POSTAL RATES ARE DUE TO BECOME EFFECTIVE AUGUST 1, SAYS ANDERSON

Postage rates, which are to go into effect August 1, announced the postmaster, Anderson, postmaster.

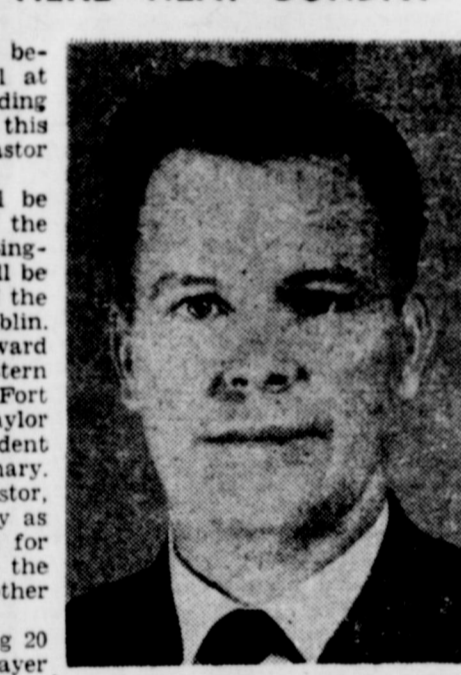

in the papers a few weeks and no more is heard about them, while a brand new trouble spot breaks out some place else.

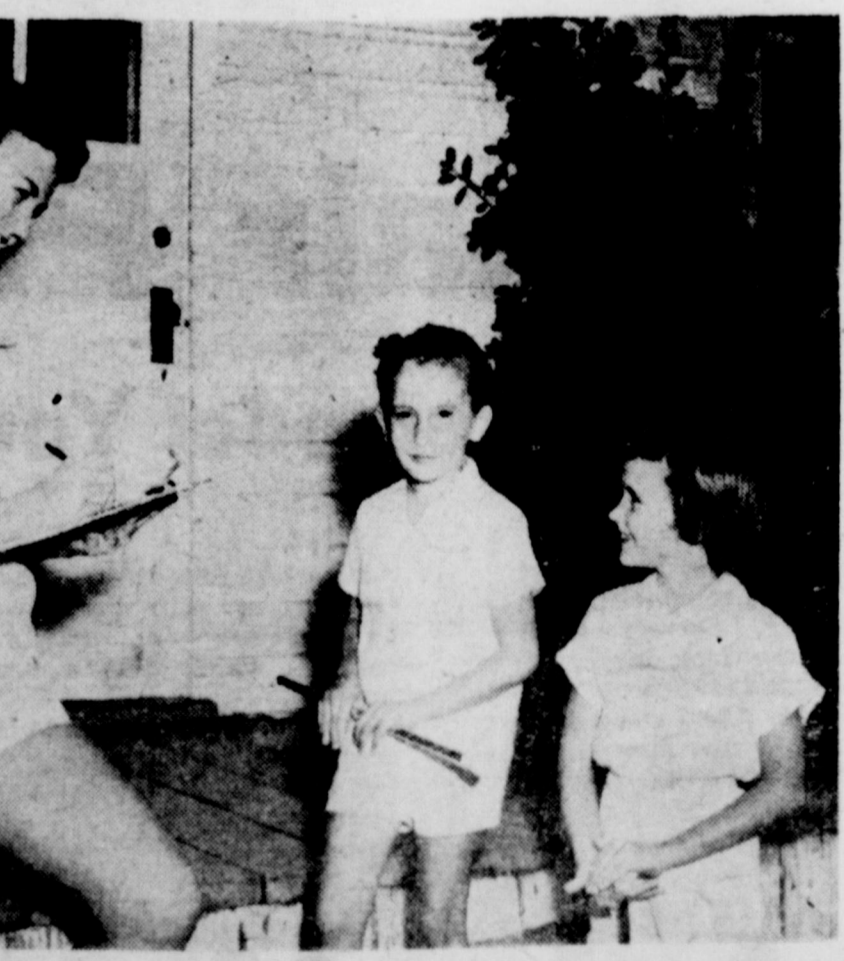

AUSTIN.—Midway through the so-called "recession year" of 1958, Texas economic forecasters are turning their eyes upward again. Statistical reports show steady improvement in overall business activity since the bleak lows of February and March. If the hoped-for pick-up in oil demand develops during the latter half, analysts say, "1958 may be a good year after all."

Some of the bases for the current atmosphere of cautious optimism are these:

BANK DEPOSITS: Folks have lots of money in the banks; in most areas, more than last year. Response to the Texas Banking Commission's mid-year call for condition of banks showed that most have higher deposits than last summer and some are at new record highs. Dallas County bank deposits increased by \$333,000,000; Harris County (Houston) by more than

\$267,000,000 over a year ago. Towns with all-time high deposits were Amarillo, Corpus Christi, Tyler, Midland, Denton and Port Arthur.

RETAIL SALES: Despite sagas here and there, Texas retail sales are expected to run some 7 per cent ahead of '57, says the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Because of low months early in the year, sales volume for the first five months of '58 were 1 per cent below the same period for '57. But a safe spring upsurge put May, 1958, sales ahead of those for May, 1957. Apparently Texans are concentrating on essentials. Compared to last year, farm implement sales were up 27 per cent, food up 11 per cent, autos down 8 per cent.

BUSINESS INDEX: BBR's latest report shows the 1958 level of general business activity 4 per cent below May, 1957. But May, 1957, was a dizzy pinnacle, the highest point ever reached by the Texas business index. Since the low in March the

index has made encouraging progress, pulling up by 8 points. Fall will bring the tip-off, says BBR, as to whether recovery momentum is sufficient for a rise to a new crest.

EMPLOYMENT: Although thousands more were out of work than a year ago, Texas Employment Commission's most recent over-all survey showed a substantial shortening of the jobless lines. Like the general business index, employment seemed to be making a steady recovery from the early spring "trough." Number of unemployed dropped 4,200 during May, TEC reported, and non-farm employment rose to almost three million. Insured unemployment in Texas was only 4.1 per cent of the working force compared with the national average of 7.2 per cent.

COMPANY CHALLENGED: A king-size clash is in prospect July 15 between the State Insurance Department and National Bankers Life Insurance Company of Dallas.

Commissioner William A. Harrison has ordered the company to prove fitness of its management or lose its license. National Bankers, regarded as one of the largest and most prosperous companies in the Southwest, claims more than \$19,000,000 in assets. Some \$5,000,000 of these are discounted by the department as unsound or unsuitable for an insurance company. Specifically questioned by the state are a number of mortgage loans made by the company to other firms in which the company's officers or directors have an interest.

Company President Lester F. Hall said the firm's financial footing is so sound it could raise \$5,000,000 in a matter of hours. He said the company had a premium income of \$10,000,000 last year and net earnings of \$1,000,000.

GLAD TO MOVE OVER: Despite the prospect of losing "biggest state" honors, Texas officials say they're happy to welcome Alaska as No. 49. Sappy comments:

Gov. Price Daniel: "We will still have the biggest navy."
Secretary of State Zollicoffer: "I'm glad another state will bear the brunt of the gags about being the largest state."

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson: "I suggest they nail down their off-shore lands before they enter the Union."

SEMI-WESTWARD HO! Redesignated Texas-tan uniforms have brought a new look to the Texas Highway Patrol. Semi-western in style, the uniforms sport black trim, black shoes, wide-brimmed grey hats with western crease.

Only 380 patrolmen and other division members of the Department of Public Safety are outfitted at present. New uniforms for the rest of the force will have to wait for another appropriation from the Legislature.

TAXPAYERS GET WARY: Slump in federal income tax collections in Texas the past several months has been noted by Internal Revenue officials.

Cause has been attributed to recession-minded taxpayers lowering their estimates of income for the year. South Texas Collector Bob Phinney thinks, however, most will wind up making just as much money as last year.

Last year Texans paid a record-breaking \$2,600,000,000 in federal income taxes, about \$128,000,000 more than in the year previous.

SCHOOL COST CLIMB SEEN: Texas counties expect cost of education to climb \$70,000,000 annually in the next five years.

This was revealed in reports of 251 counties to the Hale-Aikin Survey Committee on Public Education. Most of the increase would go for expansions necessary to keep up with increasing enrollment.

Counties differed as to how the money should be raised. Twenty-five per cent favored higher local taxes or increased valuation. Forty-four per cent wanted additional money from the state. Nine counties favored federal aid. Thirty-five recommended a sales or income levy.

SHORT SNORTS: Walter Buckner, publisher of the San Marcos Record and past president of the Texas Press Association, has been named by Governor Daniel to the Industrial Accident Board. He will serve as the employer representative.

The two other members of the board are Ned Price of Tyler, representing labor, and Leonard Carlton of Austin, representing employes.

A \$20,500 grant for recodifying Texas school laws has been provided by the M. D. Anderson Foundation of Houston. A legislative committee headed by Rep. Robert H. Hughes of Dallas is in charge of the work.

Preliminary report on a comprehensive survey of Texas water resources has been submitted to Governor Daniel. It was requested by Senator Lyndon B. Johnson and prepared jointly by state and federal water agencies. Contents of the reports will not be released for publication until final approval is given.

Farm experts expect this year's 92-year-old record for cotton yield per acre may be topped this year. Second highest yield was recorded last year at 295 pounds. All-time high was 325 pounds per acre in 1886—when soil was virgin.

Gov. Daniel has proclaimed July 14-20 as State Park Week to call attention to the 56-park unit begun in 1924 when Gov. Pat Neff and his family donated "Mother Neff Park" to the state.

Texas draft quota for August will be 539 men, only one more than were called for in July. State Selective Service Headquarters also announced that some 1,700 men are to take pre-induction exams in August.

Gill-Bennett Vows Repeated At Cottonwood Church Last Friday

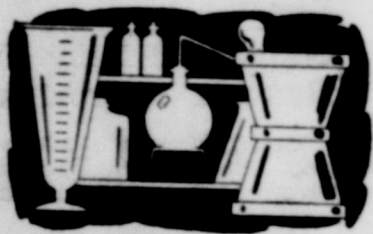

New Bulletin Available On Small Grain Growing

College Station.—Small grains occupy a unique place in Texas agriculture because they are suited to so many uses and are grown from the 50-inch rainfall belt and mild climate of Southeast Texas to the 15-inch rainfall belt of Northwest Texas, where winter temperatures are often very severe.

They are used extensively as grain and forage crops in Texas. The combined acreage of wheat, oats and barley generally exceeds six million. Statewide small grain tests have been conducted to provide information on the best varieties to grow in the several areas, and to provide a means for final testing of experimental strains before they are named new varieties and distributed to growers.

Because of the wide diversity of climate under which the crops are grown and tests conducted, the state is divided into seven areas.

Results and conclusions derived from these tests are summarized in a bulletin just released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, entitled "Performance of Small Grain Varieties in Texas, 1949-57." Yields of experimental strains are not included in the bulletin—only yields of commercial varieties are covered.

Some of the topics included are growing areas and test locations; climatic conditions and soil types; field design of tests and experimental data. It contains information on barley, oats and wheat. This 19-page bulletin may be obtained upon request from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for bulletin 899.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Grain Stubble—How should it be handled? Grain stubble can be used to insure more moisture penetration into the soil. It can be used as a blanket to hold down evaporation of soil moisture and to hold soil temperature down.

Stubble mulching or crop residue utilization reduces wind and water erosion, conserves moisture and will reduce surface crusting. Crop residue utilization will also improve the physical condition of the soil, add organic matter and serves to cushion extreme soil temperatures.

This is a good year to practice crop residue management due to moisture conditions earlier in the season and the growth made by small grain.

Summer weeds can be controlled by using sweeps, preferably large 30-inch sweeps. Where there is extra heavy stubble, a rolling coultter may be used ahead of the sweep to

cut through the straw.

The types of equipment that should be used for crop residue management are chisel plows, sweep cultivators, shredders or flat sweeps. All types of equipment should be used so that stubble is left on or near the surface.

The Agricultural Conservation Program of Callahan County is assisting in the cost of stubble mulching for 1958. This practice for small grain must be completed by Sept. 1 of this year and on grain sorghum stubble within 30 days after harvest. For other details concerning the practice of stubble mulching see your County ASC Office.
