

SCD NEWS NOTES

Now is the time to make plans for the seeding of perennial grasses n 1960

Much grain sorghum is now on the land which has not been plowed since harvest. This stubble makes an excellent seedbed in which to plant grasses. The stubble should be left standing and not plowed prior to seeding of grasses.

When sorghum is grown strictly as a litter crop in which to seed grasses, the sorghum should be drilled or planted in close spaced rows. The sorghum should be mowed or shredded prior to frost to prevent the maturing of a seed crop. Shredding to leave stubble six to ight inches high is preferred over mowing.

A grass drill or planter with disc peners should be used when seeding in a dead cover of stubble. Such grasses as Little Bluestem,
