HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO.
39 proposing an amendment to Article

"Section 7. The Legislature may by

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article Ill of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the follow-ing:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-\lambda \%) per annum. "This Amendment shall become ef-fective upon its adoption."
