



Ralph and Marie Roden were presented this week with airline tickets and other material certifying their free trip to Hawaii, won through a statewide drawing conducted by Southwestern Drug Corporation.

Leo Stakemiller, Jr., Field Sales Manager for the company, was in Friona to present the tickets on Tuesday. He pointed out that in 1969, Marie's ticket was drawn for a new color television set in a similar drawing.

"The odds were about 2,500 to one for drawing the free trip to Hawaii. I don't have any idea what the odds would be against drawing two major prizes within four years," Stakemiller told us.

The Maize Days celebration for 1972 is just around the corner. In fact, the events will get off to an early start as the motorcycle races will be held on Sunday, September 24.

The races, a new event this year, are expected to draw entrants from a large section. This will be the only main event prior to the queen's contest on Thursday. Those who are close to motorcycle racing, talk like it could be a big event in only its first time on the schedule.

The Friona Chieftains are off to a good start--with a good, solid test awaiting them this Friday. Muleshoe always provides plenty of opposition for Friona teams, but particularly when the game is played at Muleshoe.

Not since 1959 has a Friona team claimed a win over Muleshoe on the Mules' home field. The 1972 eleven would like to change that trend, having already changed history somewhat this season.

In their season opener, Friona's 34-14 victory over Farwell extended the Chieftains' winning string to three consecutive games over the Steers. Not since the mid-1930s had Friona held a three-game streak over their rivals, and this equals the longest consecutive winning streak for Friona over Farwell.

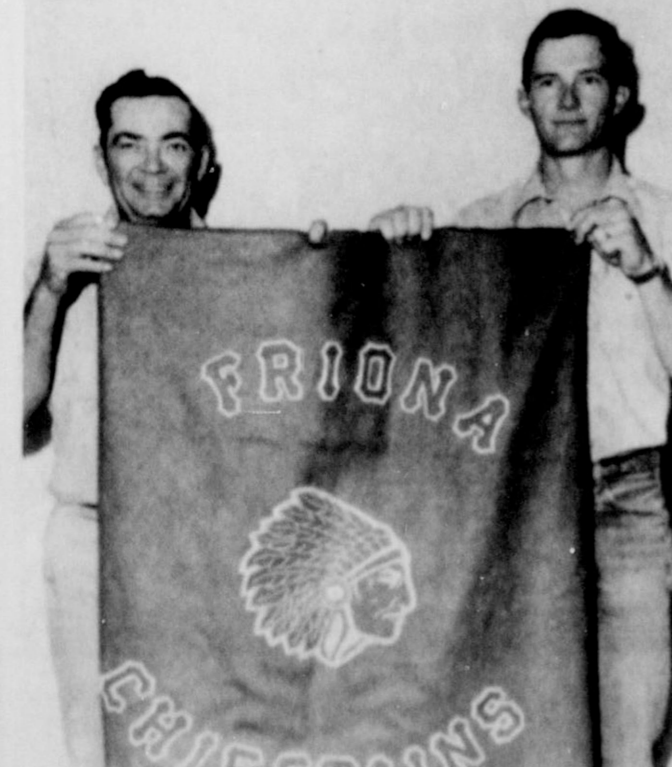
Both Friona and Muleshoe enter Friday's game with 2-0 records. Muleshoe has already beaten two of Friona's District 3-AA opponents. The Mules downed Dimmitt, 20-6 in their opening game, and then they toppled Olton, 21-5 last Friday.

This fall the Mules, who used to be members of our district, will play all five members of Friona's district, meeting Littlefield a week from Friday. This will be a good way of comparing the strength of district teams, if comparative scores can be trusted.

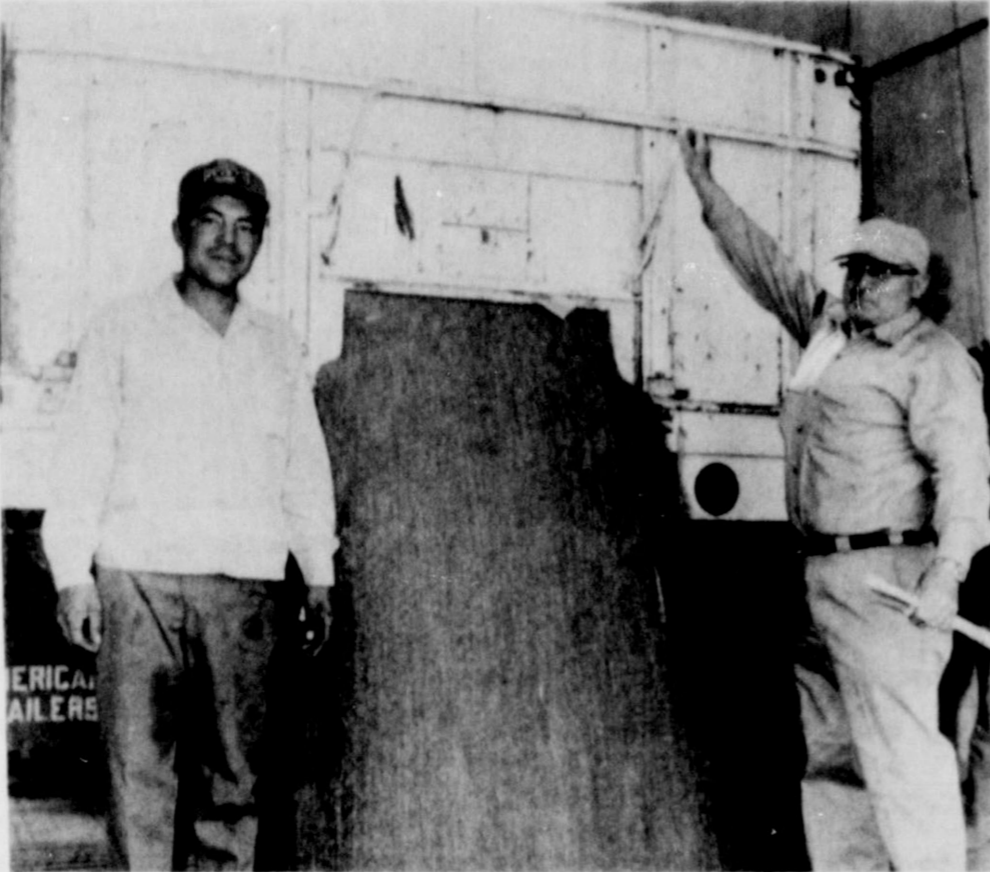
We noticed the other night at the ball game that the Chieftain Band had a hard time competing for the attention of the crowd due to the comings and goings for halftime refreshments.

Boggess Harvests First '72 Maize

The first load of maize for the Friona area--and possibly the first load for Parmer County this year was marketed on Monday morning by Eugene Boggess at Friona Wheat Growers.

Boggess, who also had the first load in 1971, had the maize at the elevator at 8:30 Monday morning. He cut three loads

on Monday, and four more on Tuesday, as the area was blessed with sunny weather.

Later in the day, John S. Thompson brought in the area's first load of shelled corn for 1972. Thompson marketed a load of Pioneer 3369-A, which tested 17.5 per cent moisture, also to Friona Wheat Growers. Farmers were smiling this week as hot, sunny weather

smiled on the area's crops.

Most people are of the opinion that this year's crops are among the best in history, if the weather will give them the proper break from here on out. "I think the maize and corn is the best we've ever had, if the weather will let us harvest them," said Arthur Drake, manager of Friona Wheat Growers.

RECORD SHATTERED

Scores Improve In Football Contest

Scores improved considerably in the Friona Star's football predicting contest--and another all-time record number of entries were received for the second week's contest.

Gary Renner and John Barker, two former Chieftain quar-

terbacks, proved that they still have some football savvy by correctly predicting all 16 games on the slate. Renner claimed the weekly first prize of \$5.00 on the basis of his tie-breaker guess, and Barker received the \$3.00 second prize.

A total of 231 contestants entered the second week's contest, an increase of ten over the previous week's high. Normally, the highest number of entries comes on the first week of the contest, so setting the record on the second week was unusual.

Third prize for the week went to Andrea Wilkins, who was one of ten contestants correctly picking 15 games. She missed the tie-breaker score by only two points, guessing the Friona-Bovina score at 28-6, when it actually was 26-6.

Renner claimed first place by guessing the Friona-Bovina score at 28-8, while Barker predicted Friona would win by 26-17. Renner quarterbacked the Chiefs in 1962 and 1963, and Barker was the signal-caller in 1966 and 1967.

Barely missing out on third place were three contestants who also had 15 games correct, and missed the tie-breaker score by only three points. They

The Annual Maize Days Pet Show will be held this year on Friday afternoon, September 29 at 4:30 across the street from the Library in the City Park. Chairman Mrs. Bill Ellis has announced that the show will be cancelled this year in case of rain.

Local veterinarian Dr. Gary Cash will judge the show. All types of pets except farm animals are acceptable to be entered. A pet does not have to be pedigreed, talented or trained to be a possible ribbon winner.

"This show is just for fun and to give the youngsters some feeling of actual participation in Maize Days," Mrs. Ellis notes. "So encourage your children to get their pets cleaned up, dressed up, decorated or whatever for the big show after school Friday."

Cycle Races To Begin Maize Days

Friona's 16th annual Maize Days Festival will kick off on Sunday, with a new event, the motorcycle races, as the first major event on the weeklong schedule.

The cycle races, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, are expected to draw a large crowd of participants and spectators alike.

The races will be held two miles north on Highway 214 and one mile west. Races begin at 2 p.m. Sunday afternoon.

Sanctioned by the American Motorcycle Assn., there will be six classes in the competition. These will be micro mini-man (12 and under), mini-man (13 and under), 100 cc, 125 cc, 250 cc and open class.

An admission of \$1.00 will be charged for adults, with children admitted free.

Those in charge of the races said it was hard to say how many participants the event would draw, since they had no pre-registration. However, there are a good number of local cyclists, and several from out of town are expected.

One of the area racers who will compete is Gary Bailey of Clovis, who is expected to be an entrant in the open class. "It will be worth the price of admission just to watch him ride," a spokesman for the races said.

Other contestants may come from as far away as Amarillo.

No other major event is scheduled until Thursday, although the carnival rides of Strate's Midwest Shows will begin setting up on Monday at the City Park. The rides, along with the various booths sponsored by the local clubs and organizations, will feature the first two days of the eventful week.

Other main events include the Queen's Contest, set for Thursday night, September 28 at the high school auditorium. The pet show is scheduled for Friday afternoon at 4:30 p.m., across the street from the library.

Saturday is the big day. It starts early and ends late, with a pancake breakfast beginning at 6 a.m. at the Masonic Lodge.

The parade will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday. Expected entrants include the Khiva Clowns and go-carters from Lubbock and Amarillo. The big free barbecue will be at 12 noon.

An air show is set for 2 p.m. at Benger Air Park. Drawings will be held at 4 p.m. in the City Park, and the celebration will end with a square dance on Sixth Street east of Main, benefitting the Friona Public Library. Other events, such as the Antique Show, are slated during the week.

FRIDAY'S FOOTBALL GAME

Muleshoe Team Termed Toughest Foe To Date

Friona High School's Chieftains will face their stiffest test of the young 1972 football season on Friday, when they travel to Muleshoe to battle the District 1-AAA Mules. Game time at Muleshoe will be 8 p.m.

Both teams have identical 2-0 records, but for Friona, it will be their first venture outside Parmer County, having beaten their two county rivals with comparative ease in their first two games.

Muleshoe, meanwhile, holds wins over Dimmitt and Olton, both District 3-AA mates of Friona's.

Coach Bob Owen told members of the Friona Booster Club this week that he definitely thought the Mules were the best team Friona has met to date, and that it would take an improved performance on the part of the Chieftains for a win.

"We can't make the mistakes we made in our first two games and win this one," Owen told the Boosters on Monday. He pointed out that each time Muleshoe got a break against Olton they scored a touchdown.

"Muleshoe will be remembering last year," Owen stated, in reference to last year's 13-6 Friona win, which snapped six straight wins by Muleshoe over Friona teams. In that game, Muleshoe roamed at will between the 20-yard lines, leading in statistics, but each time they neared Friona's goal, the Chieftain defense stiffened.

Owen said he felt that even though Muleshoe had lost its

"Super Star," runningback Bobby Hayes, that the Mules had a better all-around team this fall, with more polish, better size, etc. Muleshoe will field the largest team Friona has faced to date.

Muleshoe has returning only three starters, backfield ace David Wheat, George Mitchell, and defensive standout Jerry Bare. Like Friona, the Mules say their biggest problem is depth. They were supposed to be re-building this year after a 6-4 season in 1971, but the team stands 2-0, so it must have been a quick re-building job.

Friona, meanwhile, should be at near top strength for the game. James Perrea, who missed the Bovina game due to an arm injury, will be back at his guard position. However, halfback James Bartlett sustained a light concussion in the Bovina game, and has been held out of contact work this week, and his status as a starter was up in the air early in the week.

Friona has not won a game on Muleshoe's home field since October 9, 1959, when the Chiefs under coach Earl Smith scored a 24-14 win. As mentioned, last year's 13-6 Friona win snapped a six-game Muleshoe streak.

The last time Friona invaded Muleshoe, in 1970, the Mules were in the midst of a 14-game losing streak--but they promptly snapped the streak with a convincing 20-7 win.

Hansen will be assigned to the Plainview, Texas Division with corporate responsibilities for breaking and fabrication production. He was with Rath Packing Company for twenty-six years and with Iowa Beef Processors for five years.

Opportunity Plan Needs Additional Funds

Are you concerned about the problems of our young people? If the answer is "yes" then you have a wonderful opportunity to do something to help.

The Girl Scouts of Friona are a going concern due to the efforts of a splendid group of leaders who have inspired dozens of our finest young ladies.

The Boy Scouts are in the process of reorganization. Adult leaders need all the help they can get--and here is where you, Mr. and Mrs. Friona, come in.

They need not only money--after all what can you really buy? They need parents who will back up the Scouting program. If you don't know as much as you should about the fine points of Scouting, attend a few meetings, do a little reading, help Jr. with his projects and five will get you ten you will then want a piece of the action!

For a starter take a look at one of the men who devoted his life to helping boys appreciate this big beautiful World that too many of us take for granted.

He was born in 1860 in South Shields, Durham, England. When he was six years old the family moved to Canada and he spent his boyhood wandering through remote mountains and forests.

His talents for drawing, painting and writing led him back to school in England and Europe. Here he studied under various masters in Paris, France.

Returning to the western United States he began publishing books of nature stories which he illustrated.

In 1902 he organized the Woodcraft Indians to help boys learn of woodcraft and nature.

When the Boy Scout movement came to America Seton became a part of it, holding the position of Chief Scout until 1915, when he resigned and founded the Woodcraft League of America.

On September 3 of this year, we were returning from an Indian Pow-wow by way of Santa Fe, N.M., and turned into Seton Village to see the home of this man who had given so much pleasure to this former Scout.

The huge house is now closed to the public, Mr. Seton's vast collections having been moved to Philmont Scout Ranch at Cimarron, N.M.

Several homes are strung out below the "castle" and at one of these we met a couple who in themselves made the entire trip worthwhile. Being neighbors and friends of the Setons they told stories of the Chief and took us to see the Kiva and Hogan that he had built on the property.

These buildings have the interior walls decorated by Chief in authentic Indian designs and colors and are still used by groups of boys.

We stayed awhile and had coffee (without which no Western visit is complete) then back we came to Texas.

Ernest Thompson Seton was a big man, 6'-4", broad and strong with a mane of wavy white hair.

He went to the "Happy Hunting Ground" in 1946; that is according to the way the Paleface figures.

Rest well, Chief--your spirit still lives in the hearts of millions of grateful boys.

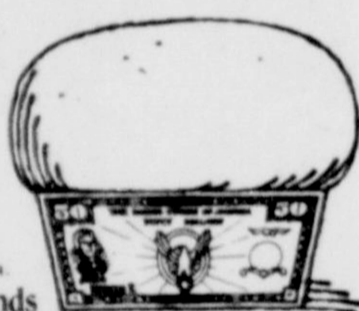
Maybe you can get the gist of all of this: Sensitive persons need encouraging remarks.

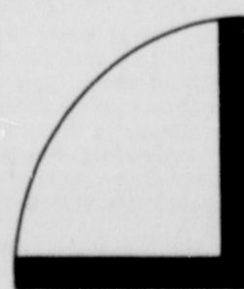

Purpose of the world-wide organization is the improvement of the communities in which the chapters are located and personal development of its members; both objectives being accomplished through variety of project activities.

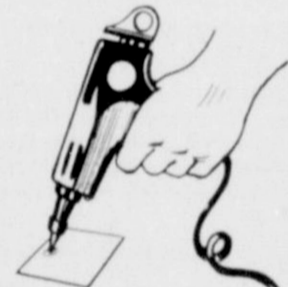

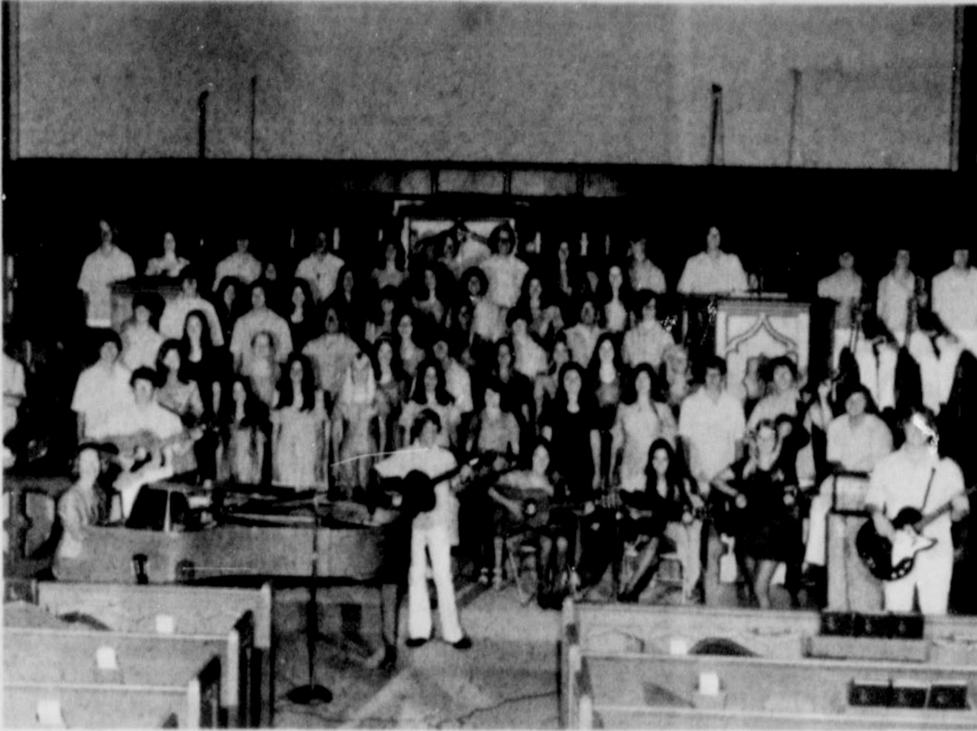

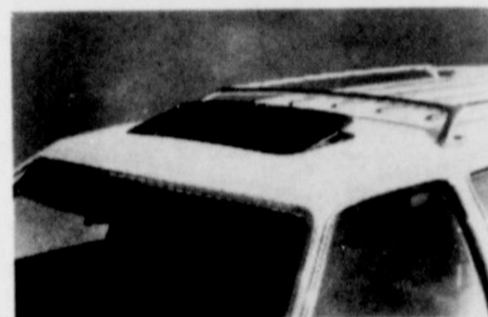

Oldsmobile Features New Compact Model

The 1973 Oldsmobiles, featuring a new compact car, completely redesigned Cutlass models and a long list of engineering advancements, go on display September 21 at Reeve Chevrolet-Olds.

From its compact Omega to the luxurious 98 and Toronado, Oldsmobile spans the automobile market with 27 models, two more than in 1972.

Following are highlights in the 1973 lineup.

OMEGA
Oldsmobile's new entry, the Omega, is built on a 111-inch wheelbase and has an overall length of 197.5 inches. It is offered in three body styles... a two-door coupe, a four-door sedan and a hatchback coupe that has a rear door that opens upward to reveal a flat carpeted load floor extending from the front seat to the rear end when the rear seat back is folded down.

Front and rear bumpers are rigidly mounted to meet new requirements. The bumpers protect the car's safety systems in front-end barrier impacts up to five miles per hour and rear barrier impacts up to 2.5 mph.

The Omega's standard engine is the 250 cubic-inch six-cylinder and the 350 V-8 four-barrel is optional. Other Omega options include power drum and power disc brakes, variable ratio power steering and Turbo Hydra-matic transmission.

CUTLASS MODELS

All intermediate Cutlass models have been completely redesigned for 1973. The design of these cars is new and contemporary, but still readily identifiable as Oldsmobiles.

The intermediate lineup features seven models... two Vista Cruisers, two Cutlass Supremes, one Cutlass 'S' and two Cutlass models. The F-85 nameplate has been discontinued.

The front ends of these cars feature single seven-inch headlamps in place of dual lights. These single sealed beam units have more candle power on low beam than last year's dual headlight system.

The new energy-absorbing front bumper meets the five

mph barrier impact requirements. Grilles are hinged at the bottom and retract with the bumper during a low-speed impact. The Cutlass and Cutlass 'S' have rectangular pattern dual grilles, while the Supreme and Vista Cruiser have a dual vertical bar design.

The 4-4-2 is optional on the Cutlass and the Cutlass 'S' colonnade hardtop coupes. The package includes a specific grille, hood louvers, side striping, hood and deck lid striping. The specially adapted suspension includes front and rear stabilizer bars, higher rate springs and shock absorbers.

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FRIONA SPARKLES

Bovina Feels Sting Of Defense, 26-6

It was a contest of superlatives at Chieftain Field last Friday. Bovina came up with the longest run, but all it did was save an otherwise dismal night for the Mustangs, who fell to the Friona Chieftains, 26-6.

Although the Mustangs got a 93-yard pass interception return by Kim Rundell, which tightened up the game somewhat at the time, Bovina was held to only ten net yards on offense—the top defensive effort by Friona in a number of years.

The hard-charging Friona line caught Bovina backfield men behind the line seven times during the game, for losses totalling 54 yards, which thwarted the visitors' offensive effort. The Mustangs managed only two first downs during the contest.

One of the game's highlights for Friona was an unbelievable 80-yard punt by Johnny Bandy, which wasn't executed according to the script, but perhaps should become Bandy's standard method of punting.

Early in the game, Friona failed to move, and found themselves facing fourth down from their own eight yard line. A low snap to Bandy caused him to fumble the ball, and he started to run with the ball as defenders tried to down him.

However, Bandy suddenly kicked the ball, and to perhaps even his own amazement, it arched high down field and bounced and rolled to the Bovina 12-80 yards away! This not only got Friona out of a hole, but put the Mustangs into one and forced them to soon give up the ball.

Bandy picked up a first down, and then passed 15 yards to James Bartlett, who made a nice catch at the Bovina 15. Three plays later Bandy raced nine yards on a keeper play, to give Friona the lead at 6-0. Kevin Wiseman's kick made it 7-0.

Bovina fumbled the kickoff, but penalties kept the Chieftains from cashing in. This time, Bandy's high punt was smartly downed on the Bovina one-yard line by Willie Bailey, putting the

Mustangs in the hole again. A short punt a few minutes later by Bovina gave Friona great field position at the Bovina 25. It took Friona only five plays to score. Bartlett set it up with a nice 31-yard run, finally stopped at the four.

Mario Perea got the TD on a third down play from the one. An offside penalty put the ball at the one for the point try and Friona elected to go for two points. However, Perea was stopped short and the score remained 13-0 with only 2:04 gone in the second period.

This turned out to be the half-time score, and the Mustangs had done a good job of stopping the Chieftains' speedy halfback, Louis Lee, who only had one net yard at the intermission.

However, Lee almost broke the second half kickoff all the way back for a TD. He fielded the ball at his 25 and was finally forced out of bounds at the Bovina 17.

With this kind of position, Friona soon added to its lead. A ten-yard pass from Bandy to Ted King made up for a penalty, and Bandy got the score on a one-yard run around end. Wiseman's kick made the count 20-0 with only 1:33 gone in the second half.

A little later, Friona began a drive from its own 46, and thanks to two pass catches by King, drove to the Bovina seven.

On third down, Bandy tried a swing pass to Bartlett. The ball bounced out of Bartlett's hands, and right into the waiting arms of the opposing quarterback, Kim Rundell, who found 93 yards of uncontested space in front of him.

With the momentum starting the other way, Rundell had little trouble making it all the way for the touchdown. A running try for points failed, but Bovina had made a game of it at 20-6 with 2:49 left in the period, stopping the Chieftain scoring threat in the process of scoring for themselves.

Early in the final quarter, Lee finally broke loose, and scooted

60 yards for a touchdown which put the game out of reach at 26-6.

Lee narrowly missed another TD a short time later, being run out of bounds at the Bovina seven on a fourth down play, after a 19-yard gain. The speedy halfback gained 78 of his 92 yards rushing in the fourth quarter of the game.

Friona was able to run out the clock by having the ball for the last five minutes of the game. Clay Bandy came on to direct the team to two first downs, moving to the Bovina 18 as time was running out.

Only comparable game defensively for Friona was in the third game of the 1968 season, when the Chieftains stopped Tucumcari, N.M. on 41 net yards.

The win left Friona leading in the series, 9-3-1. The only tie in the 13-game set came here last season, in a 6-6 standoff on a misty, wet night.

Late Game Heroics Win

Friona's eighth grade Braves did all of their scoring in the fourth quarter, and a safety proved to be the winning margin, as they edged Bovina, 16-14 in a game at Bovina last Thursday.

Trailing 6-0, Friona got on the scoreboard with only 6:54 left in the game when a bad snap to the Bovina punter forced him to be tackled in the end zone.

This left Friona trailing, 6-2. Getting the ball back following the safety, Friona drove 72 yards, with Lester Aven going seven yards for the score. The PAT try failed, but Friona led, 8-6 with 3:03 left on the clock.

Bovina was held, and Friona took over on their 41-yard line. On the first play, Aven went the distance for the TD, and Leslie Broadhurst ran for two points and a 16-6 Friona lead with 1:33 left to play.

Bovina rallied for a score as time ran out on the clock, and also ran the two-pointer, but it wasn't enough. The win left the Braves 2-0 for the year.

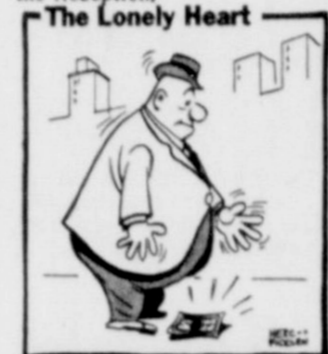

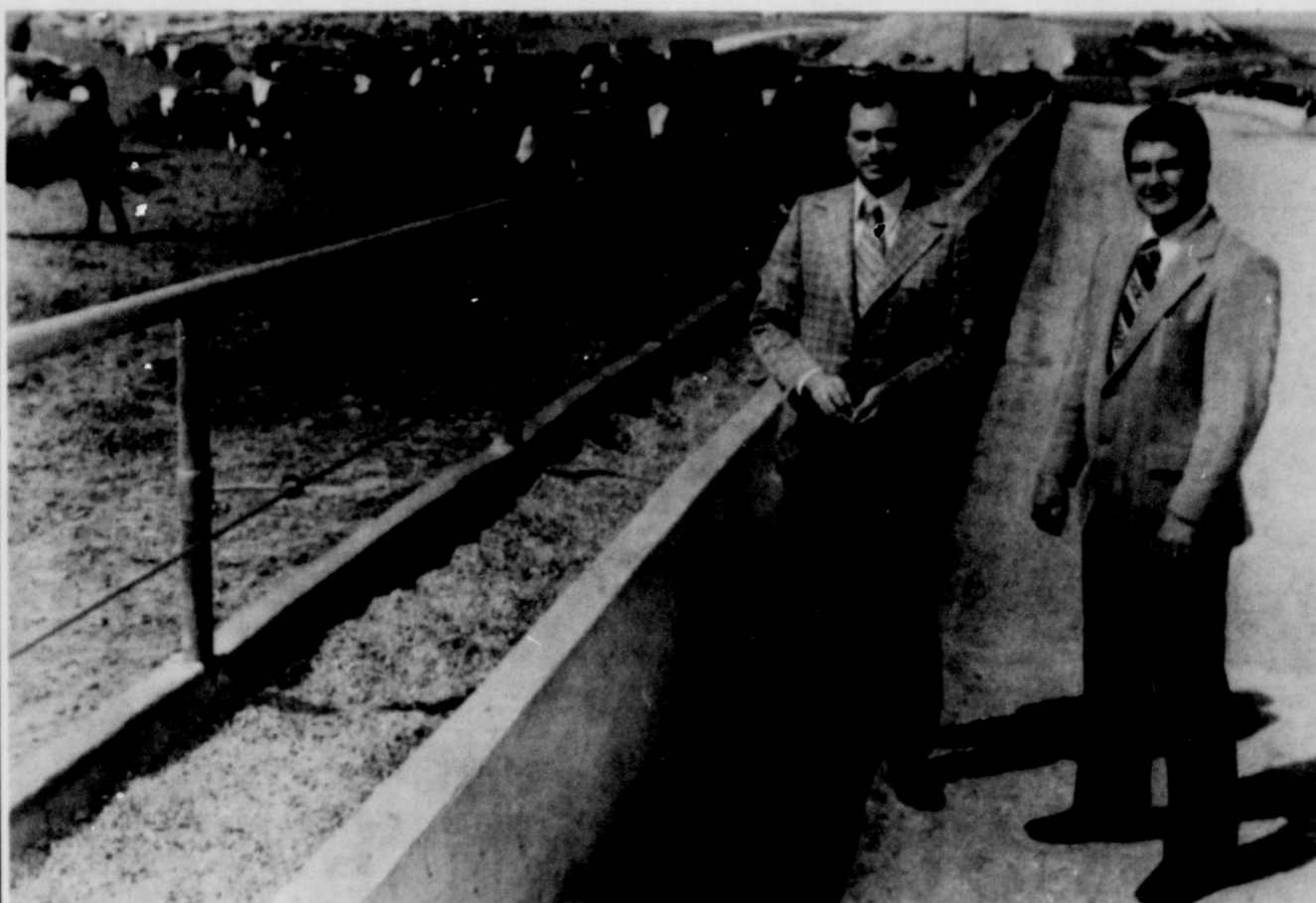

Johnson spent his boyhood in Lubbock and later his family moved to a farm near Friona in Parmer County. He attended New Mexico Military Institute and was graduated from Friona High School. He holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in agricultural economics from Texas Tech University.

He was awarded both the State Farmer and American Farmer degrees in the PFA. The specialist is a member of the American Agricultural Economics Association.

While attending Texas Tech, Johnson worked as a student assistant and research assistant in the university's Department of Agricultural Economics.

Read Hebrews 13:1-8

Remember those in prison as if you were there with them; and those who are being maltreated, for you like them are still in the world. (Hebrews 13:3, NEB)

It was June 1944. Because Polish education was strictly forbidden, the schools were closed, but there was underground teaching in private houses ever since Nazi occupation in 1939.

One evening I was teaching Polish history to three pupils. Suddenly another rushed in, breathless and pale. "There is a roundup at the corner of this street!" he said. "The professor of math and his pupils have been captured."

We were all seized with fear. Being caught during underground teaching meant inevitable death in a concentration camp.

We stood up, bowed our heads, and prayed for all people suffering and dying for Poland.

Outside the house a little girl was watching out in case the soldiers approached. Half an hour must have passed when she ran into the room, shouting in childish joy: "They have gone!"

PRAYER: Our Father, we thank Thee for the sacrifices, even to the loss of life itself, many have made in loyalty to their heritage and for the faith. We pray that whatever experiences befall us because we are Christian we may accept as serving Thy will and purpose. For Jesus' sake. Amen.

Patrol Investigates 17 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of August, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and nine persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1972 shows a total of 102 accidents, resulting in three persons killed, and 64 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in August, 1972 of 593 accidents resulting in 28 persons killed and 359 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 581 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 400 persons injured. This was 12 more accidents, three more fatalities and 41 less injured in 1972, at the same period of time.
