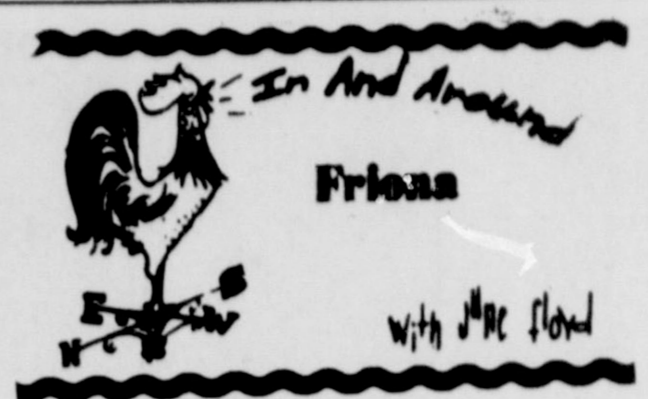

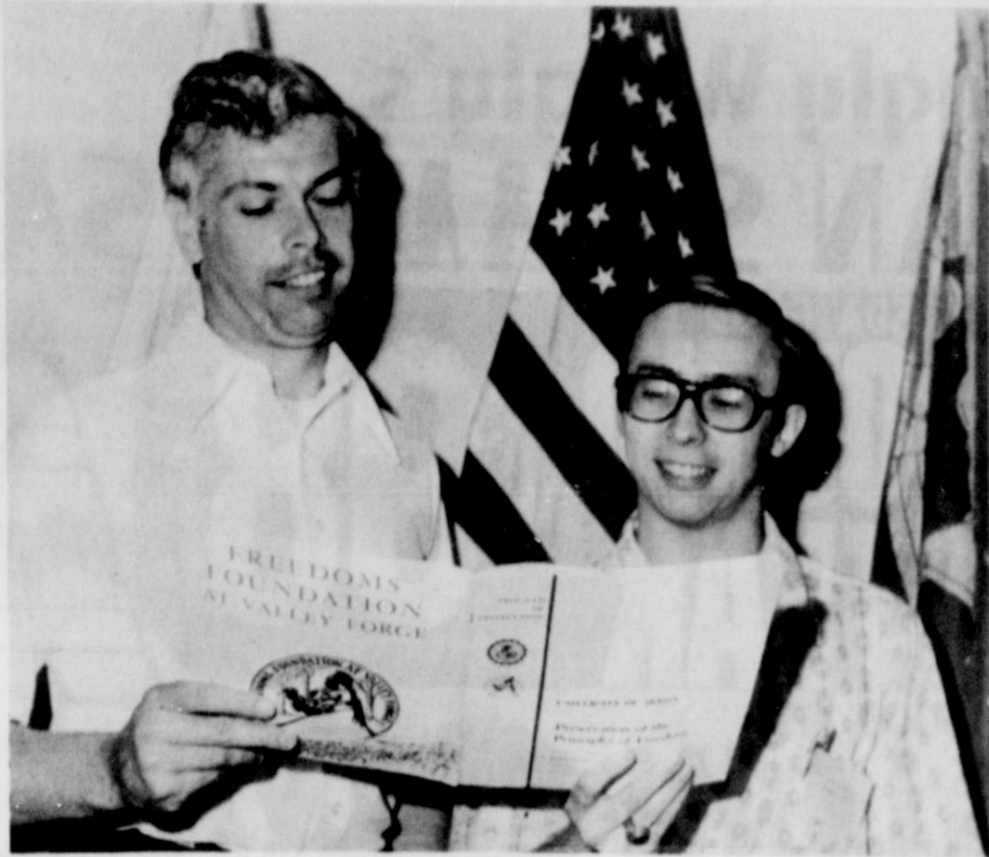
