Set-Up Near Complete For Local United Fund

Plans are nearing completion for a United Fund Drive to be launched in Cross Plains in October. All local charities would be handled through the United Fund organization and other similar campaigns would not be sanctioned here.

The Chamber of Commerce approved the idea in general and elected Rev. Harold G. Wise, local Presbyterian pastor, to be its representative and convenor to contact other local civic groups.

Organizations now cooperating in the United Fund movement and their representatives are: Chamber of Commerce, Rev. Wise; Eastern Star, Mrs. Russell Calhoun; Garden Club, Mrs. A. J. McCuin; Lions Club, Rev. John Harper; Parent-Teacher Association, representative yet-to-be-named; Sew and So Club, Mrs. Edwin Neeb; Woodmen of the World, representative yet-to-be-named. Other organizations interested in rendering civic service may contact the Rev. Mr. Wise.

First meeting of the United Fund committee will be held at Odom's Restaurant at 8 o'clock the evening of Tuesday, Aug. 8. By-laws will be adopted at that time and an executive committee elected.

The executive committee will administer the fund for one year. Annual fund-raising campaign will probably be launched in October, coordinated with national publicity.

Suggestions for organizations and movements to be locally financed by United Fund contributions include: Abilene Rehabilitation Center, Boy Scouts, Cancer Crusade, Christmas Cheer for the Unfortunate, Girl Scouts, Heart Fund, Polio Campaign, Local Charity, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Transients in Distress, U. S. O. and possibly others.

Leaders are insistent that our citizens be as unanimous as possible in making their gifts to charity through the United Fund", said the Rev. Mr. Wise, yesterday.

Man Known Here Drowns In Effort To Save Son, 11

A 41-year-old Merkel man, husband of a former Cross Plains girl, drowned Sunday afternoon in a stock pond near Merkel.

S. V. Wade and his 11-year-old son, Kenneth, were fishing when their boat overturned. The boy sobbed this account of the tragedy:

"He said he and his father were in a boat fishing while Jimmy Price, a family friend, was about 50 yards away in a boat. Suddenly the boat in which Wade and his son were in overturned."

"Daddy grabbed me and tried to save me," sobbed Kenneth. Young Wade then said his father went under. "I was hanging onto some cattail (high water grass) and hollering for Jim Price."

Wade of Merkel; his wife; three sons, Dwaine, Vernon and Kenneth, all of Merkel; four daughters, Linda, Cecilia, Diane and Janet all of the home; six brothers, Alva Wade of Tulsa, Alford of Abilene, Airgtee and Calvin, both of Abilene, Brandon of Merkel and J. B. Jr. of Roscoe; four sisters, and two grandchildren.

The deceased was a nephew of Mrs. Eldon Gregg of Cross Plains.

Voters Trek To Polls Saturday For Ballot On \$50,000 Bonds

Saturday will be election day throughout Callahan County. Property-owning tax payers will ballot on a proposed \$50,000 bond issue for repairs at the

courthouse and jail. A simple majority is necessary for carriage of the bond. Plans call for \$15,000 being spent to repair and modernize

the jail building, and \$35,000 to be spent on the courthouse structure, which is reported imperiled by a high water table. Damage is said to be evident in the basement of the building.

Only qualified voters who hold property in Callahan County, and who rendered it for taxation are eligible to vote. Unlike most other elections, a poll tax receipt or legal exemption is not sufficient.

The same opening and closing of the polls will be used in the election Saturday as is customarily observed in general elections. Doors will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Presiding judges and places of voting at the 16 voting precincts in the county will be: Cross Plains, Fred W. Stacy, City Hall; Baird, Jon Hardwick, American Legion Building; Belle Plain, Mrs. Dick Young, School Building; Clyde, Gaston Swofford, Community Center; Cottonwood, K. B. Robbins, Community Center; Admiral, Ernest Higgins, Church Building; Putnam, Douglas Fry, Fred Cook Building; Erath, Mrs. Ed Eubank, Eubank Home; Eula, Hilton Tarrant, School Building; Dudley, Otto Betcher, Methodist Church; Atwell, Bill Pope, Community Center; Lanham, Ralph McAdams, McAdams Home; Oplin, Lee Straley, Community Center; Rowden, R. W. Gibbs, Community Center; Denton Valley, J. M. Whitley, Community Center; Hart, Mrs. Ray Wilbanks, School building.

As a general rule the same clerks will be utilized as worked in the recent senatorial election, however presiding judges at each precinct will be in charge of replacements and additions.

County Judge Explains View On Bond Election

Editor's Note: The following statement to the property tax-paying voters of Callahan County was issued Monday by County Judge J. Lester Farmer.

"The courthouse and jail building bond election to be held Saturday, July 15, 1961, is for repairing the courthouse basement and the repair of the jail, inside and out.

There will be no increase in tax whatsoever as the same tax levy that was for the original courthouse bonds will be levied. The final payment of \$3,000.00 on present courthouse will be paid in 1962 and the money for that is now available. Therefore, the original tax money used to pay the original courthouse bond will be applied toward payment of the repair bonds.

"The engineers employed by the Commissioners' Court surveyed the needs of the courthouse and found that by repairing courthouse plumbing and cutting out water that is entering under the building,

the main building could be saved from more expensive repairs.

"The engineers stated that a courthouse equal in value to the present one would cost approximately \$2,000,000.00, therefore, the Court believes that a small amount spent for repairing the present courthouse would save the taxpayers from building a new one later.

With these bonds the present jail is to be made safe, more modern and sanitary for prisoners on the inside, and the outside is to be reworked, painted and made more attractive.

"We are aware of the fact that the tax problem is something that we all should give more thought to and keep as low as possible to maintain the needs of Callahan County. Therefore, the Commissioners' Court felt that in order to avoid a raise in taxes, that this solution to the needs of the county was the best, and we urge you to give it your consideration."

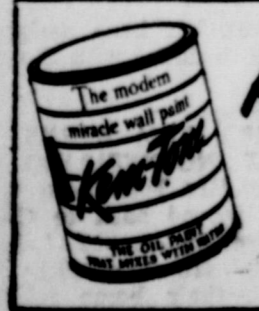

History Given Of Counties In 63rd

Texas 63rd Legislative District, recently regrouped to include Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Shackelford and Stephens Counties, has a population of 60,846.

Representative Scott Bailey, who now represents three of the counties in the new district is expected to be a candidate for the newly-created 63rd in elections next year.

Callahan County — created in 1858, organized in 1877 and named for James H. Callahan, early-day Texas Ranger and Indian fighter.

Eastland County — created in 1858, organized in 1873, named for Captain William M. Eastland, who was a Texas Ranger and the first man to draw a "black bean" and be executed after the Battle of Mier.

Palo Pinto County — created in 1856, organized in 1857, named for Palo Pinto Creek which runs through the county.

Shackelford County — created in 1858, organized in 1874 and named for Dr. John Shackelford, hero of the Texas Revolution and one of the few survivors at the Goliad Massacre.

Stephens County — created in 1858, organized in 1876, originally named Buchanan County; name changed to Stephens County in 1867, named for Alexander H. Stephens, vice-president of the Southern Confederacy.

Little Action Required To Benefit From Amendment

Most residents of the Cross Plains area who will directly benefit from amendments to the Social Security Act, recently signed into law by President Kennedy do not need to write or contact their social security office, according to R. R. Tuley Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

He has supplied the following summary:

- Automatic changes.**
1. Aged widows already receiving benefits on their late husband's account will get 10% increase in September, for August, 1961.
2. Beneficiaries with no dependents, who are receiving reduced benefits of less than \$40 will be raised to \$40 in September, for August.
3. Women receiving reduced retirement benefits because they started being paid before age 65 will get some increase if their basic rate, before reduction, was less than \$40.
4. Men may now receive benefits at age 62; on retirement, as dependent widower, or dependent widower, or dependent parent. Men with continued high earnings (over \$1200 per year) should check to see whether some payment would be possible despite such high earnings.
5. Some persons whose claims were denied before this month because they did not have sufficient credits under social security should make new inquiry. The minimum requirement of the 1 1/2 years of credits was not changed; however, for those who needed more than that many credits, the number was reduced from 1 3/4 of the time after 1950 and before age 62 for

women and before age 65 for men. Men must have slightly more creditable time in the system than women. Persons in group 4 or 5, should write to the social security office in Abilene, giving their dates of birth and social security number. Arrangements will then be made to talk with them when a representative of the Abilene office is at or near their home town.

PHILOSOPHER GLAD TO LEARN CONGRESS KNOWS HOW TO RAISE DEBT CEILING

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou discusses finances this week, personal and national.

Dear editor:

There are many things I don't understand about Washington, and I guess this is balanced by the fact there are many things that Washington doesn't understand about me, but when it comes to financial matters, Washington is pretty much in step with the rest of the country.

I know it's customary to complain, if not yell and scream, about the amount of money Washington spends, but when you get right down to it, Washington pretty well reflects the rest of us.

For example, I was trying to scrape up enough money to buy a new picture tube for my television set — I could get along without television, everybody did fifteen years ago, but who does? — and it was straining my budget and to rest my mind and clear my head for a proper decision on this matter I picked up a newspaper and ran across an article that made my decision easy.

According to it, Congress has a permanent debt ceiling for the country. Back in 1954, Congress decided unlimited wild spending had to be curbed, a line had to be drawn, and since then it's been against the law for the national government to get further into debt than 285 billion dollars.

But along about this time every year Congress looks up and discovers a picture tube, so to speak, has blown out and it's going to take some extra money to run the country. So last week, as it has done every year since 1954, Congress temporarily raised the debt limit, this time by 13 billion. Understand, the permanent ceiling of 285 still stands, this is just a temporary measure to get by on this year, and it's still against the law, the permanent one, that is, to go beyond the 1954 figure.

This is what I'm talking about. How could me and Congress

know that my picture tube was going to burn out or that 15-million dollar missile was going to fizzle? We've got to be econ-

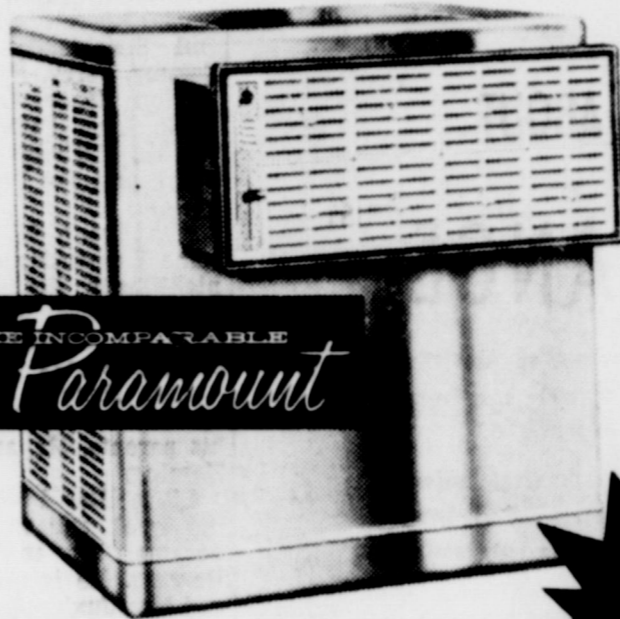

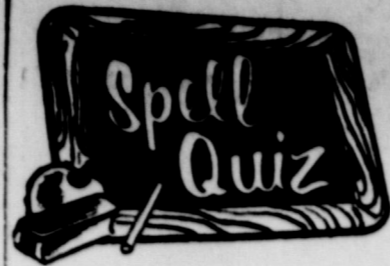

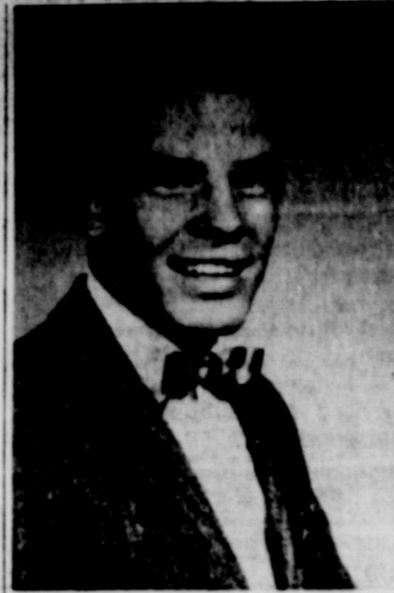
