PILLROLLERS GRAB LEAGUE PENNANT, BEAT CATS, 7-2; TRUCKERS TAKE SECOND

The City Drug Pillrollers wrapped up the championship in Little League play this week with a 7-2 victory over the Higginbotham-Bank Cats and a 6-6 tie with the Quarterback Club Buffs...

The Pillrollers gained their first win in their last five starts, after winning their first eight games, and ended the season with a 10-4 won-lost record. In league play, the champion Pillrollers posted a seven and one-half won and three and one-half lost record.

Although the season is not yet complete, the Pillrollers have completed their schedule. Friday sees the Truckers meet the Hawks and the Cats play the Buffs in the last games of the season. The winner of the Cats-Buffs game will take third place in the league standings.

In league action Friday the Buffs and Pillrollers fought to a 6-6 tie in the nightcap as time ran out after five innings. And in the first game the Cats defeated the Burkett Hawks, 9-2.

Larry Boyle was the winning hurler, as he allowed six hits and walked five as he went the route. Losing pitcher was Bo Strickland as he pitched the full five innings for the Hawks. Strickland allowed only five hits but he walked nine.

In the Pillrollers-Buffs 6-6 tie, the Pillrollers outhit the Buffs, 8-3, but Pillrollers' pitcher, Eddie Edmondson, walked nine. Buff hurler Mike Pruet walked six.

In Tuesday's games, the Pillrollers defeated the Cats, 7-2, to win the league championship, and the

Truckers edged the Buffs, 3-2. Charles Barr was the winning pitcher, as he allowed the Cats only two hits in a full six-inning game, while he walked five. Baylis Pope started on the mound for the Cats, allowing only two hits while giving up just one base on balls in the first three innings. One of the hits Pope gave up was a home run to Edmondson with one on in the second inning. Larry Boyle came on in relief in the fourth inning. Boyle was the losing pitcher as he gave up seven hits.

In Friday's nightcap, the Truckers took a firm grip on second place with a 3-2 triumph over the Buffs. In the four-inning game, Donnie Porter got credit for the win while he held the Buffs to four hits and four walks. Mike Pruet absorbed the loss as he also gave up four hits and walked four.

Continued Work For Economy Is Brashear Pledge

State Representative Paul Brashear promised to continue his efforts to obtain for the 76th Legislative District and the State of Texas as the maximum in good government for a minimum outlay of tax dollars in a formal statement this week in connection with his bid for re-election.

Mr. Brashear announced last January that he would run again, promising to issue a formal statement later. He is now completing his second term as a member of the Legislature.

During the 56th Legislature, his first term, Mr. Brashear served on a number of important committees, including the Military and Veterans Affairs, Agriculture, and Penitentiaries committees. In the 55th Legislature he served as chairman of the Military and Veterans Affairs committee. He was also a member of the State Hospitals and Special Schools, Liquor Regulations, Oil, Gas and Mining Committees.

Mr. Brashear is a native of the 76th District, having been born at Atwell in Callahan County in 1917. He is married to the former Helen Ray of the Scranton Community. They have two daughters, Ann Etta, who is married and lives in Abilene, and Sarah, who attends the Cisco Schools. They have one grand-daughter.

A veteran of U. S. Army duty in World War II, Mr. Brashear is an active member of the American Legion. He was recently appointed to serve a six-year term of the American Legion's Legislative Committee, a statewide body. He is currently chairman of this committee.

Mr. Brashear's education includes graduation from high school at Cross Plains, Cisco Junior College and a business college in Austin.

In private life, Mr. Brashear is an insurance man and a farmer. He began farming as a boy and has owned and operated farms in Eastland and Callahan Counties all of his life. He currently owns a farm in Callahan County. His extensive knowledge of farm and soil conservation resulted from several years as an employee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service units in Eastland and adjoining counties.

Prior to his election as a state representative, Mr. Brashear served as secretary in the House of Representatives and as assistant sergeant-at-arms of the Texas Senate, gaining valuable experience in legislative procedure. He spent three years as manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco, a post he resigned in order to devote more time to his legislative duties and to enter the insurance business.

"During my two terms of office, I have been able to learn the things necessary for a representative to do the best job in serving his district," Brashear said. "I have endeavored at all times to work for an honest, efficient state government. It has been my purpose to support legislation in the best interest of our district first and the State of Texas as a whole.

"Each of my votes were cast after due consideration of good business principles. I have supported measures for better state employee salaries, decent benefits for the aged, improved water programs, along with legislation for better education and teacher pay and equitable treatment for veterans and farm groups.

"I propose to do everything possible to assure our state's continued progress and prosperity without additional tax burdens. You can be sure that I will continue devoting as much time as necessary to the duties of my office.

"I have done the best I could like I said I would. Any mistakes that I have made have been in the mind rather than in the heart. My record of service is recorded in the journals of the Legislature. Any constituent has a most cordial invitation to discuss any part of my legislative program.

Vacation Motor Travel Big Business in Texas

Austin—Vacation motor travel is big business in Texas, with nearly ten and a half million tourists spending \$531 million as they piled up four billion miles of driving during 1957.

These figures were mentioned today by J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, as he warned Texans of the many traffic accidents that occur during summer's peak vacation months.

"Every year, more and more persons take to the open road during the summer months," Musick said. "And each year, more and more of them manage to get themselves injured or killed in traffic accidents while on vacation."

He attributed such accidents to many causes, but listed the principal ones as being:

(1) Excessive speed. Because many vacationers try to cover too much territory in too short a time, speed is an important factor. More than fifty percent of the drivers in rural fatal traffic accidents are traveling at excessive speeds at the time of the accident.

(2) Alcohol. People on vacation are likely to be in a holiday mood

and frequently their pursuit of a good time includes drinking. Drinking and driving motorists are involved in more than a third of all rural fatal traffic accidents.

(3) Laws. Failure to observe traffic signs and laws exacts a high annual toll. About one-fifth of the cars smashed up in rural fatal accidents are found to have disregarded warning or stop signs.

(4) Fatigue. Driving while fatigued is a foolish practice indulged in by vacationers who won't take time out to get sufficient rest. On a national basis, about one out of thirteen drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents are found to be in a physical condition that could be a contributing factor in the accident. In about two-thirds of such cases the drivers are fatigued or

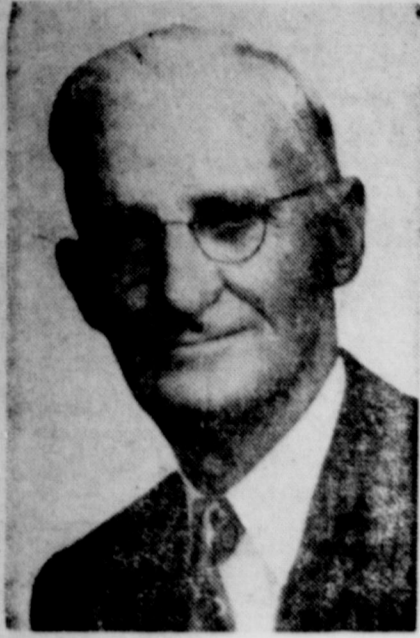

One of the most thrilling sights I've ever seen on the water is the shrimp boats coming in. Recently at Port Aransas I watched these trawls, one after another, moving slowly but majestically through the pass to make their way in or out between the bay waters and the gulf.

As each loaded boat moved through the pass it followed by literally thousands of gulls. They have learned they can pick up the dead shrimp being knocked off the boats. They are an enthusiastic welcoming committee.

Hundreds of these boats work through the Aransas Pass in season, and the season is when shrimping is good. Otherwise they are tied to mornings, or docked in the basin at Aransas Pass or some other Texas port.

You might wonder what this has to do with an outdoors column. It has plenty to do, because shrimping, in one form or another, has so much to do with our whole coastal fishing program.

Naturally shrimping is a major commercial operation on the Texas coast, from Port Arthur to Brownsville. Shrimp, likewise, is one of the principal baits to be found on the coast.

Admittedly not too much is known for sure about the shrimp, except that they are getting in shorter supply every year. There are many reasons for this, and these reasons all affect the salt water fisherman. Take the shrimp out of our Texas bays and we no longer have trout, red fish and many others that we now take on rod and reel.

I know practically nothing about shrimping, but there are many others who have lived on the coast all their lives who'll also admit there is still a great deal to be learned. Even the men in the shrimping business admit they are in the dark about many of the fundamental problems affecting the shrimp increment or its disappearance.

These men in the industry also are in violent disagreement over some aspects. A few of them would close shrimping in baywaters for a year. Others think the baywaters should be closed from January to July. They point out that the big shrimp caught during the months of January, February and March contain thousands of eggs. They apparently are on their way to in-shore waters to breed. When they are caught they are removed from productivity and the shrimp population decreases.

There are laws now limiting the size of trawls and the size of shrimp and also the amount in possession in some areas. They are more or less a hodgepodge, depending on what local legislation might be passed under pressure.

One of the problems on the Texas coast now is the taking of too many shrimp that are too small. The law provides that the count must not be more than 65 to the pound, yet there are thousands of pounds of smaller shrimp being taken. Packers are having to buy these small shrimp under protest. They say if they don't buy what the fisherman brings in, he'll go elsewhere with the desirable catch. As a result thousands of pounds of these small shrimp are being processed daily and canned for the commercial market.

It is generally agreed that the shrimp catch has gone up in the last few years because there are more fishing units. We are getting more shrimp from the Mexican waters. But it also is agreed that unless something can be done to protect our inshore waters from losing all the small shrimp, our inshore fish will be out of food.

We'd all lose and lose heavily under those circumstances.

And speaking of fishing with shrimp, I recently had a wonderful trip to Port Aransas. The Boatman's Association there entertained a group of outdoor writers with a fishing trip. The weather was very bad so we didn't get into much water.

We did our fishing with shrimp in the bay waters and several of the boys came away with a nice mess of speckled trout.

I can recommend speckled trout fishing for anyone. In the first place, it is a comparatively easy fishing trip. There are ample accommodations along the Texas coast. You can fish in the baywaters either wading, off the jetties or piers, or from boats. Many Texans now are trailing their outboards to the coast and finding excellent sport fishing.

Another thing, you don't have to buy more tackle. You can fish for trout with your bass equipment. Furthermore you can use either shrimp or lures. Most of those who go to the coast for the first time like to free-shrimp. They use a small treble hook. Just back of the eye on the shrimp's head is a black or brown spot. This is the toughest part of the shrimp. Put your hook through the shrimp head at this point, cast it into the water and let it run free. Chances are, if you set your hook in time, you'll come in with a trout.

These trout also are called weakfish, because the mouth is very tender. Don't jerk the hook out of its mouth. Work it in easily.

Of course there are many other angles to successful trout fishing, like being able to locate their movement, either from watching them move about in the water, or watching the gulls feed. But you can learn a lot about coastal fishing in a short time, and you'll never learn it all as long as you live.

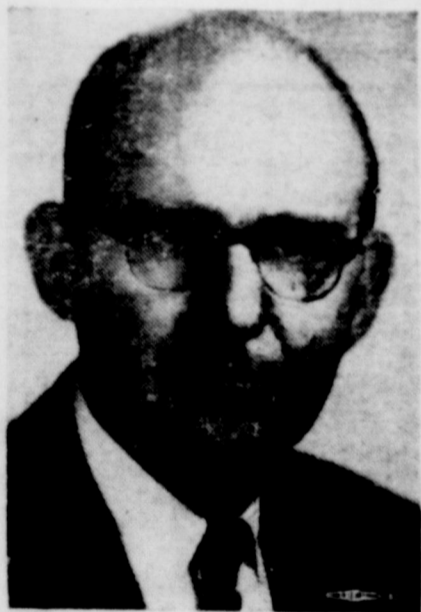

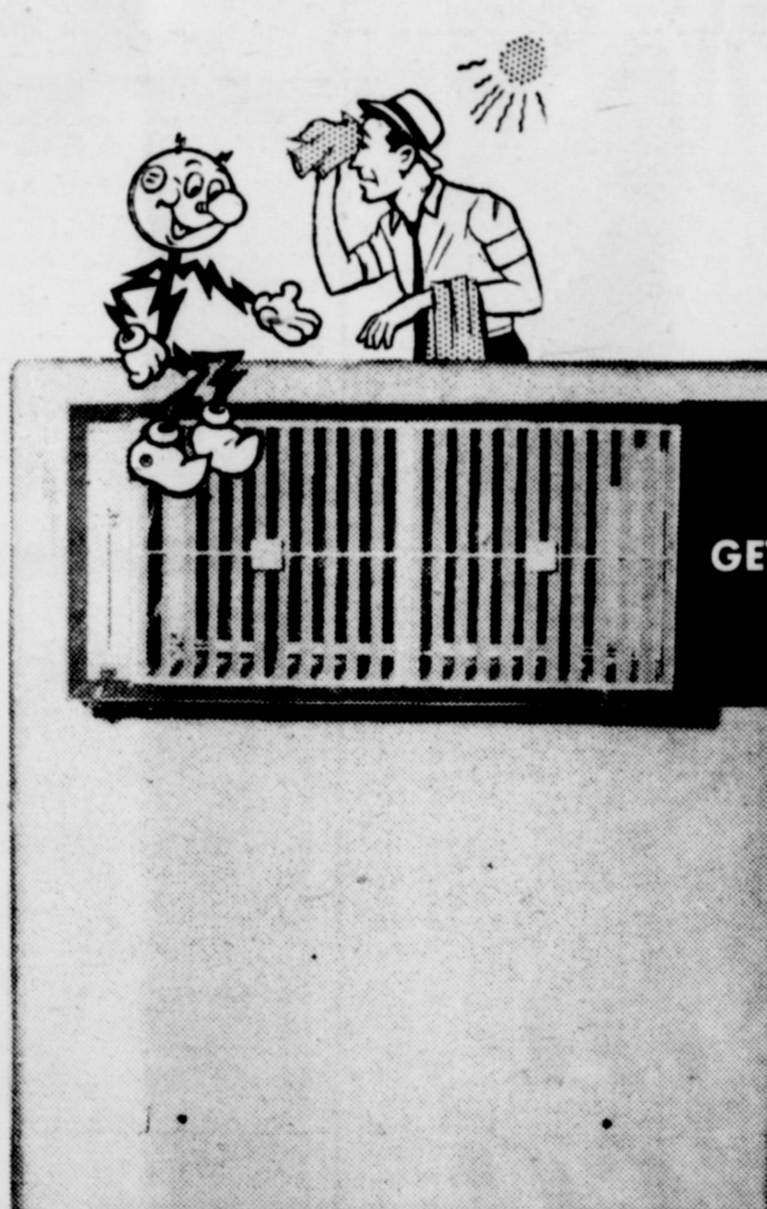

Yarborough Endorses Price Support Program

EASTLAND -- Senator Ralph Yarborough, in a speech at the Texas Oklahoma Southwest Peanut Growers Association Convention, endorsed a price support program for peanuts, comparable to that on other farm products, and deplored that "Agriculture Secretary Benson has opposed changes in regulations that would have put the peanut program on a firm price basis."

Senator Yarborough declared that: "The Republicans at the present time, are doing their best to Bensonize the peanut program. Agriculture Secretary Benson has pushed price support levels on peanuts as low as he possibly can."

"The Republicans have said a great deal about so called losses on the past 6 years (since 1952-1957) the Government has sustained losses in only 2 years on account of price supports on peanuts in the 5 southwestern states including Texas."

"These losses over the whole 6 year period in subsidy payments on account of peanuts grown in all 5 of the southwestern states including Texas, total \$6,300,000. This so-called subsidy to the peanut growers is less than the direct cash subsidies paid by the Government to Braniff Airways in the same period of time. Braniff Airways, whose biggest stockholder is now running for the Senate on a platform opposing farm subsidies, received over \$7,600,000 in subsidies in the same period."

Peanuts are important to the farm economy of Texas because thousands of Texans count on this crop for the big part of their living. Peanuts are grown in more counties in Texas than cotton. My opponent seems to think it is just fine for his big corporation to get a big subsidy, but all wrong when thousands of Texas farm families get little subsidies," Yarborough said.

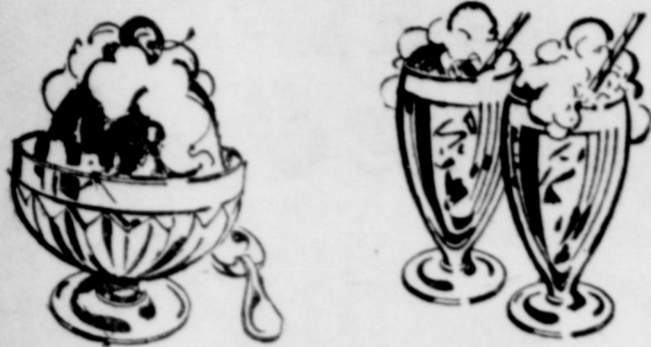

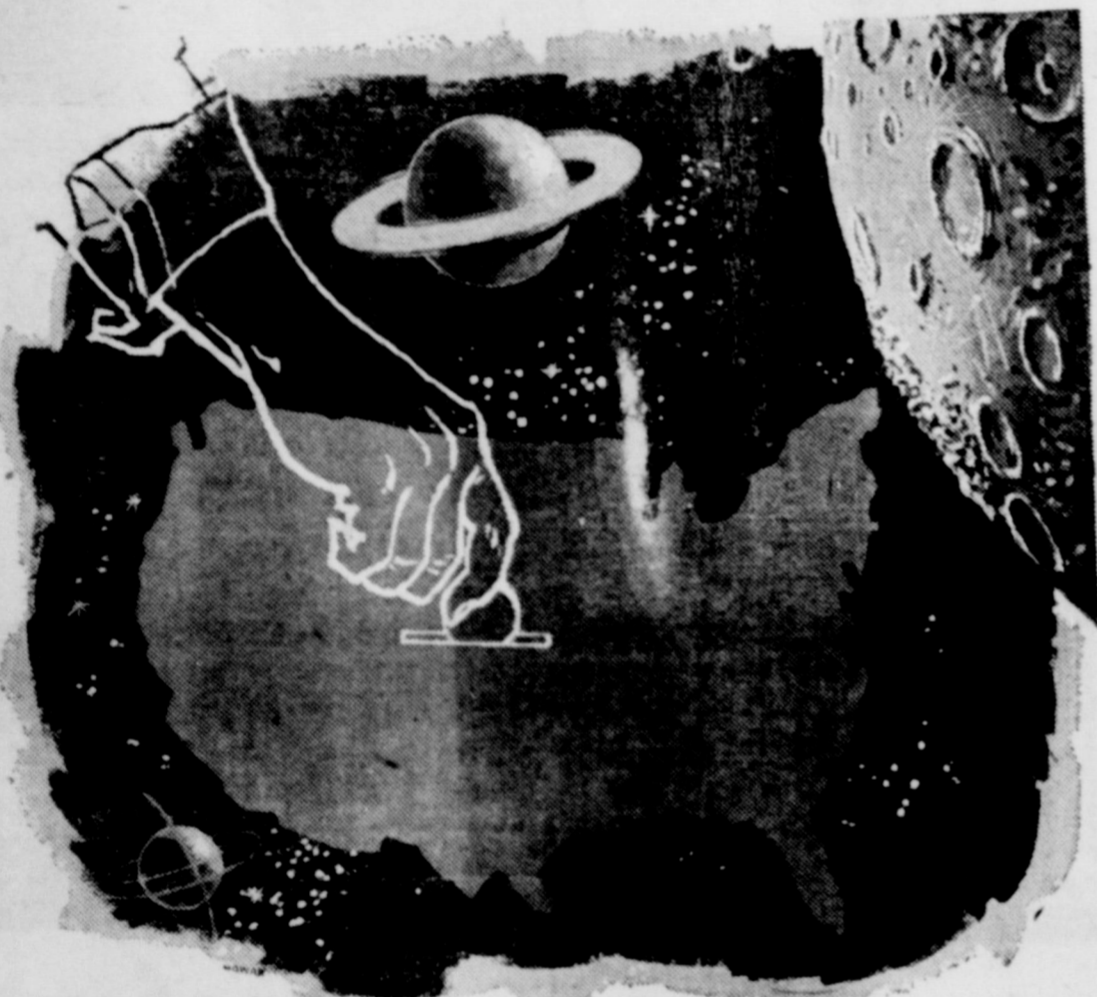
