PHILOSOPHER CHIDES CRITICS OF HIS STAND ON DEFENDING LAZINESS IN THE WORLD

would the world be today if Hitler had been a lazy man.

It all depends on what a man's busy at. I guess one of the busiest men I've ever read about was that burglar they arrested in California the other day who averaged breaking into a home six nights a week for two years in 20 states.
