County Judge Explains View On Bond Election

Editor's Note: The following statement to the property tax-paying voters of callahan County was issued Monday by County Judge J. Lester Farmer.

"The courthouse and jail building bond election to be held Saturday, July 15, 1961, is for repairing the courthouse basement and the repair of the jail, inside and out.

There will be no increase in tax whatsoever as the same tax levy that was for the original courthouse bonds will be levied. The final payment of \$3,000.00 on present courthouse will be paid in 1962 and the money for that is now available. Therefore, the present tax money used to pay the original courthouse bond will be applied toward payment of the repair bonds.

"The engineers employed by the Commissioners' Court surveyed the needs of the courthouse and found that by repairing courthouse plumbing and cutting out water that is entering under the building.

"The engineers stated that a courthouse equal in value to the present one would cost approximately \$2,000,000.00. therefore, the Court believes that a small amount spent for repairing the present courthouse would save the taxpayers from building a new one
