In addition, \$32,000 has been paid on bonds due to mature from 1968 through 1977. A total of \$60,000 has, therefore, been paid on the original \$104,000 indebtedness, leaving today a total of \$44,000 outstanding. Final payment for the remaining bonds is due in 1972.

There are no revenue bonds or warrants against any of the city's utility systems: natural gas, sewer and water. Nothing else is owed by the incorporation other than current bills which are cutomarily paid on or before the tenth of each month




