Last summer State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert predicted the state would end this two-year period with a \$6,000,000 deficit. His latest estimate doubles that fi-

gure. Calvert revised his figures after voters this month approved a constitutional amendment upping state . pension payments.

Legislators already are skating on the edge of financial embarrassment in their day-to-day operation. Fund for their salaries, expenses, etc., was down to about \$45,000 when the first session ended. With costs running about \$11,000 a day, they were due to start drawing this week on the governor's deficiency fund, earmarked for "calamities.

But the real calamity, as many .. legislators see it, comes year after next when they will have to find a way to glue the "busted" budget ogether again. Most agree, gloomly, that it means new taxes.
