Turkey Creek Flood Control Election Questions Answered

Voters in the Turkey Creek Conservation District which is comprised of all land located in the watershed of Turkey Creek from its headwaters, northwest of Cottonwood to the Pecan Bayou, south of Cross Cut, in Brown County, will ballot at the city hall in Cross Plains, Saturday, Sept. 26, on a proposed maintenance tax to be used to operate the district.

The district was created in two parts by a vote of landowners in an election held in September, last year, with a complete district being organized on the watershed in Brown County and another district in Callahan County, but due to a technicality of state laws governing water districts, it was found that the district lacked the power to carry out the wishes of voters who balloted overwhelmingly for the propositions.

Backed by special enabling legislation passed by the State Legislature at its last regular session, directors are now ready to organize the single district, subject to passage of the proposed maintenance tax to be voted on in the coming election.

Since this second election has caused some misunderstanding among some residents of the district, directors have furnished the following questions asked by most voters, together with the answers:

Q. Why a second election for a maintenance tax?

A. First election did not give authority to spend funds for maintenance due to a technicality in the law. This was remedied by HB 959, Act of the 56th Legislature, Regular Session, 1959.

Q. What are the limitations of taxes that could be collected under tax proposal?

A. A maximum of ten cents (10c) on the one hundred dollar (\$100) valuation on an ad valorem basis. Tax will only be collected as needed and not necessarily each year.

Q. Will there be a bond issue involved in this election?

A. No.

Q. Who can vote in this election?

A. Anyone residing within the boundaries of the proposed district who owns taxable property in the district.

Q. Who pays for the construction of flood prevention projects such as Turkey Creek?

A. The Federal government pays all costs of construction and seeding of grasses on the work of improvement.

Q. What are the responsibilities of the local landowners?

A. Landowners must furnish easements, rights-of-way and be responsible for normal maintenance.

The Chinese Communists have another thing coming if they believe they can improve agriculture by putting farmers in towns.

I've seen lots of farmers move to town, but it didn't help their farming ability. Most of them wound up becoming barbers or bankers or grocery clerks or merchants or bookkeepers or they ran for office. Of course I know some city people own farms, but generally speaking they're not causing the agricultural surplus.

Sonic Boom Breaks Large Number of Windows Here

An earth-shaking sonic boom, caused by a jet aircraft breaking the sound barrier, rocked this city about 11:30 Thursday morning, and caused considerable excitement when a number of windows in the business district were shattered by the impact.

A plate glass window in the front of the Hornsby Electric building was shattered as was one in the building formerly occupied by West Texas Utilities Co., and owned by B. K. Eubank. Another plate glass window tumbled to the floor in the building owned by S. O. Montgomery and formerly occupied by the McCuin Insurance Agency.

A number of smaller windows were broken, including several in the second floor of the Citizens State Bank building.

Buffaloes Score First

The Buffaloes drew first blood, scoring the first time they had the ball. The locals took the opening kick-off and marched 67 yards for the counter. Left Halfback Alvin Hutchins banged his way over right tackle into pay dirt from six yards out for the Buffs first score of the season. For the two points after touchdown, Quarterback Doug Dallas attempted a keeper over right tackle but was stopped short.

In seven plays the Buffs marched the 67 yards to score mainly on end sweeps gobbling up the yardage. Fullback Claude Beeler picked up 30 yards in three carries, and Hutchins got 28 yards in as many tries.

But the Bears were not to be denied, as they stormed back with 2:17 left in the first quarter for a touchdown. The visitors marched 66 yards in 17 plays to knot the score with Halfback Ross Odell bursting the drive with a 16-yard carry up the middle. Odell was stopped as he attempted right end for the two points.

Early in the second quarter, Baird went into the lead for the first time as the Bears capitalized on a Buffalo fumble on the Cross Plains nine-yard line. Right Halfback Mike Odom moved the Bears to the Buff one, and then Odell knifed over right tackle into the "promised land" for the touchdown, with 2:00 gone in the second period.

Buff Fullback Beeler ripped off a 69-yard run for a TD in the second only to see it nullified on a clipping penalty at the Baird 19. The Buffs then managed to move the pigskin to the Bear 13 before they were stopped. Later the locals mounted another threat only to lose the ball on Baird's 22.

Big Third Quarter
Cross Plains used the air lanes to good advantage in the third quarter, scoring twice on passes.

Buff Tackle Elmer Graham recovered a Bear fumble on the Baird 30 to set up the second Buff tally. Hutchins hit the line for two, then right Halfback John Baird tossed the pighide to Left End Grady Scott in the left flat. Scott then scampered down the sideline for the touchdown. The play covered 28 yards, and 1:45 had elapsed in the third stanza. Beeler was stopped short of the goal line as he attempted left end for the points after.

Baird came right back, taking the kickoff and marching 59 yards in 14 plays to break the 12-12 tie. Odell terminated the drive with a one-yard blast over right guard for the six points. Again Baird failed in their try for the two points. The score read 18-12, Baird.

Buff Back Into Lead
With only three seconds left in the third quarter, Cross Plains took the lead for the second time.

Buff Left Tackle Tommy Adams recovered a Baird bobble on the visitors 34. The next play saw Cross Plains draw a 15-yard penalty which moved the ball back to the Baird 49. Dallas, on the next play, hit Baird with a pass in the left flat. Baird then rambled down the sideline into pay dirt, once again tying the score at 18-18. The pass and run covered 49 yards.

Cross Plains forged into the lead for the second time as Baird tossed to Scott, waiting inside "the land of plenty", giving the Buffs two points and a 20-18 lead.

The Bears then took advantage of the air lanes and scored the winning touchdown with three minutes gone in the final canto. Facing third and eight to go, Quarterback Calvin Barnes hit Halfback Mike Odom with an aerial on approximately the Buff 40. Odom then outran the Buff defenders for the final marker. Again the points after failed and the final score read Baird, 24 and Cross Plains, 20.

The Buffaloes managed one threat in the fourth, penetrating hostile ground to the 15, but a deadly fumble stopped the drive. In the waning seconds, the Buffs tried a desperation aerial attack but couldn't connect.

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State Capital NEWS

By Vern Sanford

Austin, Tex.—People who have been writing Gov. Price Daniel in the past few weeks say "no more taxes, please."

In mid-August the governor announced he would call a special session to raise money for higher teacher pay only if the people demanded it. He said he also wanted to find out how legislators felt after they had had a chance to be on for a while and talk with the folks in their districts.

In the weeks that have transpired, there has been a heavy volume of mail running strongly against the special session idea. Law-makers also are taking a dim view of being called for a fifth round of money hunting.

Whether this means that prospects for a teacher pay session are out remains to be seen. It could mean only that teachers, their families, friends and other school-minded people have been too busy with "back to school" work to get their letters off to the governor.

On the other hand, it could mean that the people are getting tired of taxes, and spiraling wage scales. Pinch Already Pelt—Perhaps the reason many Texans weren't eager to have another tax session was that they were beginning to feel the bite of new taxes already passed this year.

State Treasurer Jesse James' report shows that many stocked up on cigarettes and liquor during August, before higher taxes on these items became effective in September.

Sale of liquor and cigarette tax stamps soared to \$5,227,624 in August. This is \$1,098,496 higher than sales for August, 1968.

No statistics are available for the pre-tax selling of items which got hit for the first time. But heavy

advertising campaigns indicated that merchants hoped buyers would clear their stores during August of such items as air conditioners in order to avoid the 3 per cent sales tax.

Governor Defends Veto—Governor Daniel's office has suggested that the State Hospital Board tap its \$1,200,000 emergency fund to eliminate any fire hazard to the 800 oldsters housed in the Confederate Home in Austin.

Governor Daniel vetoed a legislative appropriation to build new quarters for these patients. His action brought some reactions of surprise and criticism. State Hospital system's safety officer was quoted as labeling the 50-year-old frame building as "definite fire hazard."

A spokesman for the governor reported that the appropriation the governor scratched would not have emptied the Confederate Home. He said it would have provided quarters for only about 300.

He suggested the State Hospital Board use its emergency funds to redouble safety precautions for the old folks.

Long Time, No Pay—Legislative employees will have to wait until Nov. 4 to get their next pay check.

In its last special session the Legislature approved \$330,000 fund transfer for these between-sessions expenses by voice vote. But all bills passed by a two-thirds record vote cannot take effect until 90 days after the session ends. Hence, the November date for this action.

Legislature also appropriated \$1,000,000 for legislative expenses, but this was vetoed by the governor. He said he felt they could get along on the \$330,000.

Arrangements were being made for some 20 House and Senate employees, who've missed two pay days now, to get low interest loans from loan companies.

Attention, All Boat Owners—State Highway Department has announced that registration and licensing of boats under the new water safety act will begin next month.

Boat owners will have until March 1, 1969, to get their certificates and identification numbers.

Forms now are being printed and will vary with the size of the craft. Here is the scale: Boats under 16 feet in length, \$1; 16 to 26 feet, \$5; 26 to 40 feet, \$10; 40 feet or more, \$12.50.

Boats, regardless of length, if equipped with a 10 hp motor or less will be exempt from the tax as well as the numbering provision of the law.

The Highway Department will deal only with the registration phase of the new law and not with safety enforcement.

Senate Investigators—Sen. Wardlow Lane of Center has been appointed chairman of the Senate General Investigating Committee.

Others named to be committee by Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey are Sens. A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris (reappointed), Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi and R. A. Weinert of Seguin.

This committee succeeds a panel headed by Sen. Charles Herring of Austin which collected reams of material on the ICT Insurance Co., the state insurance liquidation division and tax collecting procedures in the state comptroller's office.

Cost of Citifing—In the past ten years Texas prison population has rocketed from 5,000 to 11,000.

Some might wonder if the state is reverting to the lawless ways of the Old West. Not so, according to O. B. Ellis, general manager of the Dept. of Corrections. Seemingly, it's "progress"—or at least a parting with old ways—that's causing the trouble.

In citing that he feels the reasons more Texans are getting behind bars Ellis put "urban movement at the top of the list. "A good old country boy moves to the city," Ellis explained, "has a 40-hour work week and doesn't know how to use his time."

Ellis also blamed no jobs for youngsters and misplaced values—"too much emphasis on the big home, the big auto."

Vehicle Inspection Stickers Are Now Available In Texas

Austin—The Texas Department of Public Safety announced recently that the new 1969 motor vehicle inspection stickers are now available to Texas motorists.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr. Director, recommended that Texans have their vehicles inspected early in the new inspection period which extends from September 1 to April 15, 1969. Vehicles not displaying the new sticker after April 15 will be operating in violation of the law.

"In the vast majority of cases Garrison said, "this program has become a very minor inconvenience and expense to the motor vehicle owner—provided he moves early to comply with the law.

"The more than 4,500 authorized

inspection stations over the state are capable of handling the inspection of Texas vehicles without just a few days before the opening to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked in preparation for the winter months."

Garrison called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program, vehicles having a defect that was a contributive factor in fatal accidents increased from 11 per cent to 18 per cent.

He said 434 per cent of cars inspected during the last inspection period needed some adjustment or repair and that average cost for inspection, including the \$1.00 fee, was \$2.02 per car.

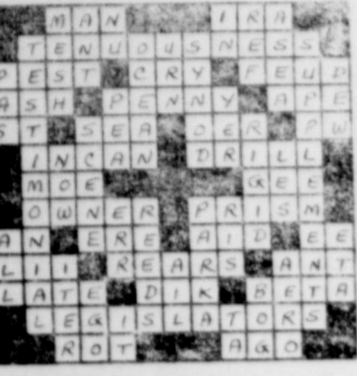
