School Tax Collections Coming In At Normal Speed

Tax collections have been coming in at an approximately normal clip thus far this year in Cross Plains.

Albert Lovell, assessor-collector for Cross Plains Independent School District, told The Review Tuesday that \$26,000 had been collected as of Dec. 1. The total levy for the district is slightly in excess of \$60,000. Collections this year are approximately four per cent ahead of the same period in 1959.

Cross Plains city taxes have been coming in about the same as last year, according to reports from the city office Tuesday. The total city levy is \$10,365.95. Of this amount slightly more than \$5,000 has been paid.

Taxes do not become delinquent until after Jan. 31.

Heart Attack Fatal To E. P. Watson

Emmet P. Watson, 76, former Cross Plains resident, died at the Memorial Hospital in Brownwood Monday night at 8:45. Death resulted from heart attack.

He became ill at his home in Brownwood, where he had resided the past 15 years, and was rushed to the hospital about 5 o'clock. He died three hours later.

Born March 18, 1884, at Richland Springs, he married Stella Stanphill in Dressy, Aug. 6, 1905. He spent most of his life in the Burkett Community in Coleman County.

He was a retired stock farmer and a member of the Coggin Ave. Baptist Church in Brownwood.

Funeral was held at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday in Stevens Memorial Chapel in Coleman with the Rev. Levi Price of Monahans officiating. Burial was in the Burkett Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Roger of Burkett and Phelix of Abilene; two daughters, Mrs. Rodney Harlow of San Antonio and Mrs. Faye McCasland of Portland, Ore.; a sister, Mrs. Stella Schuchardt of San Jose, California; seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

HOSPITAL CHANGES

The Board of Directors of Callahan County Hospital has advised Mr. William Meade, Administrator, that a \$35 deposit will be required by all patients upon admission to the hospital. However, Hospitalization Insurance may be used in lieu of the deposit. Effective date was Dec. 1.

New visiting hours have been set by the Hospital. The new hours are 2 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 8 p.m. There will be no visiting hours in the morning. The Hospital Board asks that the residents of Callahan County please cooperate in this matter. These hours will enable the medical and nursing staff to carry out their duties and assure needed rest periods for the patients. No children under 12 years of age will be allowed to visit the patients.

A new pre-payment plan is available for all obstetric patients. The expectant mothers can come by the hospital and make arrangements to pay a sum each week or each month before the blessed event. After the baby is born and the patients are ready to leave the hospital, a large amount of the bill will have been paid. This will enable the parents to leave the hospital without having to worry about a large bill. This plan has proved most satisfactory in many hospitals and should be satisfactory in Callahan County Hospital.

New Well Hit On Ludie Owen Ranch

A Cross Cut Sand discovery well is indicated for the area 4 1/2 miles northwest of Webb Store in northeast Coleman County.

The wildcat is B. C. McMordie of Albany No. 1 Ludie Owen, located in L. H. McNeill Survey 284.

No. 1 Owen was drillstem tested at 2,045 to 2,050 feet in the Cross Cut Sand. Gas was to the surface of the ground in one half minute. The test developed a spray of oil in four minutes. Recovery was 180 feet of oil.

Flowing pressure ranged from 315 to 560 pounds. Shut-in pressure in 15 minutes was 890 pounds.

No. 1 Owen was drilling below 2,700 feet. Proposed depth is 3,100 feet to test the Caddo.

Gunshot Fatal To Ranger Youth, 16

David Loren Sledge, 16-year-old Ranger youth and nephew of Mrs. H. P. White of the Amerada Camp here, died at 12:35 p.m. Monday from a bullet wound received Sunday when his gun accidentally discharged on a hunting trip.

The youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald D. Sledge of Rt. 3, Ranger, was hunting with two companions about six miles north of Ranger in Stephens County. Neither of the two fellow hunters, Clifton Dempsey of Rt. 3, and J. C. Morris of the Necessity Community, witnessed the accident, which occurred about 5:30 p.m. Sunday.

Both said they heard a shot and turned around to find the youth lying on the ground. The .22 rifle carried by the victim had apparently discharged accidentally with the hollow point bullet entering his left leg above the knee.

An attending physician said the bullet pierced the skin above the boy's knee and then hit his forehead, which indicated he was kneeling at the time of the discharge. The boy was taken to Ranger General Hospital by his companions. He died less than 18 hours later.

Loren was born April 2, 1944, at Wichita Falls, and moved to Ranger in 1948 with his parents. He was in his junior year at Ranger High School.

Survivors, in addition to his mother and father, include two brothers, Kenneth W. of Abilene and Lanny E., stationed with the Navy in California; two sisters, Geraldine Sledge of Houston and Mrs. Kenneth R. Barr of Alice; his grandmother, Mrs. Lillie Trotter of Pehachati, California.

Funeral was held at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the First Methodist Church, with the Rev. A. J. Fox, Jr., pastor of the Church of God, officiating. Burial was in Bullock Cemetery north of Ranger.

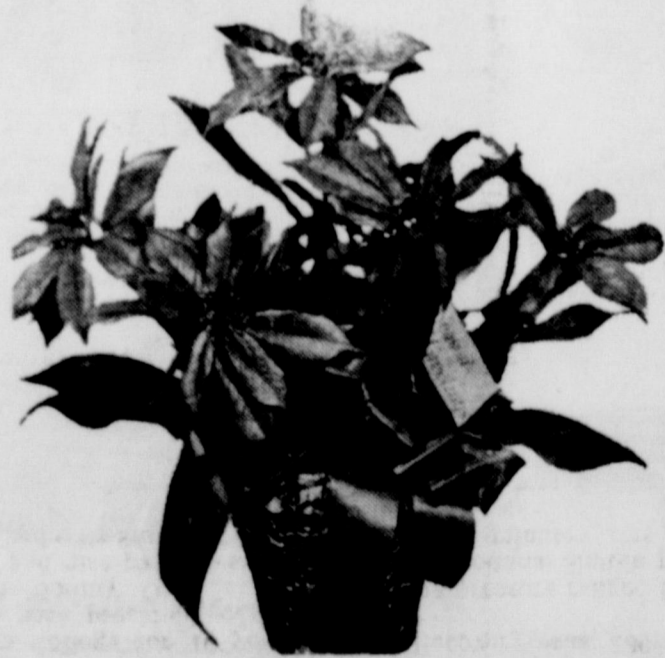
