Car Inspection Time Begins

AUSTIN - Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today reminded motorists that vehicles bearing red motor vehicle inspection stickers with the large numeral "9" must be re-inspected before midnight September 30.

Texas now operates on a 12-month inspection system. The inspection sticker in the lower left-hand corner of the windshield contains a large numeral showing the month of inspection and expiration.

Speir said vehicles with red stickers and the number "10" will require reinspection before midnight on the last day of October. Those with an "11" must be re-inspected before the end of November, with a December 31 deadline for red stickers numbered "12."

All motor vehicles and certain classes of trailers are subject to the mandatory inspection which includes brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering (including power steering), wheels and rims, exhaust system, and exhaust emission system.

State law requires that inspections be made at privately owned official inspection stations which have been appointed and regulated by the Department of Public Safety. The statutory inspection fee is \$2.00, with adjustments or repairs extra if required.

CLYDE - At a public hearing held on August 11, the Board of Trustees of Clyde Independent School District approved the budget for 1970-71 school year. The budget for the school year is a record budget with total expenditures exceeding any previous year.

Even though this is a record budget, there will be no increase in local tax rates to support the budget, with the increased cost of such items as teachers salaries being borne by state funds. The tax rate for 1970-71 will remain at \$1.30 per \$100.00 value as it has been for the past ten years.

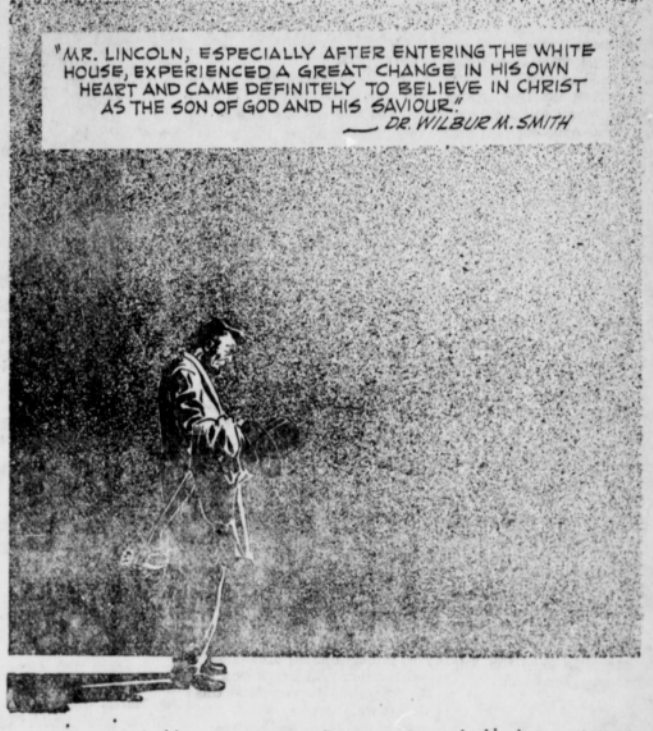
ABILENE — Hardin-Simmons University has announced that approximately 110 students will receive their degrees at commencement exercises to be held in Behrens Chapel.

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
"Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company."
" (b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such dis-

trict or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:
"(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.
"(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.
"(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

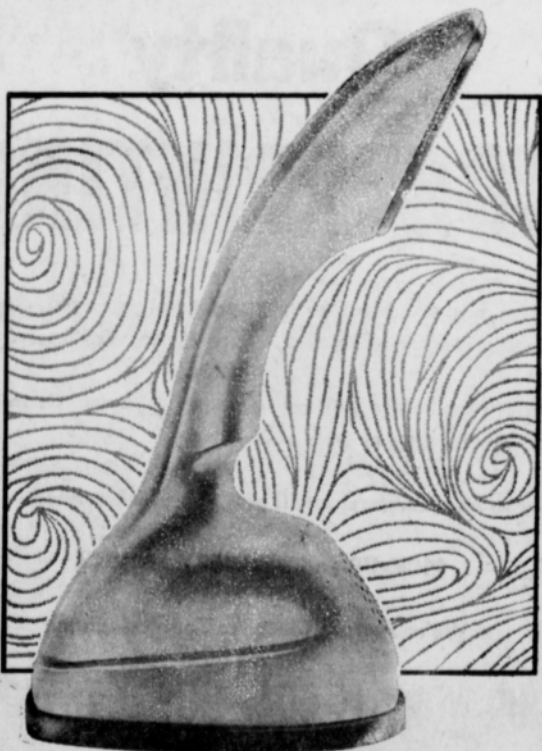

AUSTIN — More than 2.7 million Texas students soon will be heading back to the public schools again.

There will be a lot of changes in store for them, although most probably will adjust or barely recognize the differences.

Teachers will begin work a little earlier, and classes in some areas will start earlier.

School year will stretch out from 175 classroom days to 180.

Teachers will be on duty 10 more days of non-teaching work for in-service training and to help with school opening and closing.

For 224,500 little ones, the school experience will be brand new. They are the first graders and (30,000) five year olds in a new state-supported kindergarten program.

A drug education program also will be initiated, seeking an effective two-way communication between youth and adults. Utilized in the effort will be modern techniques and teaching methods which encourage students to express themselves rather than relying on lectures, preaching or moralizing. Training of local teaching teams in 1,206 school districts is slated to start in September and October.

Twenty-two school districts in major population and geographic areas will be pilot testing three key facets of the state's emerging plan for special education. These districts will serve as a proving ground for efforts in comprehensive special education, early childhood programs for exceptional children and teaching tailored for children with language and/or learning disabilities.

Even broader changes may be in store for pupils of 16 school districts sued in federal courts at Austin and Tyler for racial segregation. Districts held conferences at Texas Education Agency last week to prepare plans for conversion to non-discriminatory systems. Plans are due to go to courts by Friday (Aug. 21). Hearings may begin Monday.

EAGLE MAY BE OUT — A Railroad Commission examiner has prepared a report recommending Missouri Pacific Railway Company be permitted to discontinue its St. Louis Eagle passenger train.

Finding came after extensive hearings in several cities. Opponents of shutting down the train have 30 days to reply and restate their case.

Eagle was one of the last three passenger trains on a regular run across the state from Texarkana to Laredo and back once a day.

MP claimed a revenue loss and asked permission to cut it off its routes.

DRAFT CALL UP — September draft call for Texas is 704 - a considerable increase from 560 in August. But no man will be ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 195.

Col. Charles M. Duncan, deputy state Selective Service director, said it appears unlikely the ceiling will go higher than 195 for the rest of the year. Duncan said new manpower, mainly from formerly-deferred students, helped hold the level on sequence numbers.

September quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations is 7,171, an increase from 1,490 in August. Texas' induction quota of 704 is the state's share of a national call of 12,000 men, all for the Army.

PARKS ADVANCED — Outstanding new Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near Stonewall, and across Ranch Road 1 from the famed LBJ Ranch, will be officially dedicated on August 29 at 2 p. m.

Former president will attend the festivities which include a reception and luncheon in Stonewall.

Parks and Wildlife Department also announced approval of a \$355,050 federal grant for

a development project in Abilene State Park.

Funds will be matched by the state on a 50-50 basis in the \$710,000 project which includes building of a headquarters, visitors' center, campsites, a group shelter, wading pool, playground equipment, roads and parking.

INSPECTION TIME AGAIN — Another auto inspection deadline is approaching for vehicles with red stickers and the large numeral "9".

These cars, warned Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, must be reinspected before midnight September 30.

Texas now has a 12-month inspection system. Sticker in the lower left-hand corner of each automobile windshield contains a large numeral showing the month of inspection and expiration.

Speir said cars with red stickers and a number "10" must be reinspected before midnight on the last day of October, those with an "11" by the end of November and those with a "12" by December 31. Fee remains at \$2, with adjustments or repairs extra if required.

LAND RECOVERY SOUGHT

— Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has called on Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin to take whatever legal steps necessary to recover lands of Calhoun County Navigatoin District not being used for navigation purposes.

Sadler noted that 47,000 acres were purchased by the district from the state in 1956 for \$1 an acre. In 1961, Sadler said, he refused to approve the district's application to buy additional lands, after officials admitted 20,000 acres of the original purchase were considered surplus acreage not needed for navigation purposes. Some of this land was sold, and has gone into private real estate development.

Commissioner said he urged the attorney general's office as far back as December 28, 1961 to take steps to recover the 20,000 acres for the permanent school fund but got no action. School Land Board, he related, has now requested that the land be recovered.

GRNATS APPROVED — Gov. Preston Smith has approved a federal grant for \$114,389 for operation of a family planning program for migrant farm workers in 26 Texas counties and six other states where they migrate.

Counties benefitting are Val Verde, Kinney, Uvalde, Bexar, Jim Wells, Maverick, Zavala, Dimmit, Frio, LaSalle, McMullen, Duval, Webb, Live Oak, Bee, Refugio, San Patricio, Nueces, Kleberg, Zapata, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Starr, Willacy, Hidalgo and Cameron.

Smith also announced approval of a demonstration grant of \$72,344 to Las Colonias Del Valle Inc. in San Juan, Hidalgo County, for youth development program.

A state regional planning assistance grant of \$14,930 went to South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) serving 33 cities, eight special purpose governments and 11 counties.

AG OPINIONS — An off-duty policeman may not conduct a private enterprise, employing other off-duty policemen or officers, to perform guard duty or patrol without securing a license, says Attorney General Martin.

In other opinions, Martin ruled that:

An alarm agency, approved by the State Board of Insurance, may perform certain activities - send their representatives to answer the alarm, furnish a key to police officers for entrance to the premises, assist the police as they may request in their check of the premises, and reset the alarm after the police have finished their work - without its personnel having obtained a license.

The Round-Up operates in many different phases. The next three phases will be the Cattle Sale on September 28 at the Ranchers and Farmers Auction in Abilene; the Sheep and Goat Sale on Monday, October 5, at the Coleman Auction; and the Horse Sale on Saturday, October 3 at the Abilene Auction.

Officials of the Center announced the reappointment of Charlie Morris as Chairman of the Round-Up. Morris, who resides in Abilene, has diversified interests in ranching, feed lots and livestock. In response to his reappointment Morris said, "I am more than happy to be able to head the Round-Up again this year. DOCTRINE OR NO DOCTRINE

There is a popular idea in our day that preachers ought not to preach doctrine. The reasoning behind this is that doctrines divide; therefore if we refrain from preaching doctrine we will some way come closed together in religion.

There is one basic contradiction in this view which destroys its very foundation; i. e. it is founded upon a doctrine, the doctrine or "no doctrine."

The desire which motivates this idea is a good one. It is the desire to have unity in religion. No sincere person could read the Lord's prayer in John 17:20,21 and not fervently wish that all religious people could be united. But, our approach is wrong if we uphold the idea of "no doctrine." Unity must be based upon what Christ taught, and whatever he taught is doctrine.

Webster's Collegiate Dictionary defines doctrine as "That which is taught; a principle or; body of principles." One cannot preach without preaching principles, and that is what doctrine is.

Unity based on "no doctrine" is contrary to the unity for which Jesus prayed. He prayed that "they may all be one; as Thou, Father, are in me, and I in thee, that they may be one in us." (John 17:21). Jesus desires the kind of unity that overlooks and hides differences and will speak only of things upon which agreement is to be found?

The Apostle Paul said that Christians should "all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment." (1 Cor. 1:10). This doesn't teach that we should gloss over our differences, overlook mistakes, forget error and join hands in a conglomeration of doctrines that we don't dare to mention for fear of treading on something someone else believes.

Let us face facts. No church can survive without certain basic convictions (doctrines). So, it is not a matter of doing away with doctrines (for that is impossible), but a question of which doctrines should be accept.

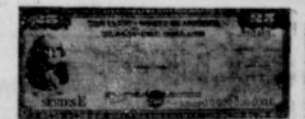

64TH ANNUAL WEST TEXAS FAIR PLANNED FOR SEPTEMBER

ABILENE - As the opening of the 64th Annual West Texas Fair draws closer, excitement and anticipation mounts. What do you visualize when you think of the Fair - carnival rides, candy apples, exhibits, hot dogs. What of the first fairs? What were they like?

The first fair held in Abilene was an exhibit of farm products in 1884. There were no livestock shows, carnival rides or cotton candy. It did have its special feature though. The curiosity of the 1884 event was a cotton stalk with six bolls on it.

A second fair was not held until 1888 when the District Fair was in Abilene. It was a three-day event held in the County Court House, the old Court House on Oak and various neighborhood stalls around the Exposition Hall. Not only were agriculture and livestock on view, but area resident could examine various items of art.

The fair took on a new look in 1897 when it moved to the outside edge of Abilene. Exhibits were housed in two tents, 13 frame buildings, innumerable stalls for livestock, a grandstand and race track.

Each year the fair association has scheduled special events during the fair. They have ranged from live turkey and pigeon shoots to nightly entertainment by well-known stars and a grand ball at the Abilene Opera House in 1897. The 1900 Fair was the site of the first "Horseless carriage" races in Abilene. In addition to the special events always popular were the horse races, rodeos, parades and visits from such prominent people as Charles A. Lindbergh in 1927.

Throughout the year the fairs have continued to grow and improve, but there is one problem that has remained the same. The annual visitor known as

rain made its first appearance at the 1899 Fair and has continued to return each year. The fair would not be complete without a few drops each year.

It is hard to imagine not having a West Texas Fair each September, but there were several years throughout the history of the fair that have been minus the event because of lack of money and management. Other factors have also had a hand in closing it down. The fair did not open in 1918 or 1941 because of World Wars I and II. The West Texas Fair was not held from 1951 to 1955, but it was revived in 1956 and moved to a new home at its present site. Its new home, the Taylor County Agricultural and Livestock Center, consists of a Women's Building, General Exhibit Buildings, quarters for poultry and small animals, sheep, goats, swine, horses and cattle, a large arena for show and sales and a midway. The addition of the multi-million dollar Taylor County Coliseum in 1969 now enables the Fair to hold all types of indoor activities including rodeos.

Veterans Need Certificate Of Eligibility to Attend School

Veterans who attended classes during the spring and summer sessions under the GI Bill should make sure their Certification of Attendance cards are returned to the Veterans Administration immediately, Jack Coker, Director, VA Regional Office in Waco said today.

Coker explained that unless

the cards are returned, veterans cannot be paid the educational money for their last month of training. Neither can they be paid for their first month of training when they return to school this fall.

A veteran attending college should fill out and sign the card he received when his next to final check, and mail it to his

regional VA office, Coker explained.

A veteran training below college level should fill out and sign the card he receives with his month check, and return it each month to his regional VA office. The card also must be signed by a school official.

The veteran who has lost his attendance certification card should request another from his nearest VA office. He should then return the completed card to his regional office, Coker advised.

Veterans intending to go to school this fall who do not have

a VA Certificate of Eligibility are urged to contact their nearest VA office immediately.
