1958 Cotton Allotments And Referendum Date Set

COLLEGE STATION - Farmers 1958 upland cotton crop and producers of extra long staple cotton 27,829 acres.

These state allotments, according to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, will be apportioned among the counties and the county allotments, to be announced later, among the farms according to the provisions of the law and regulations issued the Secretary of Agriculture. The State Committee adds that individual farm allotments will be mailed to cotton producers prior to the December 10 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1958 crops

In the case of extra long staple cotton, the Secretary of Agriculture has designated 10 Texas counties as being eligible to receive allctments. They are Brewster, Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Loving, Pecos, Presidio, Reeves and Ward.

The state committeemen point out that the December 10 referendums, for upland and extra long staple cotton growers, will determine whether or not marketing quotas will be operative for the 1958 crops. At least two-thirds of those voting in the two referendums must approve the quotas if they are to remain in effect. Acreage allotments, however, say the committeemen will be in effect regardless of how the votes go. Acreage allotments are a condition of

eligibility for price support.

A national marketing allotment and national acreage allotment for upland cotton must be proclaimed for the following year if the Secretary finds that the total supply of upland cotton for the current marketing year exceeds the normal supply. For extra long staple cotton, quotas and allotments must be proclaimed whenever the total exceeds the normal supply more than 8 per cent.

The state committeemen point out that growers of both types of cotton have approved quotas for the last four crops.







of Jordan C. Garrett and Ezella Jane Garrett was written by the Carrett's grandson, Harold Garrett: Jordan C. Garrett married Ezella Texas. first home was a half dug-out with one sash window. They lived here The next home was a double log cabin with a hall through the center. After living in this log cabin one year, they moved to a box-type house owned by Mr. Garrett's sister, Amy

During this third year the grasshoppers ate up the cotton except for a small patch near the house where the chicken ranged and ate presented his grandsons, Harold the grasshoppers. > From here they moved to the Haselwood place two miles south of Cross Plains now owned by Mrs. Hubert Baxter where they lived five years. Part of this place Mr. Garrett cleared and put into cultivation. During this five years he saved enough money to buy a 50 acre place east of Cross Plains. He moved to the Williamson place which he bought at about the same time. This place is now owned by T. J. Garrett (no relation). During their 16 years on this place their third child, Maola, was born. During this time, the Garretts bought their first car. a 1918 Overland. For the car they traded a horse, a cow, and a pony. The pony was the childrens', and the decision to buy the car was a hard one for the children to

In 1923, Mr. Garrett bought the building in which he operated the Garrett Motor Company in Cross Plains. In the fall of 1923 they moved to a house he had bought in the south part of Cross Plains so he could be close to his new business. They lived in this house two years and then moved to their present home early in 1926 when the new school was built in the north part of Cross Plains.

After operating the Garrett Mo-tor Co. for 18 years, he turned to full time management of his cattle business. This he continued until the loss of his eyesight. He operated several hundred acres in Callahan, Brown and Concho coun-

The first church the Garretts attended when they came to Cross Plains was a Methodist Church on Highway 36 about one block east of the present location of Fonia Worthy's Service Station. A Presbyterian minister sometimes preached in this church.

Later a Presbyterian Church was built on location of J. P. McCord's present home. This church was then torn down and the material used in building the present Presby-terian Church. Mr. Garrett was on

the building cimmittee of this church. He also served as Elder.
Mr. Garrett's civic duties included three 2-year terms on the city council. He served as city treasurer and street commissioner during the three terms. At the end of the fifth year he resigned because of business interest taking too much of his time.

He served as a member of the first board of directors of the Citizens State Bank.
