MBP-Southwest Cattle Set Stock Exchange

A stock for stock exchange between Missouri Beef Packers Inc. and Southwest Feed Yards Inc. of Deaf Smith County has been announced by David La Fleur, MBP Amarillo president.

La Fleur said a letter of intent has been entered with the feed yard and provides that the proposed stock for stock

exchange is subject to the approval of the shareholders of Missouri Beef and to certain other conditions.

Bill Gentry, president of Southwest Feed Yards said that with the stock exchange, the operation of the feed yard will remain the same, with the same name. The present

general manager will be retained and a local board will continue operations as has been the general practice in the past.

Gentry said Southwest Feed Yards has 41 stockholders in the Hereford area, and that most of the stockholders reside in Hereford.

"We have had a gradual continual growth since starting with about a 20,000-head capacity in 1969," said Charles Hoover, general manager of Southwest, "and we plan to continue to use as many supplies and materials as possible from our own community."

Missouri Beef is listed on the American Stock Exchange. In a report issued last week, Missouri Beef announced re-

Three Men Charged After Tri-County Vandalism Spree

With the arrest of three area young men, the Friona High School vandalism case was termed "closed" by Sheriff Charlie Lovelace.

On the night of April 16, Friona High School had several thousand dollars in damage from vandalism which ranged from the school gym and cafeteria through the tax office.

A trail of broken glass, smashed pictures, slashed

furniture and smashed desks and office equipment showed a clearly marked path by the vandals.

Charged with the damage were cousins from Dimmitt, both 17 years of age and a 20 year old man, also from Dimmitt. Willie Lopez and Frank Lopez were released on \$1,000 bond, and the third man, Armando Davila, is in custody in Pomona, Calif. awaiting

extradition to face the multiple charges.

Sheriff Lovelace commented, "We have statements from the two Lopez boys, and they implicate Davila in at least five incidents in Parmer County."

"Davila was said to be the leader of the group," continued the sheriff.

Also cleared with the arrests were vandalism of the Lazbuddie school on April 30, and an April 26 rampage in Bovina, during which time three different companies were entered and vandalized.

At the Lazbuddie school, approximately \$100 in cash was taken, along with two speakers. From Friona High School, three flags, a radio and other minor items were stolen at the time of the vandalism. Sheriff Lovelace said the items were recovered.

"The damage was tremendous," added Sheriff Lovelace, "not much was stolen, but the damage was real bad, not only in Friona, but also Bovina and Lazbuddie."

"It looked like one of the worst damaged places was the

Charter For City Bank Is Declined

Stockholders interested in organizing a second bank for Friona were advised this week that their charter application for the Texas Bank, heard last April 25 before the State Department of Banking, was declined on May 16.

According to Leroy Johnson and Hollis Horton, spokesmen for the organizers, the banking board found that (1) "No public necessity exists for the proposed bank; and (2) "The volume of business in the community did not indicate profitable operation of the proposed bank."

"We are disappointed that the board did not see fit to grant the charter. We appreciate the support and encouragement we received from Friona residents," the local spokesmen said.

"We are still convinced that Friona is entitled to and would support a second banking institution. However, we were unable to convince the authorities in Austin of this need," they continued.

It was understood that of eight charter applications acted on by the State Department of Banking, six were approved, and two were turned down.

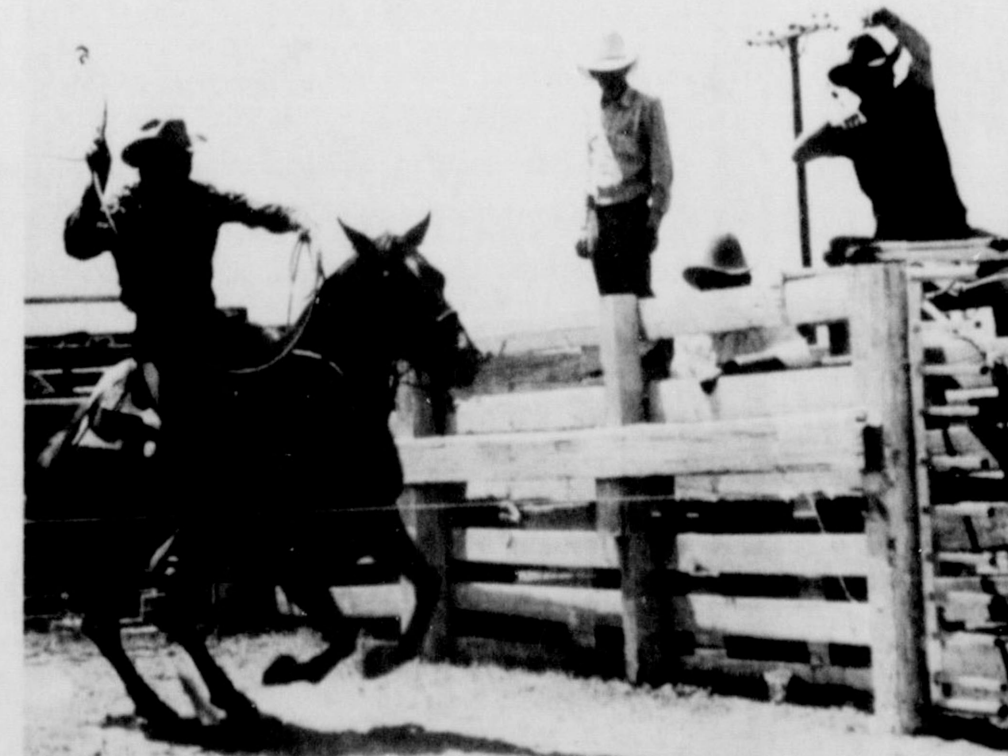
Father To Be Chosen

Friona Woman Wreck Victim

A 10 p.m. wreck Sunday night, just more than 3.6 miles east of Friona on FM2397 has left 16 year old Mary Salcido of Friona in critical condition in the intensive care unit at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Mrs. Salcido was a passenger in a late model vehicle driven by her husband, Donaciano Salcido, when the vehicle swerved out of control after hitting the soft shoulder of the pavement.

The vehicle overturned one and one-half times, partially throwing Mrs. Salcido from the upside down car. Passersby helped police and an ambulance driver lift the car from Mrs. Salcido so she could be taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona for emergency treatment.

Immediately following emergency treatment, she was transferred to the Amarillo hospital where she is being treated for severe head injuries.

Uninjured in the accident were Mrs. Salcido's husband and four month old daughter, Jeannie Rebecca.

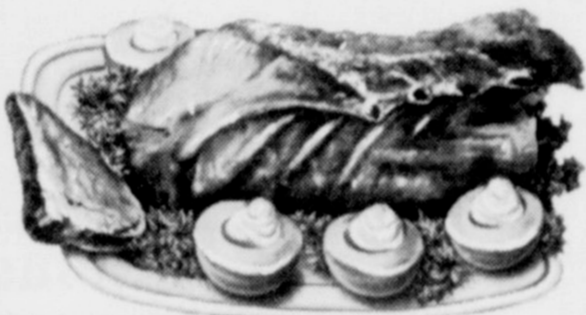



Soil Stewardship Special Week Set

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's obligation to God as stewards of the soil, water, and other resources, will be observed, May 27-June 3, according to Leon Grissom, Chairman, Parmer County Conservation District. "Changing Challenges," the theme of this year's observance, invites you to increase your understanding, expand your perspective, and consider your responsibility to the challenges and changes of the world around you.

The Parmer County Conservation District and some 3,000 companion Districts throughout the nation along with their State and National Associations are sponsoring the event for the 18th consecutive year.

Among the local events scheduled for Soil Stewardship Week are special programs in area churches and for civic groups. The Parmer County Conservation District will distribute upon request to churches of all faiths, attractive program blanks, bulletin inserts, posters, and booklets

created particularly for this year's observance.

In our own land it has met an evident need of the people to set aside a week each year to acknowledge before God our gratitude for His gifts of soil and all the bountiful resources associated with it. The week has become a special time to remind all people that these gifts warrant their best in Christian stewardship.

In America, the soil stewardship observance has always traced its origins to the Rogation Days. Throughout parts of the South, earlier in this century, churches and their congregations began to set aside the fifth Sunday after Easter as Soil and Soul Sunday. Subsequently, this became Soil Stewardship Sunday when, in 1946, the publishers of Farm and Ranch Magazine suggested to religious leaders in a few southern states that one Sunday be set aside each year to remind their congregations of man's duty to be a good steward of the land.

The response of clergymen and laymen was so warm and widespread that observance of Soil Stewardship Sunday spread steadily to additional states. In 1954, the publishers of the magazine suggested to the officers of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts that a still wider observance of Soil Stewardship Sunday could aid significantly in bringing about a national awakening and recognition of man's obligations to the Lord's earth. The publishers offered to relinquish their limited sponsorship of Soil Stewardship Sunday to the Association.

The Association accepted, and beginning in 1955 undertook to encourage a nationwide observance a mission to which it has dedicated itself ever since, under the guidance of a special Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee of clergymen representing many of the country's religious denominations. In 1956, recognizing possible conflicts with the observance of Rural Life Sunday, which was on the calendar of many churches, Soil Stewardship Sunday was changed to Soil Stewardship Week—beginning with the fifth Sunday after Easter and continuing through the sixth.

Clayton Against Marijuana Bill

The bill as passed by the House to reduce penalties for possession of marijuana could let some dope pushers out of prison and back on the streets, State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake said today.

Rep. Clayton voted against the bill which passed the House by a 97-38 vote Monday. Under the measure, approximately 700 persons now serving time for possession of marijuana must be re-sentenced, Clayton added, and noted that many of these men were sentenced for simple possession, but were in fact pushers and in possession of substantial amounts of the weed when arrested.

These men must all be re-sentenced at high cost to the state under terms of the new bill, and many will be released, he said.

Clayton was also in favor of reducing the amount of marijuana for first time possession to one-half ounce

instead of one ounce, as the bill calls for.

"A half-ounce of marijuana will make 10 to 15 cigarettes, and if they have more than that number on them, I feel like they are not one of the innocent first time offenders this bill is supposed to make allowances for," Clayton added.

Clayton said he hoped the bill would be cleaned up when it comes before a joint House-Senate committee, and said if certain objectionable features were removed, he might be able to vote for it in final version.

The Bible is a collection of books. The word itself is derived from biblia, meaning the books. The Bible is a treasure-house of sacred books which has grown through the centuries under the directing influence of Him who is the Author of all things.

The first person to write mentioned by the Bible was Moses. This would have been around 1500 B.C. Others in turn wrote history and poetry, including Joshua [Josh. 24:26], Samuel [I Sam. 10:25], and Jeremiah [Jer. 36:2]. The Old Testament grew gradually and was finally assembled into a collection about the time of Ezra [400 B.C.].

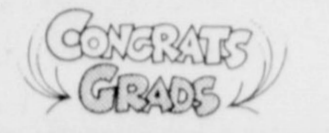
The New Testament books were written between 50-100 A.D. These books were letters addressed to different churches and individuals. The events of Jesus' life were written, because eyewitness accounts became few and insufficient. Thus, over a 1600 year period, the Bible was written.

The structure of the Bible shows that God has made two significant covenants with his people. The Old Covenant contains-[1] five books of Law; [2] twelve books of History; [3] five books of Poetry; and [4] seventeen books of Prophecy. The New Covenant contains-[1] five books of History; [2] twenty-one books of Doctrine; and [3] one book of prophecy.

The Bible was originally written in three languages-[1] Hebrew, [2] Aramaic, and [3] Greek. Almost all thirty-nine books of the Old Testament are written in Hebrew. Some portions of the Old Testament are in Aramaic. Since Greek was the "universal" language in the first century, the New Testament was written in Greek.

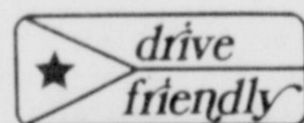

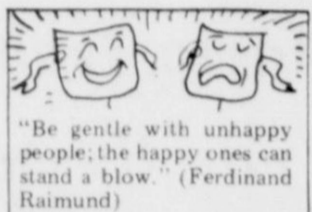
