## Charge 2 From Here In 'Grave Stomping'

A Cross Plains man and woman, accused of grave desecration, will be tried in county court at Baird July 6. Maximum punishment could be six months in jail and fines of \$500.

Charged are Laura Lavadelle Williams, 48, who recently moved here from Denton Valley and opened a gift shop on Highway 36, three miles west of town and Glenn Moody, 43, her ex-husband.

The pair allegedly stomped the grave of J. D. Windham, 15, who was buried in the Tecumseh Cemetery Wednesday afternoon of last week. Wreaths, sprays and a marker left at the grave were reportedly removed and damaged.

Young Windham, who died in an Abilene hospital following injuries sustained in an automobile wreck, had been buried only a few hours when the alleged desecration took place, said Byron Richardson, Cross Plains officer, who investigated the incident with Sheriff Homer Price and Deputy Tod Newton.

The Callahan County officers made the arrests here last Thursday night.

The Windham boy's desecrated grave was discovered by Charlie Tom Straley shortly after 7 p.m. Wednesday. Straley had been a pallbearer at the funeral.

Moody was taken to Abilene and given a lie detector test. He said that he and Mrs. Williams

had been upset about a tree which had been moved to make room for young Windham's grave.

He said the tree was an Arizona cypress tree, one of several he had planted in the "McBane plot" at the Tecumseh Cemetery "seven or eight years ago." He said he and Mrs. Williams never did find the tree, which was about eight feet tall.

The Tecumseh Cemetery was established in the 1890's. First person buried there was Dr. J. D. Windham, a kinsman who ironically had the same name as the youth whose grave was desecrated.

At the present time, the Tecumseh Methodist Church holds deed to the cemetery.

Straley reported to deputies that flowers had been torn from around the grave and strewn across the ground, that a grave marker had been tossed aside, and that the grave had been "stomped."

Members of the Windham family have been buried since 1898 in a double strip beginning at the south boundary of the cemetery, which is located between Dudley and Oplin.

Grave desecration is a misdemeanor charge which comes for trial in county court. It will be tried by County Judge J. Lester Farmer. Attorney James Paul Shanks will handle prosecution.

## 'City Dads' Ponder Issue Of \$20,000 In Warrants

A proposal to issue \$20,000 worth of revenue warrants is being pondered by Cross Plains City Council.

The money would be used to install facilities to alleviate sewer troubles in the Edgewood addition, to make repairs to the

municipally-owned gas distributing system and to extend sewer lines to several homes in the south east part of town.

"No definite action has yet been taken", said Mayor Ted Souder yesterday, "however, we have consulted a bond authority

regarding the feasibility of the plan".

Approximately \$15,000 would be spent on the gas system and the remaining \$5,000 on the two sewer projects.

The proposal has been discussed at recent meetings of the council with sentiment being expressed both for and against. It is expected to come up for disposition, one way or the other, at the next regular meeting of the body Tuesday night of next week.

In March of 1952 the city of Cross Plains refunded all of its bonded indebtedness, which at that time was \$104,000. Bonds were payable from a \$1.50 tax levy. They were reissued at a lower rate of interest and made payable in the years 1962 through 1977, but with options of prior payments in six and 12 years from date.

By applying the entire \$1.50 levy to the payment of the bonds since 1952, the city has retired \$28,000 worth, originally due between 1953 and 1961. In addition, \$32,000 has been paid on bonds due to mature from 1968 through 1977. A total of \$60,000 has, therefore, been paid on the original \$104,000 indebtedness, leaving today a total of \$44,000 outstanding. Final payment for the remaining bonds is due in 1972.

There are no revenue bonds or warrants against any of the city's utility systems: natural gas, sewer and water. Nothing else is owed by the incorporation other than current bills, which are customarily paid on or before the tenth of each month.

Although only \$20,000 new indebtedness is being pondered by City Councilmen, C. N. Burt, Dallas bond representative, told Mayor Souder last week that three times that amount would find a ready market. In a statement to Souder, he said: "It would not take more than \$1.25 of your present \$1.50 levy to retire a \$100,000 obligation, and if you plan to add only \$20,000 to the \$40,000 currently owed, two-thirds of that amount would be adequate".

"It is my opinion that net profits from the gas and sewer systems would be enlarged and service improved, if the repairs and extensions were instituted", Souder declared.

Texas statutes empower the City Council to issue warrants of this type now being considered, without a vote of the people, unless there is formal application, through petition, that the proposition be put to the electorate.

## Bank Director Here Dies While Asleep

Funeral services for Marshall Newcomb, former Dallas attorney and a director in the Citizens State Bank of Cross Plains, were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 from Marris-Mundy-Quill chapel in Dallas, with Mr. William C. Jones officiating. Burial was at Hillcrest Memorial Park in Dallas.

Mr. Newcomb died in his sleep Sunday night or early Monday morning at his ranch near Bluff Dale. He had recently been a patient in a Brownwood hospital, however, was thought to be recovering normally. Death resulted from heart disease.

Newcomb, who was 56 at the time of his death, was a graduate of the school of law at Southern Methodist University in Dallas and has served 30 years as general counsel for the Lone Star Gas Company. He retired about two years ago and had devoted much of his time since to ranching. He owned a ranch near Morgan Hill in Erath County, although the family home was maintained in Dallas. He was on a short trip to the ranch when fatally stricken.

## 6 Foot, 6 Inch Prisoner Too Slippery For Jailer

Claborn Weldon McPeak, 29-year-old hot checker, tricked Callahan County officers for the second time in a week Sunday night, when he escaped from jail at Baird.

Previously he had freed himself from the Callahan County calaboose by giving Sheriff Homer Price a worthless check for \$32.80, to settle a fine.

The Sunday night escape was made by removing a bar on an outside window in the jail's second floor run-around. McPeak, a six foot, six inch 165 pounder crawled through the opening and lowered himself to the ground. The break was discovered Monday morning when Price went upstairs to take the prisoner's breakfast.

McPeak had been jailed at Baird early last week after conviction of being drunk in a public place and given a \$5 fine and court costs totaling \$27.80. When his check for the fine bounced, he was arrested by Abilene officers and returned to Baird. It was during the second confinement that the jail break occurred.

Court records show that McPeak was convicted of habitual check swindling in Abilene Oct. 21, 1959, and was sentenced in auto theft Nov. 20 of the same year.

He was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary on the check swindling charge, and three years for car theft. He is currently on parole from the penitentiary.

District Attorney Bill Thomas said he planned to seek to revoke McPeak's parole.

## Election Set On Jail, Courthouse Repair

Two propositions will be voted on July 15 as Callahan County voters go to the polls to ballot on a proposed \$50,000 bond election.

Proposition number one calls for issuance of \$35,000 for repairs to the courthouse. Proposition number two asks for \$15,000 to repair the county jail.

A majority of voters must favor each proposal for carriage of the \$50,000 issue.

Instead of repairing the jail some sentiment had been expressed in the county seat for an entirely new structure. Sheriff Homer Price said Monday a \$15,000 expenditure at the jail would be "just throwing money away" and that he favored a new building.

County Judge J. Lester Farmer and Commissioners Claude Foster, Roscoe Shelnut, Alton White and Glen Swor were told by engineers that a new jail would cost between \$60,000 and

\$100,000. "We simply don't have that kind of money", Farmer said in speaking for the court.

He pointed out that the proposed \$50,000 issue could be financed without a tax increase. There is currently \$25,000 in the permanent improvement fund and with the last payment on the courthouse to be made next year, funds which ordinarily accrue to this account would retire the new obligation, commissioners say.

Engineers report that the basement slab in the courthouse building must be replaced or walls of the structure may begin to crack. Drainage problems and a high water table are said to be causing settlement of the building.

The courthouse was built in 1929 at a cost of \$125,000. It has been estimated that if replaced today the cost would be between one and two million dollars.

In answer to a quip by Cecil Lotief that 'Cleve could not say he came to this country with his shoes on', Cleve replied in his ringing, virile voice: "No, I can claim no such dubious distinction, however, I feel no handicap because of the fact that I was nurtured at the breast of a pioneer Texas mother, walked barefoot to a country school, trained to sweat for bread by a stern but loving father, and also unlike Mr. Lotief, I take pride in the fact that in tonight's audience are men alongside of whom I've toiled on many drilling wells throughout this area: no, I didn't come to this country with my shoes on, but if that's dishonor,

Cliff Browning of Brownwood was presented the legion of valor medal Saturday by Texas DeMolays for heroics in saving a drowning friend, Richard By-num, three years ago. He is the grandson of Mrs. T. E. Baum of this city. Larry McAnally will receive American Farmer Degree with the Future Farmers of America. Sixteen Cross Plains youths are attending the FFA camp at Possum Kingdom Lake. A note burning ceremony, marking the retirement of a \$6,000 obligation, will be observed at the First Baptist Church Sunday morning.

July 25, 1926

News taken from the files of the Review 35 years ago was: J. D. Carroll fell into an ice scoring machine at the Ice Company here Saturday and both legs were badly cut. He is in the hospital. The Chamber of Commerce Band and the Fire Department will stage two day picnic here July 21-22. Several weeks ago Mr. Dice, manager of Higginbotham's hardware department advertised to sell a buggy and harness for \$100 and to reduce the price \$5 a week until it sold. The price is now \$65. Wednesday was clean up day in Cross Plains and most of the business houses closed in the forenoon in order to give everyone a chance to clean up about their premises.

July 3, 1936

Remember the following news items which appeared in the Review 25 years ago? City is ready for the annual 54th picnic with the celebration being held Thursday and Friday, July 9-10. Only the Post Office and Bank will be closed for the fourth of July. Cecil Moore of the Cross Cut area made the largest yield of wheat ever seen in this section, slightly more than 32 bushels to the acre. Ballots for the July 25 Democratic primary election were printed by the Review last week. Rosie's Beauty Shop has moved to a new location this week. Loyalty Club will not meet during the summer months.

June 27, 1941

Senatorial vote will be made Saturday with four candidates, O'Daniel, Johnson, Mann and Dies names on the ticket. The little township of Rowden, its general store, is being moved about two miles South of the old location to the junction of Highway 36 and the Rowden-Hill Side road. Bill Taylor, postmaster and owner of the store, secured permission from the postal department in Washington for the change in location. The Eugene Bell Post No. 82 of the American Legion received the lion's share of recognition at the district convention held at Stephenville June 21 and 22. Marriage of Miss Burdette Williams and Hollis Edwin Gallaway, will be solemnized July fifth. Miss Lanora Lacy and Linden Newton were married Wednesday morning. Robert Anderson, Margaret Browning, Jim Will Wilson and Jack Tunnell are attending John Tarleton Agriculture College the first six weeks this summer.

June 28, 1946

Most Cross Plains businesses will close for the Fourth. Mrs. Marie Sharrock will close her beauty shop July 13 and remain closed until August 5 while taking a vacation. G. W. Scott who has been Rising Star High School principal the past few years, was elected last week to succeed L. C. Cash as superintendent of schools at Pioneer. Rainfall in Cross Plains within the past week exceeded two inches. A singing school now in progress here will close Friday night. With the installation of a 20-foot neon sign at the Plains Theatre Cross Plains can boast of having the largest such sign in the county. Roy Sykes, recently released from the armed forces, has begun on-the-job training at the Citizens State Bank under the G. I. Bill of Rights.

June 29, 1951

Local seed dealers reported that farmers in this area have reported an infestation of worms devouring their peaunt crops. Chester Glover has been named official observer of the U. S. Weather Bureau for Cross Plains. The Cross Plains Masonic Lodge installed new officers here Monday night. A well on the J. E. Prater at Cross Cut gauged 58 barrels daily. Mountain lion tracks have been reported seen in the Cook community. Miss Imogene Newton of Cross Cut has

completed a five-day home nursing course at Texas State College for Women, Denton. Miss Minnie Dillard and Lloyd Fore were married Saturday morning. V. A. Montgomery Jr. left last week for Germany where he will be stationed. Thomas C. Thorn, 93, retired Methodist minister was buried Thursday.
