





As indicated above, one of the main questions about setting a trotline is whether you want it deep or shallow. Your decision on this part will depend on what kind of catfish you're going after. And what kind are most numerous in the body of water where you are fishing

Yellow and blue cats feed on the water, then stretch the other end bottom. In fact, so do most varieties, except the channel cat. The latter usually will be found close to the top.

Trotline fishing varies a great deal with each locality and each body of water. The fisherman will to well to learn the feeding habits of the fish he seeks. Channel cat will come out of the deep water to feed along the banks on insects that all off the trees and bushes. Therefore, a line stretched paralled with the bank in two or three feet of

water is in a good position to catch some fish Another good place to set your ine is at the mouth of the creek as it empties into the lake, or a creek into a river. The running water usually brings different sorts of food into the deeper, quieter, lake water. Here it is best to set the trotline across the running water, just upstream from the ripples. If there are large patches of attails, or small trees and brush, growing in the water where the blackbirds and other birds roost, a good set can be made by circling the patch. This situation usually occurs in the fall when the birds re migrating. Catfish of all kinds all be caught near such a roost

One caution-there are about as any laws on catfishing as there re lakes, rivers and counties. Always check with your local game warden before going out. There's another good reason for seeing this official. He wants you to catch ish and likely will give you some good tips on where to go and how set your line. Length of line usually is govern-

ed by local regulations. Just remember that two short lines are better than one long line. The minute you start running your line, the hooked fish on it will start fighting to get off. The longer it takes you to reach him, the more chance he has of tearing himself

That one will hold almost any big fish you will get, but it is not so large that most catfish can't get it in their mouths. Some trotliners use 2/0 or 3/0 hooks. It's a matter of choice. You can rig up your own trotline readily enough. Ask your local tackle dealer for supplies and in-

structions. Or, maybe if you are not a do-it-yourself type, get the Octopus Trotline, manufactured by F. Lawrenz Co. of Dallas. This rig features a two-way swivel that prevents the fish from getting off the hook, no matter how much he spins, jerks or twists. As to baits, the sky's the limit.

The catfish will eat anything: shrimp, small bream, live minnows, commercial baits, chicken entrails, liver, etc., ad nauseam.
