The principal charge in the rate here is a levy of 50 cents for failure to maintain a waterworks meeting fire insurance standards. Efforts are now being made to

> The price this year, has advanced from \$2 to \$3, with the added money set aside to finance an enlarged refuge program.

The 1959-60 stamp was designed by Maynard Reece, Des Moines, Iowa. He won the designing award, with a drawing featuring a Labrador retriever carrying a mallard drake. This is the third award he has won.

In addition to the purchase of duck stamps, hunters and fishernien also paid more than \$20,000,-600 in excise taxes on out-doors equipment last year.

Under apportionments from this federal excise tax, Texas will receive \$207,027.78 for fishing and \$820,000 for wildlife development.

The funds are expended in Texas under the direction of the Game & Fish Commission. Each item must be projected by the Commissien in advance, and approved under the federal program.

Texas, fortunately, has been able to provide the necessary 25 per cent matching funds from its own license sales. With a program like this, it looks like we'll have good hunting and fishing for a long
