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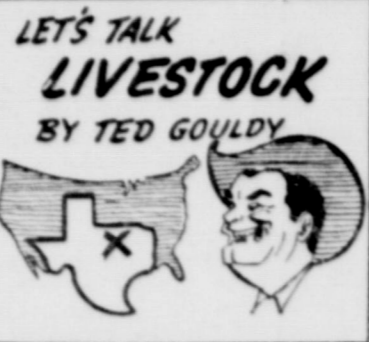

Fort Worth—Trade was fairly active and prices were generally steady on cattle and calves at Fort Worth Monday. Again the buyers showed a marked preference for the better quality and the higher yielding types of cattle and calves. Some sales of fed cattle were considered strong, compared with last week.

Butcher hogs and packing sows sold 25 to 50 cents higher. Choice meat type hogs cashed at \$17 to \$17.25, and the less desirable weights and grades sold from \$13 to \$16.50. Packing sows cashed at \$13 to \$14.50. Stags cashed at \$5 to \$8.

Sheep and lambs were fairly active and generally steady. Choice fat lambs topped again at \$20.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings cashed at \$16.50 to \$22, and common and medium offerings cashed at \$10 to \$16.50.

Fat cows cleared at \$9 to \$11, with a few young cows higher. Canners and cutters sold from \$16 to \$20. Bulls drew \$9 to \$13, with a few lightweight dairy breeds down to \$8.

Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$14.50 to \$17, and fancy baby beef calves cashed at \$17 to \$18. Common and medium slaughter calves sold from \$10 to \$14, and culls drew \$8 to \$10.

Good and choice stocker calves cashed at \$17 to \$19.50 and were quotable to \$20 in load lots. Stocker and feeder steers and steer yearlings of good grades sold from \$15 to \$27.50, and plainer stocker of various ages sold from \$10 to \$13.50. Replacement heifers and heifer calves were quoted \$2 to \$3 under similar quality steers. Stocker cows were slow and weak, a few sales from \$8 to \$10.50.

Good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$18 to \$20, and cull to medium lambs cashed at \$10 to \$17. Stocker and feeder lambs drew \$13 to \$16.

Slaughter ewes sold mostly from \$4.50 to \$5, with some freshly shorn ewes downward to \$3. Pelt credit and old slaughter ewes were regarded as worth \$1.50 to \$2 or more per hundred, which accounted for the low price for those freshly out of the shearing pens. Old wethers drew \$8 to \$12.50. Yearling wethers were reported from \$10 to \$16. Old bucks sold around \$4.

Mathews, Wells and Edwards Judges, Award Donors Announced.

Selection of judges for the September 21 special stocker and feeder show and sale at the Fort Worth Stockyards was completed this week, according to Henry Elder, secretary

of the Texas Hereford Association. Watt Matthews, Albany rancher, has accepted a bid to judge one of the six classes. Rounding out the staff of judges are Kirk Edwards of Henrietta, and Clyde Wells, of Granbury, manager of the John R. Black Estate ranch.

Judges who had accepted earlier include W. D. Lewter, Lubbock feedlot operator; Bill Green, Albany rancher and Jeff Slocum, Cresson rancher.

Judging of these special sales events has been one of the highlights of the affair, and competition has been keen among the producers of quality commercial cattle.

First September event at the yards will be the stocker and feeder show and sale for Aberdeen-Angus cattle. This sale will be held September 7. Last year the September sale of blacks attracted over

2,700 cattle, and this year it is expected that that many or more may be offered.

The dry conditions over much of the territory has made predictions difficult on just how many stockers and feeders will be available at that time.

Currently the rise in fat cattle prices and consistently good demand for stockers and feeders is being viewed at an optimistic sign for these prices to be paid this fall on the available stockers and feeders.

Bob Stark, Mendota, Illinois, feeder buyer, reported here this week that a load of champion Angus feeders he bought here last year on the Chicago market recently at \$24.50.

These cattle were the first to bring that price at Chicago and were sold a few weeks ago just as the market started to rise. They brought \$25 as feeder calves here last year.

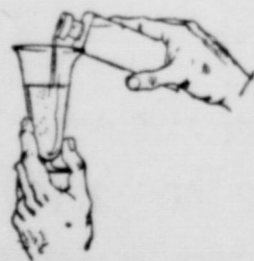

**1956 Amendments To The Social Security Laws**

By R. E. Tuley, Jr.

Beginning with the month of November 1956, social security payments can be made to qualified women at age 62 or over, instead of at 65 or older.

No reduction in such benefits will be made for a widow filing a claim on her late husband's account, or for a dependent mother who files on the wage record of a deceased son or daughter. All former requirements for such entitlement, other than age, must still be met. The deceased person must have been fully insured, must have died after 1939, and there must be no other survivor with a superior right to payment. Also, for the dependent mother, proof of dependency must be filed with the Social Security Administration within two years of the date of death of the son or daughter, or a showing of good cause why such proof was not filed must be made before September of 1958.

A wife who files on her husband's record between the ages of 62 and 65 will have a slight reduction made in the amount of her benefits. If the wife files at age 62, she can be paid 75 percent of the amount payable at age 65. For each month that she is past 62, this 75 percent is increased by 25-32's of 1 percent of the figure computed for age 65. For example, if the wife would be due \$40 at age 65, she could be paid \$30 at age 62; if she filed at age 62 1-2, she could be paid \$31.60; if at age 63, \$33.20; at age 64 1-2 \$38.40, etc. Such reduced rate stays in effect and is not increased when she reaches age 65.

Women who file on their own records at age 62 may receive 80 percent of the amount otherwise payable at age 65. For each month they are past 62, and amount of 5-9's of 1 percent of the age 65 amount is added to the 80 percent figure.

Such benefits are first payable for the month of November 1956. A woman past the age of 62 who wishes more information about her own case should write the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas, giving her name and address, date of birth, social security number involved. Arrangements will be made to secure formal applications in plenty of time to avoid any possible loss of benefits.

# State Capitol NEWS

Austin—The eyes of Texas are on Chicago this week. And, politically speaking, the state nestles in one man's pocket.

Sen. Lyndon Johnson heads the 112-member Texas delegation, each of whom will cast one-half vote of the state's 56 nominating votes. They are pledged to support him as a favorite son nominee until he releases them.

Thereafter they will vote under the unit rule, probably for whatever candidate is favored by Sen. Johnson. All delegates and the 70 alternates were selected by the May convention with the senator's approval.

Another Texan, Speaker Sam Rayburn, figures prominently in convention affairs. He will be presiding over a presidential convention for the third time.

**September Convention in Doubt**  
Who will win out and how at the September State Democratic Convention is a subject of heated debate. Actual outcome will not be known

until the meeting gets underway in Fort Worth. Rival conservative and liberal delegates will struggle for nearly 600 seats. Convention control hinges on these places. delegates, about 224 conservatives, named some 577 definitely liberal delegates, about 224 conservatives. But neither side can control the 1900-vote convention without the contested seats.

Mrs. Kathleen Voigt of San Antonio, liberal leader, charged last week the conservative executive committee planned to "steal" the convention. She asked that the May state convention, which was recessed rather than adjourned, be reconvened to take charge of the situation.

Executive Committee Chairman George Sandlin dismissed Mrs. Voigt's charges as "the same old thing, every two years."

He promised the committee would give all contesting delegates a fair hearing and seat those legally entitled to places. He predicted the convention would be made up of middle-of-the-road conservatives "with no ax to grind."

As for the May convention, he felt the intervening precinct and county conventions had made it past history.

**Webb Investigators in Controversy**  
Who should investigate alleged voting irregularities in Webb County is still being debated.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd has twice been set back in efforts to set up a state-level inquiry. But his office said he intends to con-

tinue the fight. At Shepperd's request Austin Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts sent Dan Moody Jr. to Laredo to act as master on chancery of an inquiry.

Webb County Dist. Judge R. D. Wright issued an injunction to stop the Moody investigation. He claimed prior jurisdiction for the questioning being conducted in his own court.

Shepperd and Moody took the matter to the State Supreme Court which rejected their petition.

Meanwhile, the Webb County grand jury indicted seven persons. But spokesmen for the Reform Party called this "window dressing." They were still working for an investigation originating in Austin.

**Re-hearing Asked In Santa Fe Case**  
Awaiting the Supreme Court when it reconvenes in October will be a motion for re-hearing in the long-contested Santa Fe Railway case.

In July the court upheld the right of unions to make closed shop agreements in the railway industry. Such contracts are prohibited by the state "right to work" law, but allowed by the federal railway act.

In their motion, railway attorneys asked the court either to reverse the July ruling or modify it. They contended that union contracts should allow only for collection of dues and assessments necessary to support collective bargaining action.

**Smaller Cotton Crop Seen**  
King Clifton is wearing a drought-scarred crown.

U. S. Dept. of Agriculture estimates put Texas, 1956 cotton crop at 3,600,000 bales, compared to 4,039,000 last year.

Prospective yields ran to extremes. They were termed "extremely poor" in dryland areas, "excellent" in irrigated sections.

Farmers who did not grow cotton will get the lion's share of Texas' soil bank payments. Of the \$22 million to be paid to Texas farmers by the federal government within the next few weeks, more than \$16 million will go for idle cotton acreage.

Other payments: \$5,524,000 for wheat, \$372,000 for peanuts, \$210,097 for rice.

**Justice Department Suggested**  
Texas needs a department of justice to bolster local enforcement of state criminal laws.

State Auditor C. H. Cavness made this suggestion last week in a report on the Department of Public Safety. He pointed out that legislators had urged such a move three years ago.

Cavness also noted that while the APS funds and staff have grown, they have not kept pace with needs and responsibilities.

**Federal Inquiry Of US Trust**  
A federal grand jury investigation of the bankrupt US Trust and Guaranty Co. is scheduled for Sept. 24.

Federal officials would have the power to preclude if they found the company had violated U. S. postal regulations or securities laws.

U. S. Dist. Atty. Malcom R. Wilkey declined to say what course inquiry might take.

**Short Snorts**

Withdrawal of Sen. A. M. Aikin Jr. from the lieutenant governor's race for health reasons caused only minor delays in second primary preparations. Most counties reported they had printed only a few ballots for absentee voters. In urban counties voting machines were changed with little difficulty. State Health Department officials last week warned gardeners against use of some of the newer "organic phosphate" insecticides. Such sprays are safe only in the hands of professionals who use protective clothing, goggles and respirators, said the department. Texas Dept. of Public Safety polygraph (lie detector) examiner Dee Wheeler has been named one of the outstanding authorities in his field in the country. Wheeler was cited in the book, "From Evidence to Proof," by Michigan professor Marshall Houts, former FBI man, lawyer and judge. William L. McGill, state civil defense director has been in M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston for examination and observation. McGill is nationally known for his work in civil defense.
