state that prospects for crops and pastures are the best they recall here in several years. Small grain crops are in excellent condition and with additional moisture later, prospects are good for the best grain harvest since 1953, it was said. Ranchers report that ranges are looking better every day and are in better condition for this season of the year than they have been in

The rains have been general over the state with some sections receiving as much as five inches the past 10 days.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said the rains are "our most hopeful sign of a possible return to a normal rain cycle.

He said the drouth hadn't been broken-"it will take years," he said, "to replenish our lost underground water resources, and without these resources, we are still in a state of drouth." However, he stated, "the rains have caused an increasing optimism among our farmers that this terrible disaster may on the wane."







"The smart pedestrian knows that his own conduct in winter traffic determines whether he will be a live pedestrian in the spring," Mu-

He pointed out that more pedestrian fatilities occur in urban areas during winter months than in any other season. The reasons, he said, are that in addition to the usual traffic hazards, the winter months bring slippery snowy or icy road conditions, more hours of darkness and poor visibility.

"Pedestrians should observe caution in crossing streets, obey all traffic signs and signals and make sure they are seen by motorists as they step into the street," Music warned. "And there should be no jaywalking or crossing between parked cars.

"More than half of all traffic fatilities in metropolitan areas are of pedestrians," he said. Thirty-six per cent of these urban fatilities in 1955 were of people crossing between intersections.

"The safe walker knows that he cannot depend upon any law or traffic regulation to keep him safe at all times," he said. "In many cases the motorist has difficulty coming to a quick stop on ice or snow because he has neglected to

put on tire chains.' Musick outlined five rules for winter walking safety:

1. Cross at intersections and obey 2. Be wary of slippery streets and

3. At night wear or carry some-65 or 70 years old and each tells thing light in color as a warning to approaching cars. 4. Be courteous and give the driver

5. Accept your responsibilities for keeping yourself alive.

History And Test Results Given On Sorghum Almum

Sorghum almum was first described in literature from Argentina where according to available evidence, it orginated as a hybrid between Johnsongrass and a sorghum In Argentina it is known as Sorgo negro, Sudan negro and Sorghum almum and as Columbusgrass in South Africa. It has been introduced into the United States from Argentine, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Nigeria and Algeria. It has been grown on the Chillicothe and Lubbock Experiment stations for about 12 years.

E. M. Trew, extension agronomist, describes sorghum almum as a perennial very similar to Johnsongrass in appearance. Generally, it stems, longer and more spreading heads and usually grows taller than Johnsongrass and Sudan grasses The underground stems or rhizomes are short, thick and turn up close to the crown. New growth comes primarily from buds at nodes or joints just above the ground with relatively few new shoots coming from rhizomes. It is not uniform and the types vary as to stalk size and height, leafiness and degree of tillering. The stalks, generally, are pithy and non-sweet.

The seed shatter when mature. They generally are larger than those of Johnsongrass but seed covings of both grasses are the same color and shape. Sorghum almum does not appear to cross readily with Sudangrass and other cultivated sorghums but some types apparent-

ly cross freely with Johnsongrass. In clipping tests at Denton, Temple and in the Brazos River Bottom near College Station, it produced about the same or slightly more hay than did Sweet and Common Sudangrass. Greater yield differences, based on observations, have been reported from the Rolling Plains area. On the lighter soils of that area, it seems to be more drouth tolerant than either Johnson or Sudangrass.

During 1956, Sorghum almum was grown in more than 60 grass-legume demonstration nurseries in the eastern half of Texas. On the deeper, more fertile soils, production often exceeded Johnson and Sudan grasses but on the shallower, poorerf soils, it produced less. Production in nursery plots has declined the second and third year on shallow, poor soils.

Trew observes that best use of the grass appears to be for grazing purposes and perhaps soil conservation. Nutritive value should be about the same as for Johnson and Sudan grases. It has survived the winter and acted as a perennial in the Rolling Plains area since 1954 but has winterkilled some years at the Lubbock Extension Station.

The specialist says the grass should be planted in 36 to 42-inch rows on a seedbed prepared as for Sudan or grain sorghum. Row planting permits cultivating for control. He suggests using three to five pounds of seed an acre to insure a good stand and small stalk size. Plainting depths of one o two inches are suggested.

Fertilizer should be applied at or before planting time wherever needed. And Trew advises a soil test for determining this need.

Plantings for grazing should be divided into at least four blocks to permit rotation grazing and the plants should be at least 24-inches high before livestock are turned on it. This will decrease danger of

prussic acid poisoning. Sorghum almum for pure seed production should be planted in fields free of Johnsongrass and at least a half-mile from Johnsongrass stands. Harvesting the seed from standing plants with a combine results in excessive loss from shattering. To prevent this loss.
