Buff Left Halfback Alvin Hutchins gave the Buffaloes the lead with 4:12 left in the first quarter. He blasted over left tackle from one yard out, capping a 21-yard touchdown drive in six plays.

With only 13 seconds left in the first half, Eagle Graves intercepted a Buff screen pass on the run, and scampered about 20 yards untouched for the TD.

PHILOSOPHER WANTS TO KNOW WHOSE HAMMER, SICKLE RUSSIA SENT TO MOON

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou writes as though he were moon-struck this week.

Resident landowners in the Turkey Creek watershed in Brown and Callahan Counties, who are qualified voters, will ballot next Saturday, Sept. 26, on a proposal to levy a maintenance tax of 10c on the \$100 property valuation in the district, to be used to defray the cost of maintaining and operating flood control structures which are proposed to be constructed on the watershed by the Federal government.

The Turkey Creek flood control program will include the entire watershed of the creek from its head to Pecan Bayou in Brown County, south of Cross Cut.

Directors of the district are: Edwin Baum, Charlie Coats, W. A. Gill, Mark Adair, A. L. Breeding, Earl Pyle and George Wright.

Landowners of the watershed voted the creation of the district and a maintenance tax in September of last year, but due to a technicality in the law it was discovered that the district lacked the power to carry out the wishes of the voters who balloted overwhelmingly for the propositions.

Directors of the district have since been aided by special enabling legislation known as HB 959, Acts of the 56th Legislature, Regular Sessions, 1955, which was sponsored in the Texas House of Representatives by Representatives Paul Brashear of Cisco and Ben D. Suderth of Comanche, and in the Senate by Senators Floyd Bradshaw of Weatherford and J. M. Crump of Saco.

The maintenance tax proposal to be voted on is virtually identical to that which was okayed by the voters in the first election. Directors point out that while the proposal asks for a limit of 10c on the \$100 valuation of taxable property, it is believed that five cents will cover the needs of the district and it is also believed that it will only be necessary to collect the tax for one or possibly two years.

If there is a doubt in your mind as to whether or not you are qualified to vote in this election, directors urge you to check with election officials at the polls Saturday.

## Farmers to Have Social Security Protection, Oct. 1

Beginning in October 1959 farmers will have social security disability protection for the first time. That date can be an important one for any farmer who becomes severely disabled in October or in later months.

Although many severely disabled people in the Abilene area are now receiving disability insurance benefits under social security, farmers have not been able to qualify up until this time, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Manager of the local social security office.

A disabled person has to have social security credit for 5 years in the 10 years immediately before he became disabled. Because farmers were not covered under the law until January, 1955, they could not meet this test before October, 1959, unless they had other work covered by the Social Security Act in earlier years. By now, however, most farmers will have earned 5 years or 20 quarters of coverage under social security beginning with the month of October.

This does not mean that farmers can be paid disability benefits for the month of October because the law still requires that a person be disabled for six months or more before payments can be made. But it does mean that the farmer who becomes disabled in October or later can meet the work requirement of the law and become eligible for benefits after the 6 months waiting period.

This 6 months period was placed in the law as a means of measuring the effect of the disability, which must be of "indefinite and long-lasting duration".

## Alien Veterans of WW I Are Now Entitled to Pensions

Veterans who were discharged as aliens during World War I, may be entitled to pension or compensation as a result of a law recently signed by President Eisenhower.

Prior to the new law, World War I veterans discharged as aliens were required to prove that they did not request their own discharge. The new act, Public Law 86-113, presumes that these veterans did not request their own discharge unless the Government establishes proof that they did.

Although the VA will review all such cases on file that can be identified where claims for pension or compensation have previously been denied, the VA suggests that all veterans who believe they may be eligible for benefits under this new law file their claims at their earliest convenience.

In case the new claims are approved, the VA explained, the benefit payments may begin as of the date the claim was filed under the new law.
