

Next Tuesday Will Be Dollar Paramount Oil Co., Inc., of Abiene No. 1 H. D. Gary et al, will be a 3,900-foot rotary try, one mile hortheast of Cross Plains. Site is 990 feet from the north and 1,250 feet from the West lines of R. R. feet from the West lines of R. R. Puckett Survey 770.

A re-drill wildcat, also a mile northeast of Cross Plains is the Callihan Interests, Inc., et al, of Abilene No. 1 C. Smith, spotting 330 feet from the South and 1,390 feet from the West lines of J. Dyson Survey 751. Proposed depth was 3,750 feet with rotary.

But, he pointed out, inescapable increase of needs in just one area -public schools-will just about absorb all this extra money

Some Changes Made-Final outcome (from unofficial returns) of voting on proposed constitutional amendments resulted in these changes 1. Appointees to vacated county

judge and justice of the peace posts may serve only until the next general election-not for the remainder of a four-year term

2. Precinct, county and district office holders may not announce for another office without resignthe office they hold.

Cities may elect their officials for four-year, instead of two-year

4. Former Texas Rangers or their widows may receive pensions up to \$80 a month

State funds may be spent to advertise Texas outside the state. 6. Legislature may pass a law providing medical care assistance for people receiving old age pensions, aid to the blind, disabled or dependent children.

7. Legislature may authorize the creation of new hospital districts in Potter, Wichita and Jefferson counties.

On the other hand, when Texans put their foot on the proposal for annual sessions and \$7,500 annual salaries for legislators, it meant lawmakers would face next year's tough taxing session with only 120 "pay" days. Lawmakers will have to get along on \$21 a day for the first 120 days and then their pay stops except when special sessions are called by the governor.

Also turned down was a proposal to set up pension plans for elective officials of counties and precincts. More Leeway Asked-Law setting up the Texas Water Development Board is proving to be something of a straight-jacket.

This opinion was expressed to the Board by J. E. Sturrock of the Texas Water Conservation Associa-"You're doing a good job, tion. but your law needs to be liberalized," said Sturrock.

Board is authorized to lend local governments up to one-third the cost of building a water conservation project. Suggested changes lower interest rates to the bor rowers, provision for lending more than one-third of cost.






