City Uses \$7,500 Loan To Replace Leaky Main Lines

Utilizing funds from a recent bank loan of \$7,500, the City of Cross Plains has begun replacing a number of gas lines in the west part of town. The pipe being replaced is said to have been barely serviceable and contained many leaks.

Cross Plains buys gas at the city gate and distributes the fuel to consumers. Purchases

for the first eight months of this year by the city have totaled \$11,525. Purchases for September, October, November and December, however, are expected to be proportionately higher.

Purchases by months have been: January \$2,631.40, February \$2,412.40, March \$1,813.20, April \$1,000.20, May \$931.00, June \$950.00, July \$924.00 and August \$862.80.

Cross Plains' Buffaloes open District 10-A play Friday night at Santa Anna with the Mountaineers at 7:30 p.m.

The Mountaineers boast a host of returning lettermen from last year's team. Santa Anna's grid crew is reported to have a well balanced attack spearheaded by a quartet of experienced, fast and slippery backs.

Thus far during the 1961 grid campaign Friday's opponents have compiled a 3-1-1 record. They have lost only to class AA Hamilton, but were tied by class B Bronte. Santa Anna has defeated Rising Star, Bangs and Goldthwaite.

The Buffs have been victorious in only one contest, but they found a scoring punch last week in decisioning class AA Ranger 18-12.

According to the Abilene Reporter-News area grid ratings for class A schools, the Mountaineers were placed in the number four spot, behind first place Albany and second place Clyde, both District 10-A members. Cross Plains was in the eleventh slot, just one notch away from the cellar, which is held by District 10-A Eastland, according to last week's publication.

Game time has been moved up to 7:30 Friday night. All remaining conference tilts will begin at 7:30 p.m.

1.85 Inch Rain This Week Sends '61 Total Over Normal For Year

Slow, gentle rains which began falling over the Cross Plains area late Sunday night and continued intermittently until early Tuesday yielded 1.85 inches.

Although the moisture was not particularly welcomed by farmers who are faced with the chore of harvesting peanuts, it was said to be a boon to recently planted small grains and winter pastures.

Total precipitation received here during the first 10 days of October amounted to 2.25 inches. With two and two-thirds

months yet to go, 1961 has already brought more than a normal year's moisture. Thus far this year, S. F. Bond, official observer for the Weather Bureau in Cross Plains, has measured 25.72 inches. The mean here is 24.54 inches.

If the normal amount of rain is received here during the last 80 days of the year, 1961 will probably be the wettest year for the Cross Plains area in the past 12, with the single exception of 1957 when over 38 inches fell.

Charges were filed by Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson, who took signed statements from the two men. Richardson, who said he had been working on the case several weeks, was assisted by Deputy Sheriff Tod Newton of Baird, Deputy Texas Ranger H. F. Fenton of Coleman who works with the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and Texas Ranger Gene Graves of Sweetwater.

The two men were held in Cross Plains jail temporarily, however, both have since been transferred to the Taylor County jail at Abilene.

Charges against the trio will be presented to 42nd District Court Grand Jury which convenes in Baird Oct. 23.

Goats were allegedly recently stolen from Edwin Baum's herd three miles west of Cross Plains, and from George Crane, who ranches along the western edge of Callahan County.

Richardson indicated that additional charges were pending in Taylor County against the two men.

"Our work is not yet finished, there may be additional developments," he said. Several of the stolen animals have already been returned to their owners and officers were working yesterday to recover others. It was understood here that auction rings through which any stolen animals were sold will be accountable to owners of the livestock for any loss incurred.

At least 16 cases are known to be waiting grand jury investigation in 42nd District Court at Baird. Eight involve livestock theft, four are charges of driving while intoxicated, one is for theft of a motor and three are for burglary of a store at Clyde.

Plant For Drying Peanuts Due Here

Work has already been started on improvements and enlargements at Gary Mill & Elevator Company in Cross Plains, which when completed will cost in excess of \$20,000.

Presently under construction is additional storage for grain and peanuts. Planned to come next is a peanut drying plant, which has long been needed in this area.

The drying plant will enable the firm to accept peanuts as soon as they are combined, either sacked or in the bulk, for drying. Normally, peanuts are plowed up and allowed to dry for several days in the fields. By combining them immediately, the loss by shattering and by rain will be insignificant.

Similar equipment has been proved in experiments elsewhere during the past few years.

Billions For Defense But Not One Cent For Political Pie

(AN EDITORIAL)

There is now sentiment in Washington to saddle Uncle Sam with still another strange expense.

Opinions are now being heard from influential places that the federal government should pick up the tab for presidential campaigns. A nine-man committee has been named to study the proposition and make recommendations on findings next spring.

Existing laws set a three million dollar limit on expenses for a national campaign. Neither major party confines expenditures to this ceiling. To get around the law both parties have various independent groups, which raise money on their own and boost aspirants of their choice. Presumably, through, the idea now being considered would be to present the federal government with a six million dollar bill after each presidential election to repay money spent by both Republicans and Democrats.

How ridiculous can we get?

Confronted with the greatest peril in our country's history, is this a time to seek out places for more non-essential spending?

Despite the charges of diminishing patriotism, Americans appear willing to undertake any sacrifice to perpetuate liberty and freedom for the children. Young men are now being called upon to leave their families and jobs to take up arms in their country's defense. The loved ones they leave behind are willing to meet any tax obligation to hasten their return home, however, very few feel that additional tax to pay expense of candidates for office is hardly in keeping with an all-out effort national defense.

No new expense is too much to keep the Stars and Stripes rippling in the breeze with dignity and honor, giving hope to oppressed people everywhere. On the other hand, any additional expense is too much which does not have this for its paramount purpose, and paying the bills incurred by political candidates hardly seems to measure up.

The Victory Baptist Church of Cross Plains held first services in its new building last Sunday. The structure is located on South Ave. D, one block north of Highway 36.

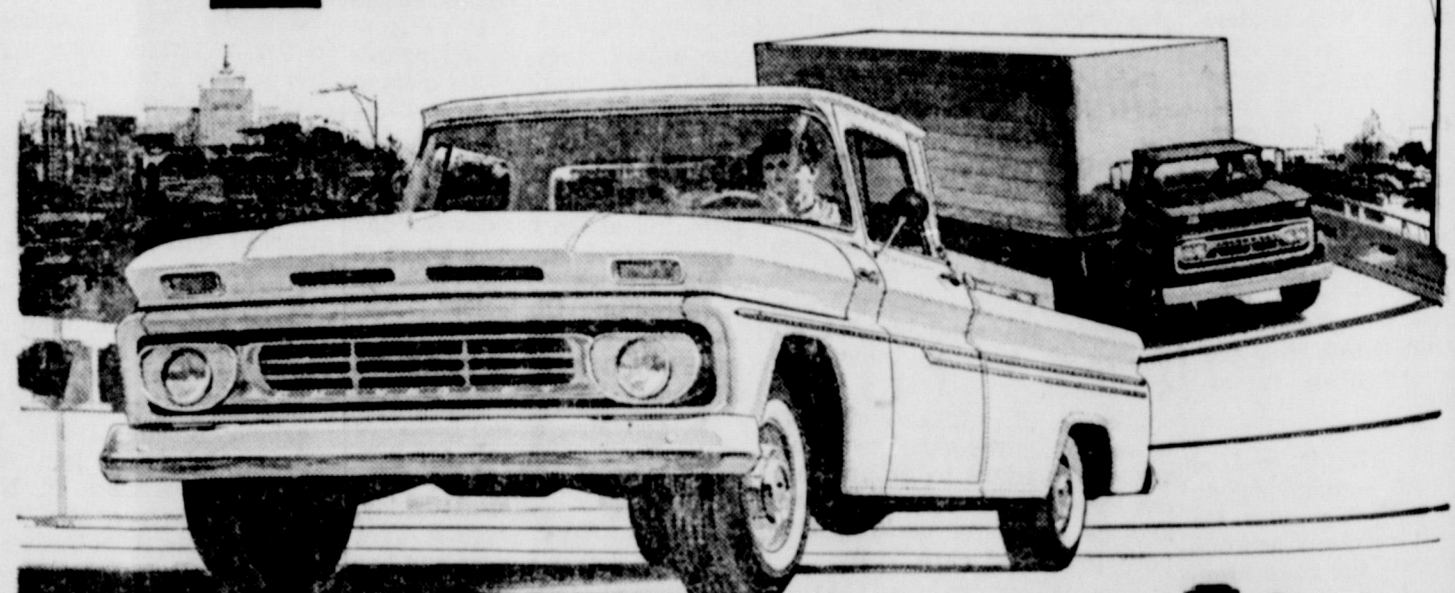
Rev. Lee Rutledge, pastor of the church, says the building will seat 100, has two Sunday School rooms and rest room facilities. Both furnishings and song books are new.

PHILOSOPHER WORRIED ABOUT THE 23 PEOPLE WHO LOOK TO HIM FOR FOOD

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou is misinterpreting the facts this week. Certainly we're not depending on him to feed us.

"I know there are a lot of people worried about the possibility of an atomic war, but they make a mistake when they worry about it too much.

"I mean, with all the other things to worry about, why get in a rut?"

"For example, I was reading some statistics about farmers last night in a copy of a newspaper somebody threw out of his car as it passed my Johnson grass farm out here earlier in the day, and according to it, the percentage of farmers to the rest of the population in the United States continues to shrink. A hundred years ago, farmers were in the majority, the cities and towns started gaining, picking up speed especially in the last few years. In fact, farmers lost 23 per cent of their numbers from 1954 to 1961, just seven years. Today, only nine per cent of the country's population can be called a farmer.

"But that's not the thing to worry about, it's this. The number of people in town a farmer

has to feed is increasing. As the farm population goes down and the city population up, the burden on the farmer gets heavier. A hundred years ago, one farmer produced enough for himself and four others. Today, he has to produce enough for himself and 23 others, according to the United States Department of Agriculture.

"That's what I'm talking about. I don't know who the 23 people are in Cross Plains I'm supposed to feed, but whoever they are, if I was them, I'd forget about the hydrogen bomb and start worrying over where my next meal is coming from.

"The load is getting too big. By the time I get through feeding myself and my family and an occasional in-law that drops in invariably at meal time, there's mighty slim pickings for those 23 people in town waiting to be fed. I believe if I was them I'd put in a backyard garden, just to be on the safe side. I hope you're not one of the 23 looking to me for food. There's nothing worse for the peace and harmony of a community than an under-fed newspaperman, unless it's a hungry politician, although well-fed ones have been known to cause trouble."

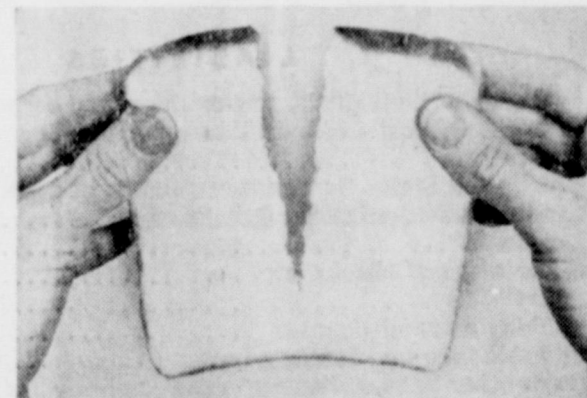

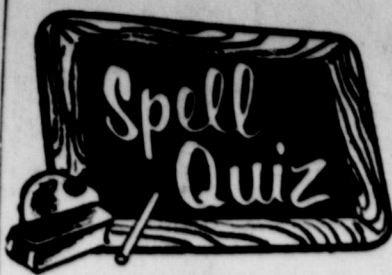

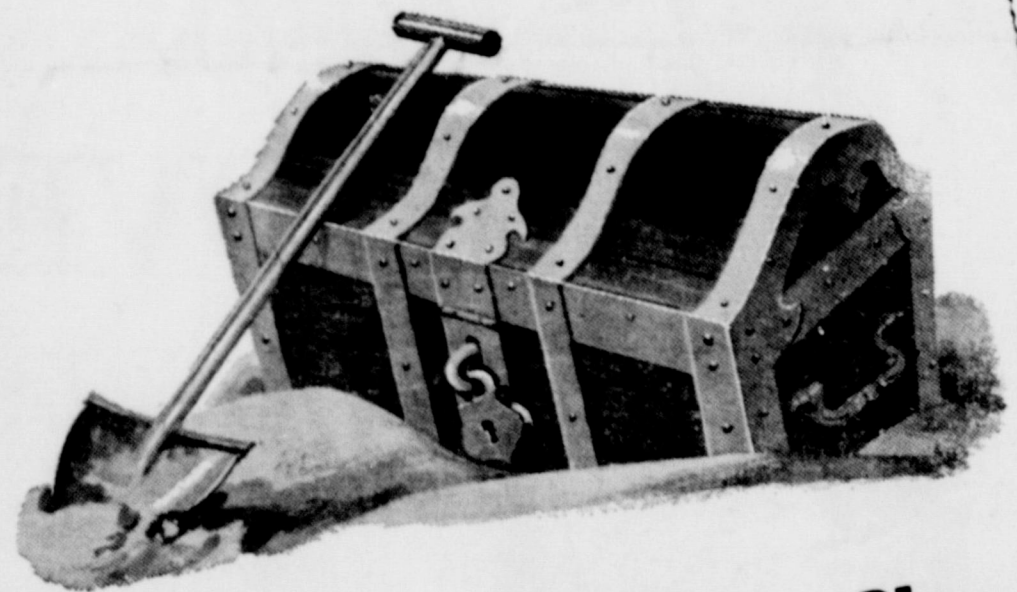
