Rev. L. Jackson, 85, Rites Held At Temple; Burial Here Sunday

Funeral services were held in Temple Sunday for Rev. L. Jackson, long-time resident of Cross Plains. Death came at the age of 85.

The last year of Rev. Jackson's extended illness was spent in the Veterans Administration hospital. He was a soldier in the Spanish-American War, of which few veterans remain.

Rev. Jackson was a former student of East Texas State Teachers College, Commerce, Tex., and a teacher some 10 years before entering the ministry where he was assigned to the New Mexico Conference.

Also surviving are two grandchildren, Terry and Marsha Jorvill; three sisters, Inez Chumbley, Dallas, Daisy Rains, Fairlie, and Clara George, Mt. Pleasant; two brothers, Wilbur and Otis Jackson of Commerce, and a host of nephews and nieces.

Masonic Lodge No. 627 of Cross Plains was in charge of graveside services in the local cemetery Sunday at 3 p.m.

Former Cottonwood Man Buried At Rising Star

Funeral services for N. B. (Newt) Montgomery, 61, who resided three miles south of Rising Star, were conducted at 11 a.m. Saturday in the Higginbotham Funeral Chapel in Rising Star with the Rev. Hershel Smith officiating.

Ex-Convict Gets Five Year Sentence For Burglary Here

A 42nd District Court jury in Baird found William Martin Hawkins, 41, guilty of burglarizing the Dillard Drilling Co. here on the night of April 20, and assessed his punishment at five years in the state penitentiary.

Hawkins has served time in Oklahoma and Wyoming prisons and is also under a five-year sentence from Sweetwater at this time. He will stand trial in Waco on forgery charges before being sent to Huntsville. Law enforcement officials here reported that Texas prison officials have a hold order on him when he completes his prison term in this state from California law enforcement officers. He is charged with forgery there, also.

He broke into the local drilling company offices and stole a typewriter and check-writing machine, along with a book of checks on the First State Bank of Rising Star. Forged checks stopped at the Rising Star bank, led to his identification in Waco, and he was apprehended in a small town on the Oklahoma-Kansas line and returned to the Sweetwater jail where he was tried first on forgery charges.

Sheriff Homer Pruet and Deputy Alex Shocklee conducted the local investigation and were responsible for his identification in Waco.

Hawkins' two five-year sentences are to be served concurrently, it was said.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou has an odd idea for whipping inflation, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor: Talk about living in a fast age, here I was out here on my farm gathering my forces to whip the recession when I opened up a copy of a newspaper. I found in the copy by my mail box this morning, and found it was already over, and the thing to be doing now is to start whipping inflation.

That's one of the troubles with reading newspapers, all you do is bring more problems to your attention you'd never know existed if you hadn't read about them. If it hadn't been for newspapers right now I wouldn't be any more worried about the Middle East than the Middle East is about me.

However, since I've always tried to do my duty, so long as it was me, not the other fellow, defining the duty, I was interested in reading President Eisenhower's views on how to stop inflation.

He says both labor and business have got to stop raising prices unnecessarily, labor to stop asking for higher wages without a corresponding increase in production, and business to stop raising prices just because it figures it can.

Now here's my position; as I'm a farmer, I don't guess you could

call me a laborer, at least I don't work for wages, sometimes don't work at all, so I guess you could call me a business man, if you want to be careless with the term, and I wish to state to President Eisenhower that I will back him up 100 per cent in this fight against inflation and he won't catch me raising the price of a thing I grow.

What this country needs is a car manufacturer who will work all year making a big stack of automobiles and then haul them to town and ask somebody what he'll give him for them. That's the way to whip inflation. Maybe not the way to stay in the car-making business, but it'd sure be anti-inflationary.

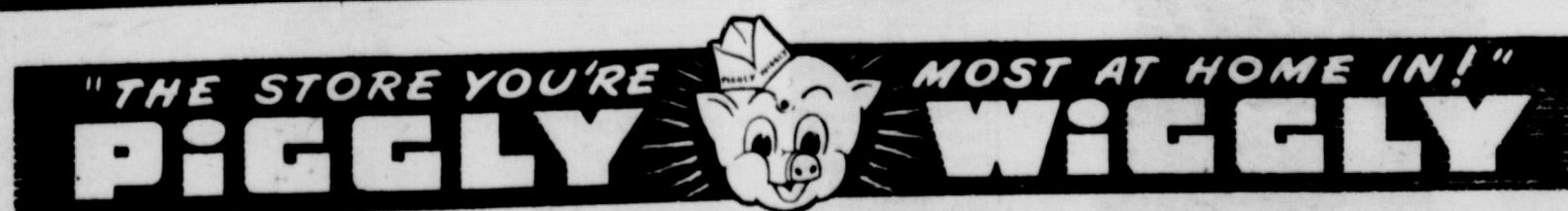

# Highlights AND Sidelights

**AUSTIN, Tex.** — Texas Legislative Budget Board is somewhat in the position of the harassed husband who's struggling with a stack of unpaid bills when his wife announces the children all need new shoes.

Budget Board works out a recommended state spending plan in advance of each regular legislative session. This year, to make "ends meet", the Board will have to stretch a shorter rope over more territory.

Briefly, the horns of the dilemma are these:  
 Horn 1. For the next biennium state agencies have turned in requests to the Budget Board for \$568,000,000 more than they received for the current two-year appropriation period.

Horn 2. Official predictions indicate the state is far from having enough money to grant increases. Instead, it may start the next two-year fiscal period \$100,000,000 short of enough money just to maintain the present level of spending.

That leaves a potential gap of some \$468,000,000 between the two horns—money requested and money in sight. For the next Legislature it's a half-billion-dollar headache.

As far as can be seen, closing the gap would involve either (1) sharp cuts in state spending, (2) enactment of a fair-sized new tax or (3) letting the state government go into debt.

None of these courses likely would be either painless or popular. Third possibly is virtually prohibited by the Constitution which says no appropriation in excess of revenue in sight can be passed "save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each house."

In the past the Budget Board has limited its spending recommendations to foreseeable revenue under existing tax laws. Making up the board are lieutenant governor, speaker of the house and eight other legislators.

More Here, More There—How did new money requests get up to \$568,000,000 when the present state budget is at an all-time high of more than \$2,000,000,000?

Big figure results from a lot of requests from a lot of state departments and institutions. Examples:

State colleges, faced with increasing enrollments, want \$49,000,000 more.

State Water Board, charged with stepped-up water conservation planning program, asked for a nearly double appropriation of \$3,596,180.

Hospitals and special schools asked for a 31.5 per cent increase, up to \$114,000,000.

State Youth Council asked substantial increases for the facilities it operates including a 99.5 per cent increase (to \$4,745,925) for the severely overcrowded Gatesville School for boys.

"How Much" Labels — Budget Board has proposed enactment of a "price tag" procedure to help lawmakers keep track of just how much each measure they consider would cost.

Suggested bill would require that each spending bill be accompanied by an itemized list (with prices) of the expenditures it would involve.

It was seen as a means of keeping a tighter check on the tax dollar.

More Time for Teaching—Giving teachers fewer extra chores and more time to teach, has been suggested as a means to relieve the shortage of qualified instructors.

Texas Education Agency conducted a survey on ways to make better use of existing teachers and school buildings. Resulting report noted the many miscellaneous tasks that fall to teachers—keeping up with lunch money, football tickets and charity drives; sponsoring athletic events and special programs; keeping extensive records. Use of teaching aides and secretaries was suggested to free teachers to concentrate on class work.

In regard to building use, the report suggested consideration of a longer school year, a longer school day and greater use of special purpose rooms such as laboratories, shops, homemaking departments, etc.

Fresh Start—After months of upheaval and dissension, the State Insurance Liquidator's office is reorganized and off to a new start.

C. H. Langdeau, newly appointed liquidator, has announced the names of nine attorneys who will make up his legal staff.

They are Cecil C. Rotsch, general counsel, John R. Grace, Clay Cotton, V. F. Taylor, Horace Wimberly, Art M. LeCroix, J. C. Thomas, William Colburn and Hoyt Cole.

Missing from the scene will be Kenne Allred Jr. who had been appointed by Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts as receiver for all insurance liquidation cases in his court. Betts had refused to accept Langdeau as receiver. Langdeau was appointed by Insurance Commissioner William A. Harrison.

Situation was resolved when the State Supreme Court ruled that Betts must accept Langdeau.

Langdeau said his staff would have to do extensive investigating before deciding whether to pursue a \$15,000,000 damage suit Allred had filed in connection with the ICT bankruptcy. Suit charges some 54 different corporations, including some famed names in the financial world, with having some responsibility for the building up of a

fraudulent enterprise.  
 More Money for Farmers—An overall increase of 3 per cent in Texas farm prices is reported by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Principal gain came in higher prices for new-season cotton, hogs, beef cattle and calves. Slight gains were shown for corn, oats, barley, hay and potatoes. Dairy products, poultry and eggs registered a seasonal increase.

On the minus side, lower prices were reported for cottonseed, vegetables, food grains, lambs and sheep. Texas 1958 calf crop is expected to total 3,919,000 head, a 5 per cent increase from last year.

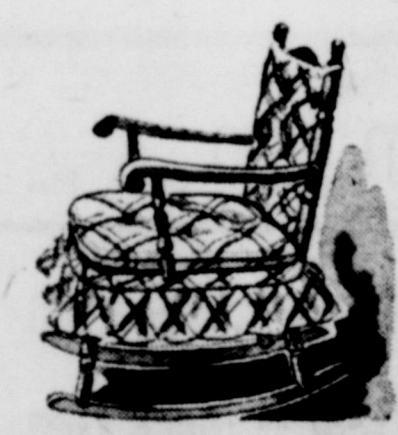

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas Legislative Budget Board is somewhat in the position of the harassed husband who's struggling with a stack of unpaid bills when his wife announces the children all need new shoes.

More Here, More There—How did new money requests get up to \$568,000,000 when the present state budget is at an all-time high of more than \$2,000,000,000?

Big figure results from a lot of requests from a lot of state departments and institutions. Examples:

State colleges, faced with increasing enrollments, want \$49,000,000 more.

State Water Board, charged with stepped-up water conservation planning program, asked for a nearly double appropriation of \$3,596,180.

Hospitals and special schools asked for a 31.5 per cent increase, up to \$114,000,000.

State Youth Council asked substantial increases for the facilities it operates including a 99.5 per cent increase (to \$4,745,925) for the severely overcrowded Gatesville School for boys.

"How Much" Labels — Budget Board has proposed enactment of a "price tag" procedure to help lawmakers keep track of just how much each measure they consider would cost.

Suggested bill would require that each spending bill be accompanied by an itemized list (with prices) of the expenditures it would involve.

It was seen as a means of keeping a tighter check on the tax dollar.

More Time for Teaching—Giving teachers fewer extra chores and more time to teach, has been suggested as a means to relieve the shortage of qualified instructors.

Texas Education Agency conducted a survey on ways to make better use of existing teachers and school buildings. Resulting report noted the many miscellaneous tasks that fall to teachers—keeping up with lunch money, football tickets and charity drives; sponsoring athletic events and special programs; keeping extensive records. Use of teaching aides and secretaries was suggested to free teachers to concentrate on class work.

In regard to building use, the report suggested consideration of a longer school year, a longer school day and greater use of special purpose rooms such as laboratories, shops, homemaking departments, etc.

Fresh Start—After months of upheaval and dissension, the State Insurance Liquidator's office is reorganized and off to a new start.

C. H. Langdeau, newly appointed liquidator, has announced the names of nine attorneys who will make up his legal staff.

They are Cecil C. Rotsch, general counsel, John R. Grace, Clay Cotton, V. F. Taylor, Horace Wimberly, Art M. LeCroix, J. C. Thomas, William Colburn and Hoyt Cole.

Missing from the scene will be Renne Allred Jr. who had been appointed by Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts as receiver for all insurance liquidation cases in his court. Betts had refused to accept Langdeau as receiver. Langdeau was appointed by Insurance Commissioner William A. Harrison.

Situation was resolved when the State Supreme Court ruled that Betts must accept Langdeau.

Langdeau said his staff would have to do extensive investigating before deciding whether to pursue a \$15,000,000 damage suit Allred had filed in connection with the ICT bankruptcy. Suit charges some 54 different corporations, including some famed names in the financial world, with having some responsibility for the building up of a

fraudulent enterprise. More Money for Farmers—An overall increase of 3 per cent in Texas farm prices is reported by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Principal gain came in higher prices for new-season cotton, hogs, beef cattle and calves. Slight gains were shown for corn, oats, barley, hay and potatoes. Dairy products, poultry and eggs registered a seasonal increase.

On the minus side, lower prices were reported for cottonseed, vegetables, food grains, lambs and sheep.

Texas 1958 calf crop is expected to total 3,919,000 head, a 5 per cent increase from last year.

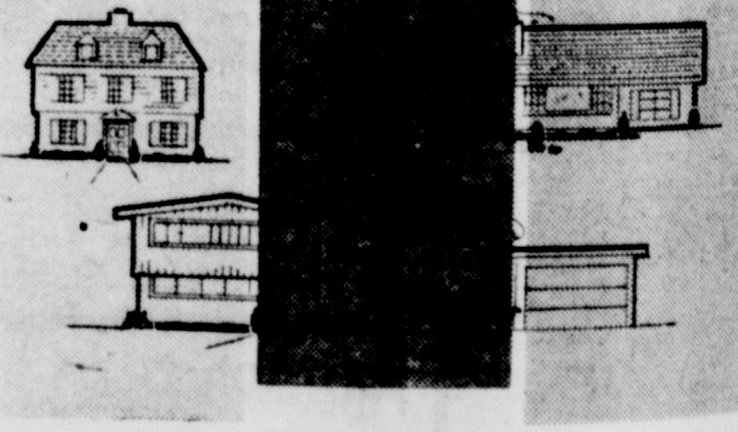

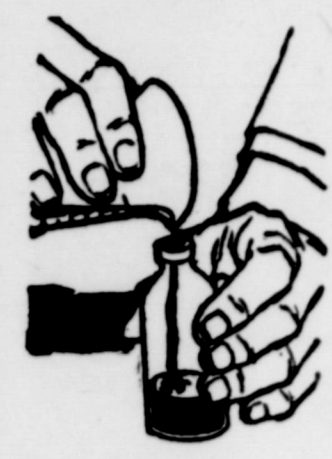

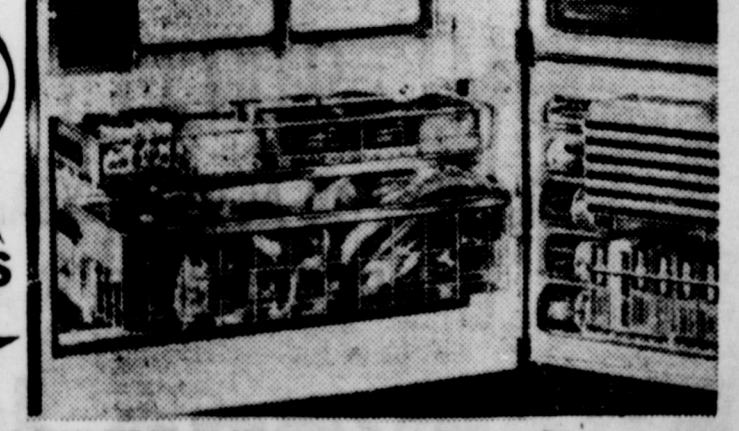
