Deposits Show Gain In Citizens State Bank

In the statement of financial contion of the Citizens State Bank of Cross Plains, published in this edition of The Review, deposits show a gain over the statement of Oct. 11, 1957, of \$56,781.02. Current deposits total \$2,088,053.26, as compared with \$2,031,272.24 for the last quarterly report. A gain of \$17,824.16 is recorded over the report made on the same date in 1956, when deposits totalled \$2,070,229.10.

According to the current report loans are up \$15,040.38 over Oct 1957, and are ahead of the same period last year by \$45,412.50. Current loans total \$505,063.66, as compared with \$490,023.28 for Oct., 1957, and \$459.651.16 in Dec., 1956

Weed Control-Good and Bad. For those who live in the coastal areas it might be well to keep in mind this spring that some weed control can be harmful to wildlife.

The Came & Fish Commission recently completed purchase of additional marsh land in the Beaumont-Port Arthur area to provide refuge for water fowl. Careful studies are being made of seed-producing weeds that ducks and geese like to feed Biologists directing this program have had long experience and training in providing such foods. Also a rather intensive weed control program now is under way by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife and the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service. The purpose is to find ways of eliminating undesirable marsh plants and to substitute plants which will produce food for migratory waterfowl

One phase of this project is the testing of various herbicides to find which will eliminate noxious weeds without injuring wildlife values. Your county agricultural agent also can be most helpful in this work.

For Spin Fishing Enthusiasts. the problem of knowing just how much line to play out when they hook a big one. Now comes the B. F. Gladding Co., with a color-metered Platyl line that indicates at a glance. With each pacakage of line there is a rod decal corresponding to 10-yard markings. This will prove a popular feature.

Speaking of spin fishing, it's getting light enough now to put in a few minutes dry casting in your back yard each evening when you get home from work.

Get a casting practice plug or remove the hooks from a spin size plug. Set up a marker; an old bicycle tire is excellent. Then practice for accuracy.

getting distance with spinning equipment. Many times, however, accuracy is impaired because your spinning rod is longer than the average bait casting rod. It also has a lighter action, requiring only a flick of the wrist.

With a little practice for a few evenings you'll find you can hit the target every time. TAX-MAN SAM SEZ

Texas is a community property state. Wives who are native Texans clearly understand that they only own half of the homestead. It comes as a distinct shock to some of our naturalized female Texans that she only gets half of what her husband made and even worse, her husband owns half of the salary she made all by herself. The income tax law clearly recognizes commun-ity property law and in Texas both the husband and wife are entitled

to half on the tax return.

If your wife worked and she files separate tax return, she must show one-half of the community income of both the husband and wife. She also takes credit for paying one-half of the withheld tax.



Austin. - January is poll tax year, organized drives get underway in a deadline-month appeal to induce citizens to protect their right to vote by payment of the poil tax. But a good percentage of potential voters ignore it all. Many, jolt-

ed at the last minute, flood into courthouses after knocking off work Jan. 31. Penalty for the putteroffers is usually a long wait in line. Many more never get there at all.

Texas Almanac reports show that in past non presidential election years less than half the potential voters paid poll taxes or secured exemp

Poll tax costs 1.75 and usually may be secured at several different places in every county. No charge for 21-year-olds getting their first vote and those 60 years and over, but an exemption certificate must be obtained. (Persons living out-side cities of 10,000 or more may vote on affidavit without an exemp-

Twice As Much Water. - New State Water Development Board has set up shop with the aim of doubling Texas' water storage space. Board members predict the program will bring the state an addi-tional \$600,000,000 in conservation projects-without cost to state tax






