There'll be a test of strength between Democrats and Republicans of Texas Saturday.

William A. (Bill) Blakley of Dallas, Democrat and incumbent, is pitted against John G. Tower of Wichita Falls, Republican standard-bearer, in a runoff election to name a junior United States Senator from Texas.

The pair emerged high in a field of 71 candidates in the first primary held April 1. Tower polled a commanding lead in the first go-round and Democrats are rallying forces in the hope of overhauling his lead.

Tower and Blakley together garnered only 41.4 percent of the first primary votes in the Cross Plains area. Defeated candidates polled 58.6 percent. The story was substantially the same over the state as a whole.

Voting in Cross Plains Saturday will again be at the City Hall with Fred W. Stacy serving as presiding judge. Polls will open at eight in the morning and close at seven at night. With a short ballot and ample clerks, Stacy opened yesterday that local results will be known by 7:15 Saturday night.

Of the 666 votes polled at nine boxes of the Cross Plains area in the first primary, Tower had 148, Blakley 128, and defeated candidates 390.

Expense Tops Income For County TB Group

Sale of Christmas seals in Callahan County last yuletide brought \$1,142.25 to the Callahan County Tuberculosis Association, according to a report issued last week by Mrs. Mary Martin of Baird, secretary of the organization.

The report shows that \$1,476.69 was spent by the county unit, \$334.44 more than the income from seals. Expenses were detailed as follows: \$206.87 to state and national organizations, expenses of seal sale \$299.32, administration \$80, donations for social service and medical training of technicians \$515, medicine \$8, cash finding by patch tests and x-rays \$167.94, and health and education work \$199.56.

Talk Heard For Building New County Jail At Baird

More attractive surroundings may soon be available for Callahan County prisoners. Sentiment is reported developing for building a new county jail at Baird.

The Commissioners Court advises that a bond issue will be necessary to finance the project as county coffers have only \$25,000 in the permanent improvement fund. Estimates are that a new jail would cost between \$60,000 and \$80,000.

"Our present jail is just worn out", says Sheriff Homer Price. Commissioners indicated that several possibilities for solving the jail problem had been discussed.

A complete renovation of the old jail would cost from \$10,000 to \$12,000, they said; and it would cost between \$60,000 and \$80,000 to place the jail in a vacant part of the fourth floor of the courthouse.

County Attorney Paul Shanks said that commissioners had indicated to him that they did not favor the inconvenience and cost of using the fourth floor of the courthouse as a jail, and felt the present jail is "too far gone" for satisfactory renovation.

The last \$3,000 of a 1929 bond issue for \$125,000 which was used to construct the Callahan County Courthouse will be paid off next year, officials said. Engineers estimate that it would cost about \$2 million to replace the courthouse.

The county commissioners, Shanks said, have indicated that they wish to meet the problem head on. "They want to find out what the people want to do, and do it", he said.

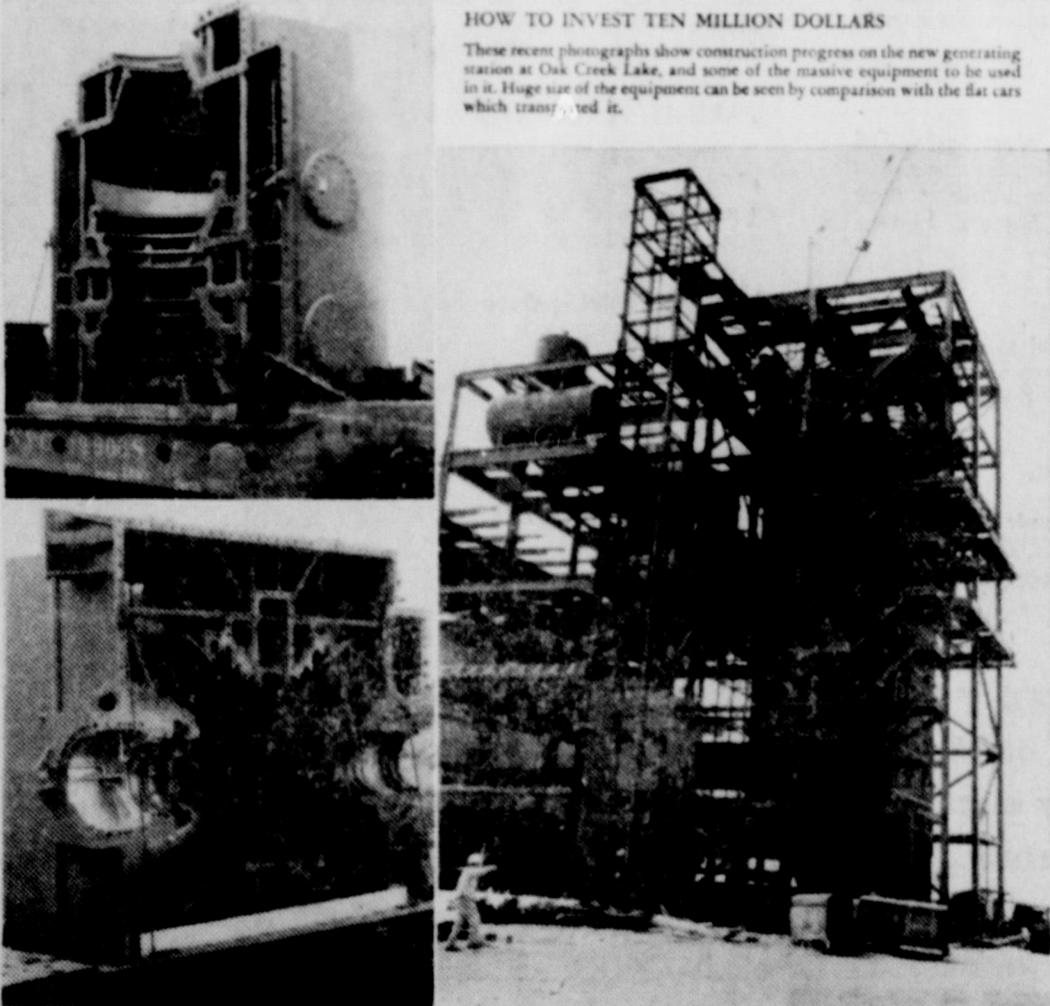
