

The Board of Directors of Callahan County Hospital has advised Mr. William Meade, Administrator, that a \$35 deposit will be required by all patients upon admission to the hospital. However, Hospitalization Insurance may be used in lieu of the deposit. Effective date was Dec. 1.

New visiting hours have been set by the Hospital. The new hours are 2 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 8 p.m. There will be no visiting hours in the morning. This will enable the parents to leave the hospital without having to worry about a large bill.
