60-Year-Resident Here Succumbs Sunday Night

Mrs. J. C. Garrett, 83, a resident of Cross Plains the past 60 years, died Sunday night at 7:45 in the Memorial Hospital at Brownwood, following an illness of one week.

Funeral services were held from the First Presbyterian Church in Cross Plains Tuesday afternoon at 2:30, with Rev. Harold G. Wise, pastor, officiating. Interment was made in the local cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mrs. Garrett was born Etzella Jane Walker, at Plevna, Madison County, Ala., Jan. 25, 1877. At the age of 12, she moved to Stephens County, Texas. On Nov. 10, 1897, she was married to J. C. Garrett in Eola, Stephens County. Three years later the couple moved to Cross Plains, where he became a prominent businessman and acquired large land holdings. Mr. Garrett died Dec. 28, 1957. The couple had just celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary one month before his passing.

Survivors include one son, C. M. Garrett of Cross Plains; one daughter, Mrs. Rollo Davidson of Slaton; five grandchildren, three great-grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. E. I. Vestal of Cross Plains and Mrs. J. M. Marshall of Big Spring; four brothers, Finis Walker of Abilene, Herbert Walker of Hermleigh, Arthur Walker of Cisco and Walter Walker of Spur. One daughter, Mrs. W. T. Rone, preceded her in death a number of years ago.

Pallbearers will be elders of the First Presbyterian Church in Cross Plains, of which Mrs. Garrett had been a member 59 years and five months.

CITY JAIL CROWDED AS 23 INCARCERATED

The most crowded place in town the past week has been the city calaboose.

Clamping down on lawlessness, Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson jailed 23. All but three violators were incarcerated for drunkenness. Three were apprehended on check charges.

Of the 23 jailed, three were women. Richardson lodged the women in the run-around and men within the single cell available.

All but three of those arrested paid fines, the minimum of which was \$20.50.

"With only one bed in this place, how do you expect us to sleep," one inmate asked the Cross Plains officer.

"I'd suggest you take turns," Richardson replied.

Shades of the Old West. Cattle rustlin' charges have been filed in Callahan County.

Sammy Edward Hall, 37, of Clyde, was hauled into court at Baird Monday and charged with cattle theft. He was then taken to Abilene by Sheriff Homer Price and Deputy Byron Richardson of Cross Plains and given lie detector tests.

Hall was questioned in connection with possible implication of a 16-year-old boy in the case.

He is charged in connection with four baby calves taken recently from the barn of Jack Cannon, near Eula. The calves were allegedly thrown into the bed of a pickup truck and hauled away.

They had not been marked. Sheriff Price, and Clyde Deputy Luke Taylor recovered the calves. Three of them had been auctioned in Abilene, and were recovered in Truby. The fourth calf was recovered Thursday near Caps.

Hall is free on \$2,500 bond. Sheriff Price said that the calves were identified by their owner and the fact that when they were taken back to Cannon's place they went to their mothers.

Following the lie-detector test, Hall signed a confession, admitting the calf thefts and also a saddle from the Harold D. Hart place, between Baird and Clyde.

Cross Plains claimed first place in marching competition for Class A school bands at the West Texas Fair in Abilene, Saturday.

The local unit was one of 24 musical organizations appearing in the parade of Abilene's downtown district and vying for laurels.

Finishing behind Cross Plains

were Merkel, second, and Monday, third. Cash prizes of \$50, \$25 and \$15 were awarded the top three finishers.

School bands competing in the same division as Cross Plains were those from: Albany, Roscoe, Rotan, Wylie and Santa Anna, as well as Merkel and Monday. In addition to the \$50 cash prize, the Cross Plains band was awarded an elaborately-designed plaque. It has been added to

the trophy case in the Band Hall on the local school campus.

The band, which represented Cross Plains in the street parade and competition Saturday afternoon included 60 student-musicians.

"I'm proud of our youngsters," said Howell yesterday, "particularly so, because ours was not a picked outfit of only veteran bandmen, every youngster with a uniform marched."

Bufs To Renew Rivalry With Wildcats Saturday

Cross Plains' Buffaloes will renew competition with their sister city's football squad, the Rising Star Wildcats, Saturday, Sept. 24, on Wildcat Field.

The game was originally scheduled for Friday night, but was changed to coincide with Rising Star's homecoming.

The Buffs' fourth non-conference tilt will get underway at 8 p.m.

Rising Star, pre-season picked to finish third in District 7-B, lost only three lettermen off last year's team, and present a big middle section of the line and four hard-running backs.

Coy Edmiston, 180-pound, three-year letterman, heads the backfield in the fullback slot. Three junior, two-year lettermen round out the ball carriers.

The Buffaloes will be cracking heads with three big two-year lettermen in the line. Back for the Wildcats this year are such heavies as 199-pound Center Butch Bailey, and a couple of 200-pound tackles in Charles Corral and Tom Hardin.

But the Buffs have been vic-

torious in the last five outings against the Wildcats and should be on the rebound from last week's beating at the hands of Dublin.

Both elevens will start action with identical records of one win against two losses. The wildcats lost to Rochelle in the season opener, but edged the Beans Dragons 8-6 in their second game. Santa Anna, a 10-A team, humbled the Wildcats last week 26-6.

Cross Plains defeated Baird, picked to finish second in 7-B, 14-6 in the season opener, but then dropped two straight decisions to Class AA DeLeon, 20-0 and Dublin last week 44-8.

The Buffs should be out to complete their sweep of tilts with Class B schools and run their victory string to six over the Wildcats, as well as even their record at 2-2.

Cross Plains will not see action again after Saturday until Oct. 7, when they host the Class AA Ranger Bulldogs. The Buffs will take their annual week end test Sept. 30.

Gifts Come Slowly For \$3,000 Cemetery Fence

"There must be in immediate response from a lot of people if Cross Plains Cemetery is to get a new chain-link, cyclone fence", said W. A. (Slim) Crutchmer, committeeman who has undertaken the responsibility of raising the necessary \$3,000.

Checks began arriving the day after last week's Review came off the press, however, Crutchmer admits that the response has thus far been disappointing.

"I had expected several large checks but to date all have been for \$10", Crutchmer stated, "gifts of this size will do the job but there must be 300 of them."

No canvass of the business district has thus far been made to secure donations. This will be done if the contributions sent in indicate there is some possibility of the necessary amount

being raised.

"Let's build this better type of fence or forget it", Crutchmer said. "Those who want the improvement should mail their checks to me immediately at P. O. Box 278, Cross Plains. If the necessary amount is not raised, all monies will be refunded."

Purpose of the new bookkeeping method is to provide increased information to City Councilmen regarding the status of various utility services, which are municipally-owned and operated here.

Waterflood Of Shallow Oil Sand Here Becoming Spectacular

A waterflood project begun less than five months ago on leases three miles west of Cross Plains, is beginning to pay off.

The project is under joint operation of Marudd Petroleum Co., Inc., of which Jim Whiteside is president, L. W. Monzingo of Fort Worth, and Harding Brothers of Dallas. Leases are on acreage owned by J. C. McGee, C. M. Garrett and R. E. (Dick) Edgington.

When first water was injected April 23, 1960, the leases were making only four barrels daily, rendering production barely profitable. Already it has been upped to 15 barrels and Whiteside points out the "kick" has only reached center wells in the pool.

Production is from the Amerinda Sand at a depth of between 575 and 440 feet. Water for injection purposes is being produced from a 500-foot strata on the Garrett lease. Approximately 150 barrels of filtered salt water is being injected daily. Thus far, 12,500 barrels have been forced into the producing formation.

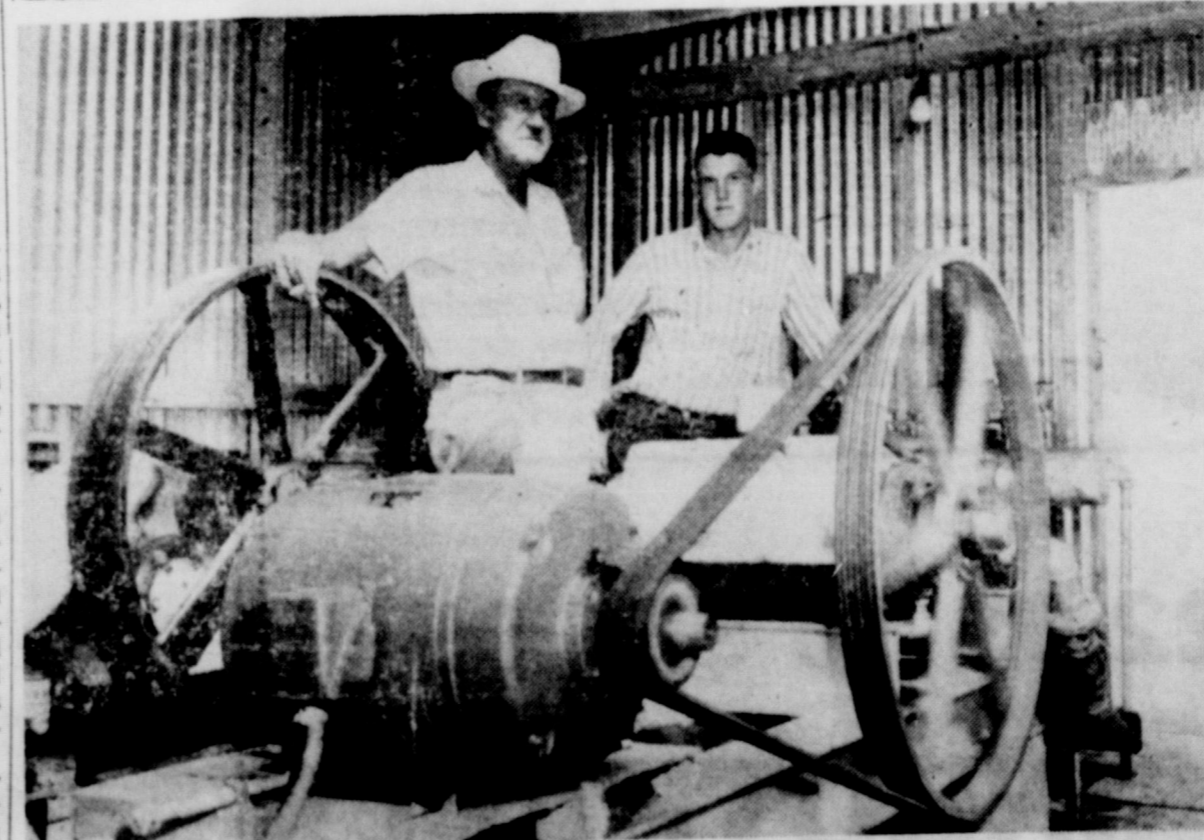
Engineers estimated that four wells in the pool should recover 45,000 barrels of stock tank oil in six years. The four wells covered in the study were making

less than two barrels daily at the time of the report. Consensus of operators is that the 17 wells under flood will ultimately

yield 200,000 barrels and produce much longer than six years.

The field is a mile and one-half long and runs almost due

east and west. There are four injection wells, one on each end and two near the center of the flood.

Much local interest is manifested in the joint-operated flood, which thus far has cost all operators only \$21,000. Many local oil men believe the system being employed on these leases may become standard procedure for shallow fields in the Cross Plains area. They opine the cost is not prohibitive and results spectacular.

Jerry Whiteside, lease superintendent, pointed out to a Review writer in a visit to the lease last week, that stand-by engines are available to keep injection constant, even in the event of mechanical failure. At present water is being forced into the productive zone at around 300 pounds pressure.

Average sand thickness in the field is believed to be between 12 and 15 feet of porosity. The leases are not pooled. Royalty interests remain the same as during the primary production period. Operators feel that the flood will be of approximately equal value to all properties, in that the oil trapped thereunder will be recovered in approximately like proportions.

As waterfloods go, the shallow sand project is considered small, however, it may serve as a pilot-idea for numerous other similar undertakings.

Basset-Led Dublin Mauls Buffs 44-8 Here Friday

195-pound fullback, James Bassett by name, roared into Buffalo stadium Friday night and led the visiting Dublin Lions to a 44-8 win over the Buffs.

Bassett not only scored four touchdowns himself, but rolled up 202 yards rushing, intercepted a pass and kicked and passed for the Lions.

Statistically, the Lions also dominated the game rolling up a total yardage of 381 yards, getting 14 first downs in the process, while Cross Plains could manage only eight first downs gathering only 133 yards from scrimmage.

Scoreless First. After battling to a scoreless first quarter, with the Buffaloes dominating the first 12 minutes

of play, the Lions tallied twice in the second period and were never headed.

The Buffaloes were in the spotlight only once more in the game. That being early in the fourth period when Quarterback Doug Dallas passed to Left End Paul Whitton for 21 yards and the only Buff tally. The locals' touchdown cut the Lion lead to 26-8, but Mr. Bassett again took charge and scored three more times.

Buffaloes Drive.

Cross Plains took the opening kickoff and marched 64 yards in 16 plays to the Lion 18 before Bassett intercepted a Buff pass to halt the march.

Three plays later, Buff Guard Elvin Hutchins had the Buffs back in business on the Dublin 33 with a recovered Lion fumble.

But the drive bogged down on the Lion 23.

Lions Roar.

The visitors had had enough of defense, and marched 73 yards in 15 plays for their first counter. Bassett capped the sustained drive with a four-yard blast into pay dirt. Conversion try failed.

Two minutes later the Lions posted six more points on the scoreboard. Right Halfback Ronald Hudson intercepted a Buff aerial and streaked 40 yards down the left sideline for the TD. Conversion failed.

Third Quarter.

After returning from intermission, Dublin wasted no time getting back into the scoring column.

Taking a punt on the Buff 49, in just two plays the Lions scored. Quarterback Jack Johnson hurled the pigskin to Left End Bob Evans on a 41-yard pass and run. Dublin picked up their only conversion try after their third TD. Dublin fumbled the ball across the goal line and recovered it on the scoring side for two points and a 20-0 lead.

Halfback Hudson scampered 45 yards over left tackle, capping a 56-yard drive in three assaults for his second TD of the night.

Buffaloes Score.

Cross Plains finally pushed across their lone touchdown early in the final period. Fullback Jay Wilcoxon pounced on a Lion fumble on the Dublin 39 to set up the tally. A pass, Dallas to Right Halfback John Baird, covered 18 yards and a first on the Dublin 21. On the next play, Dallas hit Whitton with the scoring pass. Whitton snatched the aerial out of the grasp of two Lion defenders, and sprinted the final five yards.

Left Halfback Alvin Hutchins circled right end for the two-point conversion.

A minute and a half later Bassett completed his show of power with a 17-yard scamper up the middle for his second TD of the night. But Bassett wasn't finished. He scored two more times on runs of nine and 18 yards.

Mr. Bassett lugged the pigskin 32 times for the visitors and averaged 6.3 yards per carry.

The Buffaloes racked up six first downs in the initial period but could get only two in the final 36 minutes of play.

The Lions swiped four Buff passes. The first stopped a Buff drive, one was returned for a touchdown and two set up eventual scores.

CHURCHES UNDER COMMUNISM

Among the tourists who continue to visit the Soviet Union and get deceived by the international communist conspiracy's carefully-planned and executed guided tours are American clergymen. The communist authorities are doing everything to keep the ministers and individual Christians from reaching the people with the gospel of salvation. I wish I could publish some of their letters but, I know, if I would do this, they would disappear from the face of the earth as if it opened and swallowed them up. Truly it is the power of evil about which the book of Revelation is speaking."

The communists will not show American visitors the mass graves in which they have buried untold numbers of Christians and other innocent people alive. They will not show these visitors the slave camps in which millions have been worked to death on starvation rations. Instead the visitors see the sights of Moscow, the showcase church, and other carefully selected points of interest. They leave Moscow completely unaware of the terror and persecution endured by the Russian people.

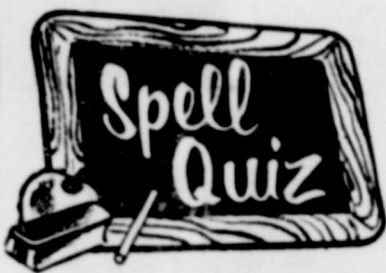

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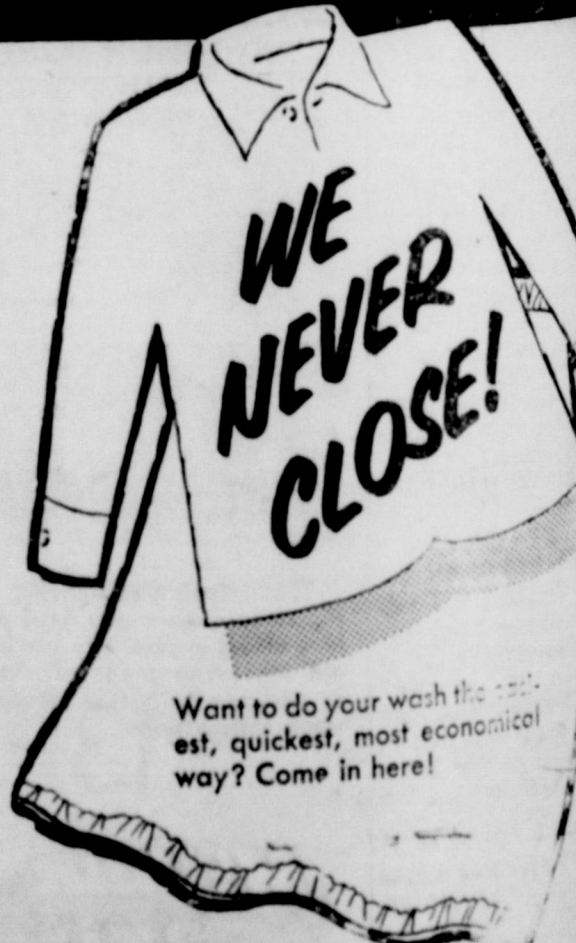
