A disabled person has to have ocial security credit for 5 years in the 10 years immediately before until January, 1955, they could not meet this test before October, 1959, by the Social Security Act in earliyears. By now, however, most mers will have earned 5 years 20 quarters of coverage under coial security beginning with the

onth of October. This does not mean that farmers an be paid disability benefits for he month of October because the w still requires that a person be isabled for six months or more before payments can be made. But it does mean that the farmer who becomes disabled in October or later can meet the work requirments of the law and become eligible for benefits after the 6 months waiting period.

This 6 months period was placed in the law as a means of measuring the effect of the disability long-lasting duration".

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
