Prior to passage of the new law, known as the Veterans Pen-War II and the Korean sion Act of 1959, dependents of will become eligible to deceased World War II and Korean Conflict veterans were entitled to pension only if the these benefits as the veteran had a disability which resulted from his active military service. The new law provides benefits to the dependents of deceased veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict if the dependents meet certain limitations with regard to income and the size of their es-

> Chrisman said that a very small percentage of the widows and children in Texas who could benefit from this new law have applied to the Veterans Administration for the benefits to which they are entitled. Chrisman pointed out that the children of deceased World War II and Korean veterans are eligible to receive pension, even hough their mother may have remarried since the death of her veteran husband, and even though the children may have been adopted by the mother's new husband. These children are eligible to receive pension while they are unmarried and under the age of eighteen years. They may continue to receive pension until age twenty-one if they remain unmarried and are attending an approved school. and may receive pension indefinitely if they became physicall, or mentally incapable of self-support before their eighteeath birthday.



UNESCO poisoned schools play down anything good in American history, or ignore it, and play up the faults of our nation.
