MONTH OF APRIL DESIGNATED CANCER CONTROL MONTH BY GOV. PRICE DANIEL

Austin.—Governor Price Daniel strongly urged all Texans to join in the crusade to control cancer by designating April as Cancer Control Month in Texas. At the same time, Governor Daniel proclaimed Tuesday, April 9, as Cancer Control Day in Texas, a day on which thousands of American Cancer Society volunteers will take the life-saving message of ACS into homes throughout the state.

Noting that more than 9,600 Texans died from the dread disease in 1955, Governor Daniel stated that if present rates continue, "we may expect to see 10,000 of our fellow citizens die of this disease during 1957. It is estimated," he said, "that there are more than 60,000 cancer cases in our State, and the number continues to grow."

Cross Cut Land Mark Is Razed By Fire Saturday

Fire, believed to have started from a faulty fireplace, completely destroyed one of the oldest landmarks in the Cross Cut Community, Saturday afternoon. The two-story house, known as the W. P. Thomas place, and now owned by T. B. Friend, of Austin, was located about a mile south of Cross Cut, on the Brownwood highway.

Mr. Friend had been cleaning the house and had set fire to papers in the fireplace shortly before the fire was discovered in the attic. Cross Plains Volunteer Fire department's rural truck answered the alarm, but the fire, whipped by a strong west wind, had completely enveloped the structure by the time firemen arrived.

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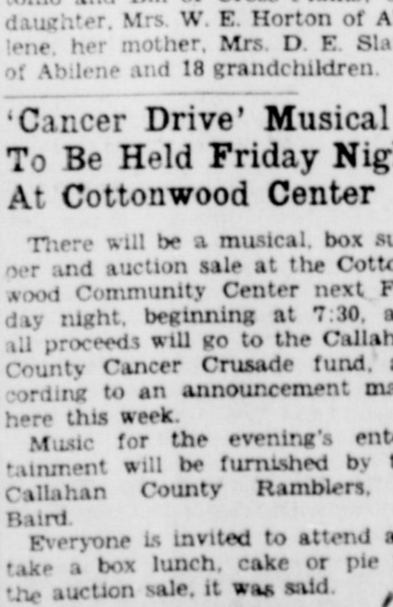

Buff Track Team Wins Two Events At Bangs

The Cross Plains High School track team, led by Pat Moore, participated in the Bangs High School Invitation Track and Field Meet, held there last Saturday afternoon, and won two events and placed in two others. The Buff team amassed 161-3 points.

Pat Moore, sparkplug of the local squad, set a new meet record in the broad jump when he leaped 20 feet, 4-1/2 inches, to win the event. The Buff relay team, composed of Darrell Hutchins, Joe Gary, Granvel Scott and Moore, captured first place in the 440-relay, also. This same team won second in the mile relay, losing first by only 5 of a second.

Moore placed second in the 100-yard dash and Hutchins took fourth place in pole vault. Don Watkins, discus entry and Billy Mayes and Larry Crockett, 880 runners, completed Coach James Alexander's team.

The Bangs meet is held annually for Class A and B schools and 15 teams participated in this year's windy meet, it was reported.

S. Senate. City voters will also have an opportunity to ballot on three aldermen in the annual city election being held on the same date and in the same place.

Polls will open here in the city hall at 8:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m. Fred Stacy will serve as judge of the senate election and Mrs. Mary Wagner will be judge of the city election.

Davis Montgomery Hurt In Fall; Is Recovering

Davis Montgomery was reported to be recovering satisfactorily Tuesday afternoon of this week in Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, where he has been a patient since Monday afternoon of this week, undergoing treatment for bruises and exposure.

Mr. Montgomery was found at his home, three miles north of Cross Plains, Monday afternoon, by Tom Bruce, a neighbor who stopped by for a visit. He told relatives that he had attempted to get out of bed and fell when his feet became entangled in the bed covers, in the early morning hours, Monday. His head struck a table near the bed and according to reports his feet were still entangled in the covers when he was found. Being unable to get up and summon help, he was suffering from painful bruises on his head and from exposure to cold as there was no fire in the house.

Mr. Montgomery, 89, has lived alone since the death of his wife several years ago.

I was reading last night in a newspaper which some city man threw out of his car along with some tin cans while he was driving through the countryside out here earlier in the day where a big New York real estate developer says a city ought to have the right to annex the area around it. It's not fair, he said, for people living near a city to enjoy its advantages and not pay any of its taxes, and he said the city should have the right to take in the territory without the consent of the people taken in.

Area Oil News

Ames and Wells of Cross Plains staked four 500-foot cable projects in the regular field, four miles southwest of Cross Plains. All are on the D. T. Crockett lease in Subdivision 57, Comal CSL, Survey 181.

No. 1 Crockett spots 150 feet from the north and east lines. No. 2 Crockett will be 450 feet from the north and 150 feet from the east lines. No. 3 Crockett spots 450 feet from the north and east lines and No. 4 Crockett will be 150 feet from the north and 450 feet from the east lines.

Ray A. Pierce of Eunice, N. M. has completed No. 1 Hettie McClanahan as a regular field project five miles east of Cross Cut in Brew County. Location is in William English Survey 791.

Daily potential was 2014 barrels of 40 gravity oil, pumping from open hole at 1,113-1,162 feet. Pay was topped at 1,113. Formation was fractured.

Collins, Redman and Chancey of Cross Plains staked four regular field projects four miles northeast of Cross Cut on the L. Byrd lease. All are slated for 1400 feet with rotary and are in N. B. Mitchell Survey 150.

Recent disclosures from testimony revealed:

(1) Former Insurance Commission Chairman J. Byron Saunders received some \$7,000 from ICT Discount Corp. in monthly checks. Saunders said it was in payment for his interest in Wood County oil wells. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson questioned him closely as to why the money was listed on his income tax return as legal fees rather than money from a property sale.

(2) Two former Insurance Commission examiners were asked to explain if they were the same men whose names appeared on checks from a BenJack Cage interest. A doctor certified the two, L. W. Blanchard and Robert Butler, were ill to testify. Both had been dismissed from the commission for alleged connections with another

company that went broke.

(3) Renne Allred, Jr., court-appointed liquidator for ICT, charged the company was organized with borrowed money, a procedure contrary to state law. He also said year-end statements were fattened with short-term loans.

(4) Several legislators and former legislators testified concerning fees from ICT. Most were small in amount and received some time ago.

Coke's Company in Trouble.—Physicians Life Insurance Co. of Dallas is to appear before the Insurance Commission Thursday (today), March 28, to show cause why it should not lose its license.

This is only one of the difficulties faced by the company headed by Former Gov. Coke Stevenson.

It is one of several Dallas-based insurance companies that are to be investigated by a special Dallas County grand jury.

Governor Stevenson said the original founders of the company sold some of their stock through the company at a tremendous profit and retained the money themselves. None of these people is in authority now, he said, and the firm has sued for recovery of the money. "It will go a long way to get things straightened out," he said.

Stevenson also told stockholders the company's future solvency requires it to get loose from a commitment to take over assets of American Atlas Ins. Co. from the state receiver. Federal tax liens against American Atlas were discovered after the deal was made.

Another Insurance Commission order gives Legal Security Life of Dallas until April 15, to clear up charges it falsified its books to show assets in excess of their true value.

Confused History.—House bribery investigators are having slow going with the Texas Naturopathic Association.

Efforts to uncover details of the TNA's past legislative activities have been repeatedly balked by faulty memories and lack of records.

On the committee's recommendation the House formally censured ex-Rep. James E. Cox of Conroe. Cox has been indicted on charges of agreeing to accept a bribe from the TNA.

Oil Down Again.—Texas' big push of oil production was short-lived. Europe couldn't use it, after all.

Texas Railroad Commission cut the April allowable by 224,710 barrels a day. It is to be at 3,564,665 barrels a day on a 16-day producing pattern. This puts things back about as they were in February before the big jump to 18 producing days in March.

Major oil companies had strongly urged increased production on the commission. But after three weeks under the higher pattern, they were unanimous in asking a cutback.

News of the lower allowable brought uneasiness to legislators. They had been counting on high oil production to bring in the increased revenue to put over their record spending program without new taxes.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert had forecast an extra \$17,900,000 for the next biennium. After the Railroad Commission order, Calvert said he was not changing that forecast yet. It included some leeway for fluctuation in oil revenue, he said.

Limited Sales Approved.—Bill to prohibit limiting of sales for below-cost items is back Senate State Affairs Committee approved the measure sponsored by Sen. A. M. Aiken, Jr.

A similar measure passed in 1955 was outlawed by courts because it applied only to groceries. Aiken's bill applies to all retailers.

A record crowd attended the committee meeting. Bill is generally favored by smaller grocers who contend it is necessary to prevent big chains' usurping all the business with drastic price-cutting.

Short Snorts.—Texas Research League announced it has accepted the Insurance Commission's request to survey its activities and offer suggestions for more efficient operation.

A bill to make parents liable up to \$300 for a minor child's property damage is unconstitutional, ruled Atty. Gen. Will Wilson.

Former Congressman Brady Gentry of Tyler was appointed Highway Commission chairman by Gov. Price Daniel. Gentry previously headed the Commission from 1939-45.

Texas highway death during 1956 hit a record-breaking 2,611, reported the Dept. of Public Safety in closing its statistical books for the past year. More discouraging, the number of deaths per miles traveled also inched up.

Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the conviction of Geo. B. Parr for threatening to take a human life. A Jim Wells County court had convicted and assessed a \$1,500 fine against the one-time political leader.

February saw 3,202 Texans enter the armed forces while 2,932 were separated, reports State Selective Service Headquarters. Only 816 of the entrants were drafted.

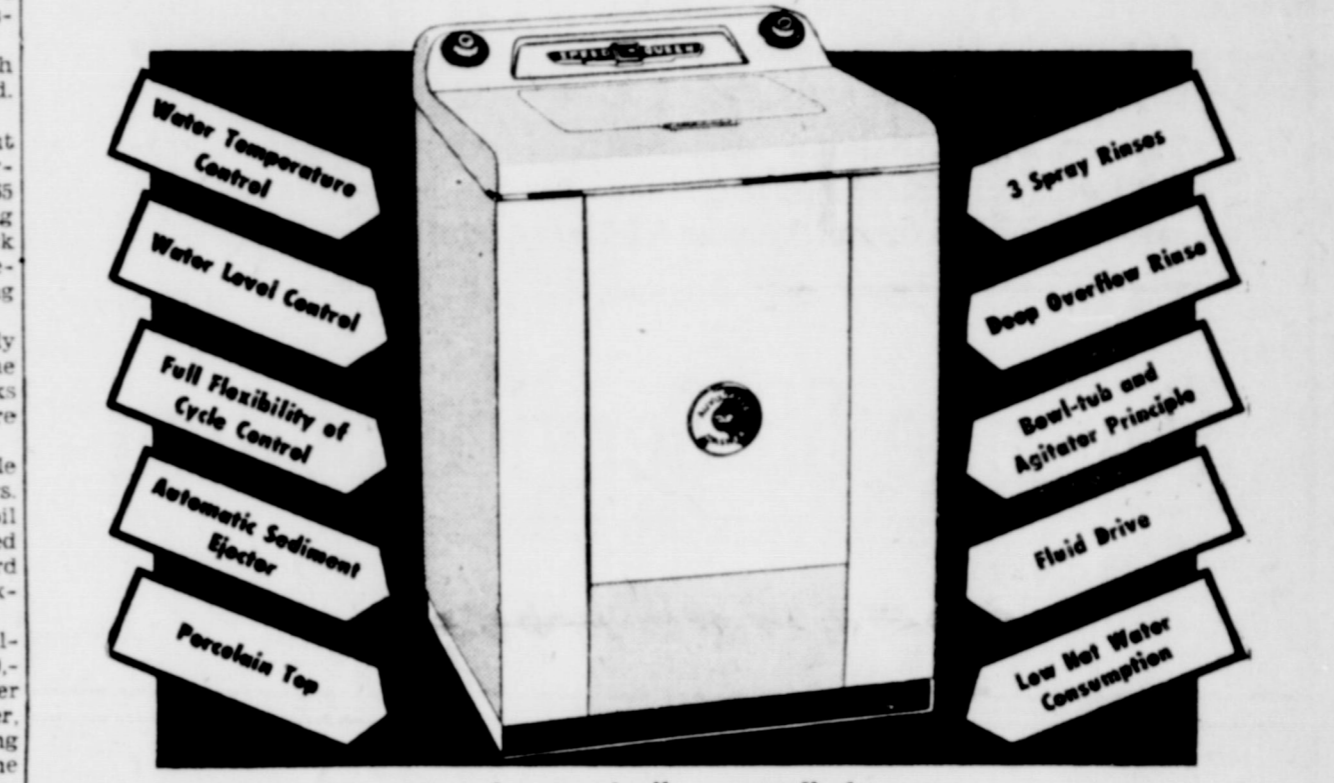

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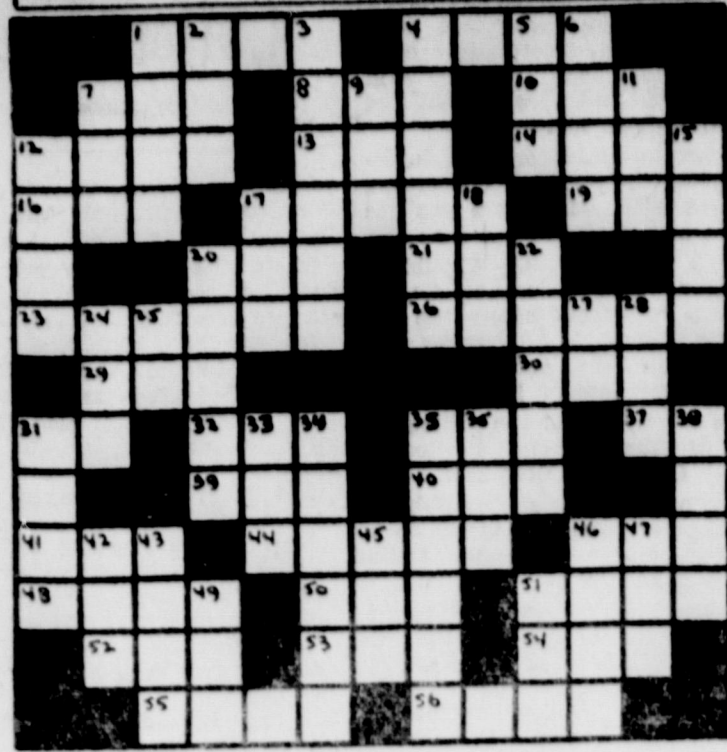

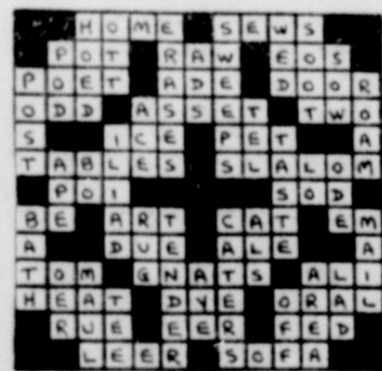
Sonja Evans Feted With Bridal Shower Recently
