### Anderson Marvin Smith O. M. Bailey Today's Mail Run To Be End Of Long Trail For Marvin Smith

Years of carrying mail on route 2 in Cross Plains R. W. M. (Marvin) Smith's last run Saturday will be the end of a long trail for Marvin Smith. Like anything else, Smith points out, mail carrying has changed a great deal in the past four decades. Roads are better, boxes more accessible and the carrier's vehicle comfortable. Perhaps Smith's most hectic day was back in the horse and cart era. He recalls that once when he was driving a skittish mare, the animal began kicking back at the hack and caught one foot between the spring and frame. She fell to the ground and let forth with a barrage from all four feet, blasting her way out of the trap. But not until the shaves were broken, and the harness mutilated. C. J. Steele, a patron on the route, helped the young carrier catch his horse and mend the hack. The mail then went ahead on schedule. Smith is proudest of his record of never having lost a piece of mail or been involved in a traffic accident while in line of duty. Never was a claim lodged against the government for dereliction on his part. In behalf of Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield, Postmaster F. R. Anderson will present Smith with a special commendation Saturday. Too, fellow-workers in the local post office will present him with a watch in appreciation of his friendship and congeniality. The Summerfield citation reads: "Honorary recognition is accorded William Marvin Smith for devotion to duty in the course of an honorable career in the U. S. Postal Service. This certificate tendered upon the occasion of retirement from active duty, conveys official commendation from the Postmaster General and a cordial expression of esteem from co-workers in the service." It is signed by George A. Gray, Regional Operations Director and Summerfield.

### James Shanks Runs For County Attorney

James Paul Shanks, life-long resident of Callahan County, this week announced his candidacy for County Attorney, subject to action of the Democratic primary to be held May 7. His initial message to voters appears hereunder.

"I wish to take this opportunity to humbly announce my candidacy for the office of County Attorney of Callahan County. After long and deliberate thought, it is my decision to ask for this honor from you.

"For those who know little of my past, I am the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Shanks, who have long been residents of this county. I was born on our home place near Clyde a little over twenty-seven years ago and have been a legal resident of the county ever since I attended public schools in Eula and Baird and in 1950 graduated from Baird High School as valedictorian. Then I received a B.A. degree from Hardin-Simmons University three years later, graduating in the top ten percent of the class. I immediately entered the University of Texas Law School but my education was interrupted by two years of service in the U. S. Army. In 1958, I received my L.L.B. degree and was admitted to the State Bar of Texas in the same year. The past two years I have been fulfilling a desire to teach for a while, being a teacher in Cisco High School where I have classes in Civics and Latin.

"Because of my contract with Cisco and because of the advanced date of the primary, I will be unable to conduct as complete a campaign as I would like but I shall attempt to meet and see as many as possible before election day. I earnestly ask that you consider my qualifications and hope you will then give me your support in the Democratic Primary in May. Thank you."

### Katie Brown Enters Tax Office Race

Katie Brown of Clyde, this week makes official announcement of her candidacy for Tax-Assessor and Collector of Callahan County, subject to action of the Democratic Primary. Her opening statement to voters appears hereunder:

"In making my announcement for the candidacy for the office of Tax-Assessor-Collector of Callahan County, I wish to say this is being done after the urging and requests of my friends and neighbors, and after much consideration on my part.

"To those who are not personally acquainted with me, I wish to advise I was born on a farm in this county 51 years ago, and outside a very short time spent in a nearby county, I have been a continuous resident of this county. I have a high school education, attended college, and completed a business course in a business college. I am a member of the Baptist Church, assistant Sunday school teacher and church treasurer. My husband is Alfred Brown, and we reside on a small farm near Clyde.

"I feel that I am fully qualified to handle the office, as I have had much experience, and all my experience has been dealing with the public, which I enjoy very much. Previous to going to work in the tax collector's office about 2 1/2 years ago, where I have been employed continuously since, I worked for the Federal Land Bank Association 16 years until the Baird and Coleman Associations consolidated.

"It is my intention to contact each and every voter of the county personally between now and the primary election, to be held May 7. At the present time the work load in the collector's office is very heavy, and I will not be able to get out immediately, but will as quickly as possible.

"After taking in consideration of the foregoing facts, I will appreciate your support and influence, and do my very best, if elected, to serve you in the manner which you deserve."

## PHILOSOPHER TAKES NEW SLANT ON IDEA ABOUT DEBT CHILDREN WILL HAVE TO PAY

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou comes to the defense of parents this week, his letter reveals.

Dear editor:

Like most people, I haven't spent much time worrying about the national debt, it's sort of like worrying about the weather three states away while the kind you've got at home is giving you fits, but I'll admit this isn't exactly far-sighted or statesman-like.

What set me to thinking about this though was an article I read in a magazine last night which some publisher sent me in the hopes I'd subscribe to it. This article quoted President Eisenhower on the importance of holding the national budget down. "I believe our people have the determination to hold expenditures in check, to pay their own way without borrowing from their children," the President said.

Now I don't know about the national budget, but what throws most people's budget out of balance is not the parents, but the children, and the number of parents who are borrowing from their children is mighty scarce in this vicinity.

Of course, I understand what the President is saying, he means the debt that we run up will have to be paid off by our children and grandchildren, and he's right, but just in defense of us adults I'd like to underscore the fact that a lot of these debts we're running up can be traced directly to the children.

Take schools. When you go into debt to build a school, it's not for the parents' benefit. Most parents I know are already educated about as far as they intend to go. It may not be far enough, but most of them seem satisfied with it.

Or take roads. Of course, parents use roads, provided their teen-age children are tied up with the mumps, and half the time when the parents are using the roads, it's for hauling kids around who are too young to drive but loud

enough to get their way. And so it goes. Hospitals, parks, even national defense, whatever it is that goes with our national budget, the children are getting a pretty good slice of it and I for one am glad to be able to shift a little of the cost on to them when they grow up. One of the troubles with children now is that they expect everything to be handed to them free of charge. If we keep piling up the national debt, it looks like we'll get that notion out of their heads one of these days.

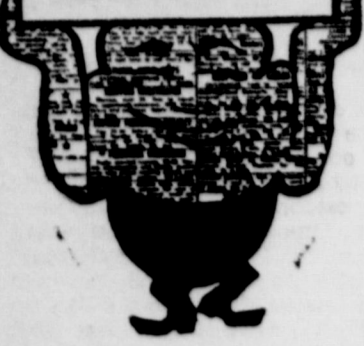

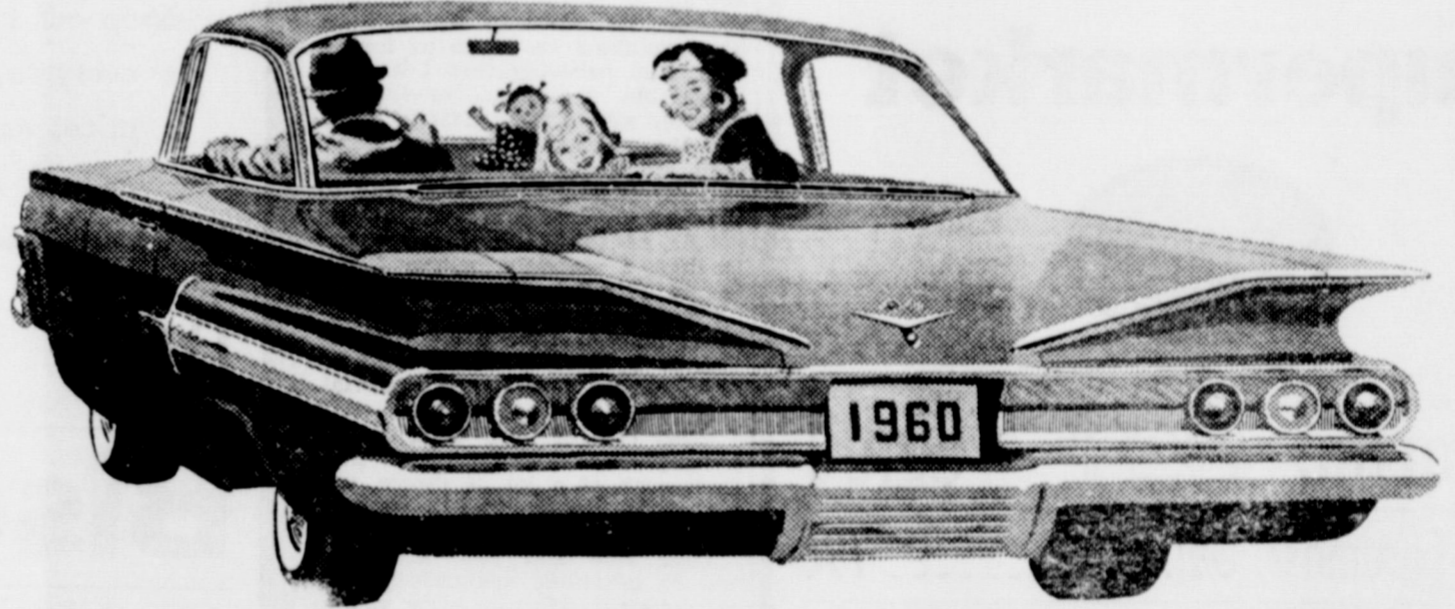

Continued from front page about it. It is an obvious fact that there are faults within our government that need correcting.

It seems inevitable that tremendous loss will accrue to all of us unless something is done to correct these faults and is done right away.

Some problems which cry for immediate action are:

Foreign aid should be re-evaluated on a realistic basis. More should be spent "for defense" and less "for tribute".

Wanton wastefulness through cancerous, bureaucratic agencies should be brought to a grinding stop by consolidations and eliminations.

The Supreme Court should be put back into the business of interpreting law under the Constitution rather than making laws by decree. To accomplish this, Justices should be selected on the basis of judicial qualifications rather than on the basis of political expediency.

Unnecessary government interference should be stopped to the greatest possible degree and with the greatest possible speed if free enterprise is to survive and if we are to survive as a capitalist nation rather than deteriorating into a socialistic, welfare state—just a half step short of communism.

At all costs (there is neither choice nor alternative here) and through the finest team work, the arms situation must be brought into balance with emphasis on nuclear warfare methods strongly impeded by conventional devices. Economies must be effected in methods—not in magnitude.

I am realistic. I know that I cannot go to Washington, D. C. and reverse the processes which have been wreaking havoc on us for so long. But, believing that I have a reasonable degree of intelligence together with a willingness to listen and the courage of my convictions, with an open mind to the opinions of others, and being willing to work to determine the will of the people of this 17th Congressional District, I sincerely believe I can be an effective representative.

I need a lot of help—the enthusiastic help of friends by word-of-mouth, by correspondence and by distribution of campaign material. This kind of help, together with a great deal of hard work on my part, plus a little financial help from each of a lot of people, will enable me to conduct a winning campaign.

## LLOYD RICH SERIOUSLY ILL IN LOCKNEY HOSPITAL

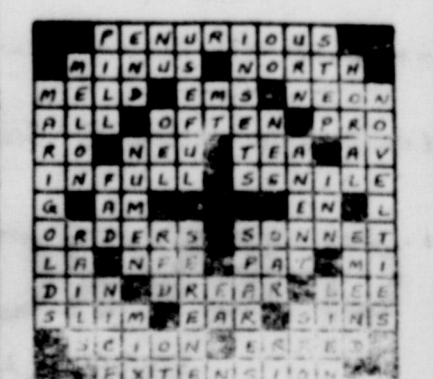
