County Democrats Endorse Sen. Lyndon Johnson As Delegation Head

County Democratic Chairmen To Meet At Baird Monday

A meeting of all Precinct chairmen will be held Monday, May 14, at 10:00 a. m. in Baird city hall, according to an announcement made this week by Tom B. Barton, Chairman of the Callahan County Democratic Executive Committee.

In speaking of the meeting, Chairman Barton stated that a great deal of important business must be transacted and he urges all chairmen to be present.

Callahan County Democrats in session at Baird Tuesday afternoon voted unanimous support of Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, both as a favorite son for president of the United States and to head the Texas delegation at the national democratic convention.

Johnson forces were unopposed. No resolutions of the Governor Allan Shivers forces, which were offered in several precinct conventions, came for consideration. Ben L. Russell, Baird merchant,

was named chairman of the convention and appointed committees as follows:

Credentials: Dale Giasson, Baird, chairman, Alton Hornsby, Cross Plains, and Joe South, Clyde.

Resolutions: E. H. Freeland, Baird, chairman; Paul V. Harrell, Cross Plains, and Charley Coats, Cottonwood.

Nominations: Mr. S. L. McElroy, Baird, chairman; A. J. McCuin, Cross Plains, and Homer (Blondy) McIntosh.

Giasson's committee recommended that everyone present be seated as a delegate, however, representatives sent to the state convention be from the group of precinct delegates elected to the county meeting.

Upon recommendation of the nominating committee Joe South, of Clyde, Freeland of Baird, and Harrell of Cross Plains were named voting delegates to the state convention. Named alternates were: L. W. Detrick, Denton Valley, L. B. Maynard, Putnam, and Raymond Young, Baird.

Present at the meeting to observe government-in-action were H. B. Jeffries, Baird high school faculty member, and students of his civics class.

H. C. Cotton, Clyde delegate and veteran Democrat, addressed the convention briefly and paid tribute to the boys and girls for their manifested desire to learn of the mechanics of government of the country which they must one day run.

Randal C. Jackson, Baird attorney, A. J. McCuin, Cross Plains, Harrell and Freeland also lauded the group and the instructor for bringing them.

Delegates to the County convention, held at Baird, Tuesday of this week, were: Jack McCarty, Paul Harrell, Alton Hornsby, W. T. McClure, T. O. Powell and A. J. McCuin. The delegates were instructed to vote as a unit on all questions arising at the county meeting.

Local Shivers forces made no attempt to name a slate of delegates and did not offer any resolutions at the local convention.

Being a student of the solutions people all over the country are offering for the farm problem, on the theory it's interesting and comforting to know others are thinking about you, whether their ideas are worth anything or not, I'm naturally on the alert for new ideas along this line.

And the other day I ran across what I thought at first was going to be a wonderful idea. According to this one, put out by a city newspaper writer, everybody knows the farmer is caught in a cost-price squeeze and the way for him to work out of it is through part-time farming.

According to him, part-time farming is the answer, and I was fixing to write him a letter congratulating him on his idea, when I kept on reading. It wasn't what I thought it was at all.

"Part-time farming is the answer," he said, then explained that what he meant was farmers could whip their problem of shirking income by taking a job in town,

working eight hours there, then rushing home and getting in their farming after hours and on Saturdays.

That doesn't strike me as part-time farming. What it looks like to me is full-time working and overtime farming.

It's nothing new to me to know that I could go to town and get a job. I've known for years, a solution, to the farm problem that requires me to work twice as hard as I am now is no solution as far as I am concerned.

If this country is ever going to get rid of the farm surplus, the farmers are going to have to farm less, which suits me fine, but what they do with the rest of their time is none of any city newspaper writer's business.

I don't know whether there's a solution to the farm problem or not, I doubt it, but doubling my work load to do it is one of the most radical ideas I ever heard of.

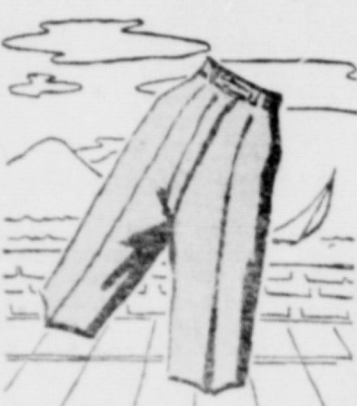
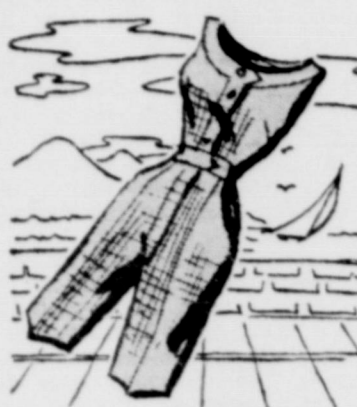

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Fort Worth—Spring lambs topped at \$27 at Fort Worth Monday, the highest level since May, 1964; spring lambs scored a \$22 top, the best of the year for old crop lambs. Early estimates called for 11,000 sheep and lambs, but this figure had been passed by mid morning as late arrivals continued to come in. With less than 24,000 sheep estimated at the nation's 12 major markets Monday, the supply here was more than 50 per cent of the total offered around the major marketing circle. Feeders and older sheep sold fully steady, while slaughter lambs were \$1 or more higher.

Cattle and calves were generally steady to strong, with stocker classes unevenly higher. Hogs sold 5 cents lower and topped at \$15.25.

Good and choice Spring lambs cashed at \$20 to \$27, and cull to medium lambs sold from \$14 to \$20. Stocker Spring lambs sold from \$7 down. Shorn slaughter lambs of good and choice grades sold from \$17 to \$22, and cull to medium old crop lambs sold from \$12 to \$16.50. Stocker and feeder shorn lambs sold from \$16 down. Old ewes drew \$4 to \$5, and some breeding ewes sold from \$7 to \$8 with yearling ewes well above that range. Inquiry on breeding lambs was the most broad of the season, and supplies were very limited. Old bucks sold from \$4 to \$4.50.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$16.50 to \$20.50, and common to medium offerings cleared at \$12 to \$16. Fat cows sold from \$11 to \$13, and canners and cutters at \$7 to \$11. Bulls drew \$10 to \$14.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$17 to \$21, and common and medium butcher calves sold from \$14 to \$16.50. Cull sold from \$11 to \$13.

Good to choice stocker calves cashed at \$17 to \$19, and steer yearlings ranged from \$17.50 downward. Stocked cows sold from \$10 to \$13.

Choice meat type butcher hogs desirable weights and kinds sold topped at \$15 to \$15.25 and less from \$11 to \$14.50. Sows drew \$9 to \$12. Stags sold from \$5 to 6.

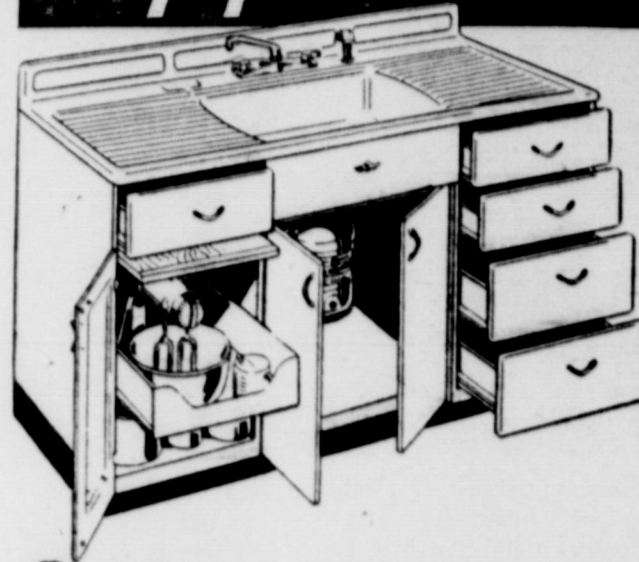

Highway Patrolmen Sought
Careers as state highway patrolmen now are open for men between 21 and 35 years of age.

A 200-man increase in the patrol was authorized by the last legislature. State-wide examinations of candidates to bring the corps up to full strength will be held in June.

Applicants must have lived in Texas for a year, have a high school education or equivalent and be in perfect physical condition.

Application forms may be obtained at any district office or by writing W. J. Elliott, chief of the Texas Highway patrol, Austin.

Sheffield Trial Moved
Brady Land Dealer B. R. Sheffield won the first round in his fight against the veterans land sale charges against him. Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts agreed that Sheffield could not get a fair trial in Travis County and granted a change of venue.

Employment followed the general trend. This, despite drought-crippled farm activity. Latest figures show 2,248,200 wage earners in March. That is 115,000 more than for March of last year.

Politics Is Boiling
In bitter precinct battles, Gov. Allan Shivers lost the first skirmish of his long political career. Sen. Lyndon Johnson led all the way in the rural areas. He also won in San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth and Austin. Of the metropolitan centers, Dallas alone went for Shivers.

Just as the rural vote cost Ralph Yarborough the governorship in 1954, so did the small towns defeat Shivers in 1956. In the final analysis, it was the Country Boy's vote that was the hub of victory.

Farmers Get New Hope
Farmers over the wide areas of Texas are full of optimism. Long-awaited rains, the heaviest in years, fell in North, Central and East Texas.

However, even where it rained, substantial moisture facilities have not been wiped out. But to many farmers the wonderful rains that finally came made them look forward to a good year.

Sanford Cleared By Court
A decision with far-reaching effect on political advertising expenditures has been handed down by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The decision was made in connection with an application of Vernon T. Sanford, Texas Press Association manager, for relief from two indictments returned against him by a McClellan Co. Grand Jury. Indictments charged he had violated the Texas Election Code by spending more than \$25 for political advertising in behalf of Ben Ramsey for Lt. Governor in 1954.

Sanford and the TPA Board of Directors contended that any law which limits an individual to a \$25 expenditure prohibits freedom of expression and therefore is unconstitutional.

In reviewing the matter, the court found that two laws on the same subject were in direct conflict. Each limited advertising to widely different amounts and set different penalties. Therefore both were declared invalid.

Result: Charges against Sanford were dismissed and Texas now has no applicable law regarding political advertising expenditures by an individual.

Labor Law At Stake
Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd was forced into the role of comprehensive spectator in the fight to save Texas' right-to-work law.

He asked, but was refused, U. S. Supreme Court permission to be heard. He did, however, lend moral support and advice as Nebraska's attorney general argued in the high court for his state's law.

Nebraska, like Texas and 16 other states, has an anti-closed shop law which unions contend is in conflict with the National Railway Act.

Reason for Shepperd's apprehension is the general belief that Nebraska's case is weaker than the Texas case, which still is tied up in state court.

Vehicle Tax Voided
Special local automobile taxes to finance big city freeway projects are unconstitutional. So ruled the Texas Supreme Court in a case involving Harris County's auto registration tax.

Such taxes must be levied by general laws, said the court.

Dallas County made two tries for such a tax, but voters turned down the proposals.

Hugh Road Program Planned
A whopping \$150,000,000 road program for 1957-58 is planned by the State Highway Commission.

Anticipation of substantially increased federal funds is behind the ambitious project. Since House passage, approval of the new federal aid bill is regarded as virtually certain.

About half of the 2,161 miles of highway designated for construction work will be of the "super highway" type—four, six and eight lanes.
