Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson took a written confession, in which Leggett said he broke into the Gary Feed Mill and Magnolia warehouse in Cross Plains last December. He also admitted looting the Chevrolet agency in Baird three times, the Ford dealership there twice and the Pontiac place in Baird once and the Baird Lumber Company once.

Leggett is now in custody of Texas Rangers and is being taken to other West Texas counties to face examining officers as a means of possibly clearing up additional crimes.

His confession of Callahan County burglaries will come before the new grand jury in 42nd District Court, which convenes in Baird Thursday morning.

Bad Boys Leave Callahan Jail To Face Charges In Palo Pinto

A 24-year-old gunman, loser in a "stand-off" with officers at Baird last week, and his 19-year-old companion have been transferred to Palo Pinto County to face armed robbery indictments.

The two captured at Baird were Donald Wayne Wisley, 24, a soldier AWOL from Camp Carson, Colo., and Charles Alan Osterhout, 19, of Hoboken, N. J.

Palo Pinto County Sheriff Gilbert Sommerfield said they were indicted by a 29th District Court grand jury. They were fined \$25.50 each by Justice of Peace W. L. Bowlus in Baird, Osterhout for not having a driver's license, and Wisley for allowing a non-licensed driver to drive a car.

Highway patrolmen Jack Shields and Glen Gordon Johnson arrested the pair when they spotted their car on U. S. Highway 80 west of Baird with one taillight out. After the patrolmen took them to Baird, Wisley pulled a pistol from under the car seat and "got the drop" on them in front of the Callahan County Courthouse.

The two officers also managed to draw their guns, but hesitated

to fire because houses and a cafe were in back of Wisley and they feared their shots might hit some innocent person, Shields explained. The "stand-off" ended when Osterhout, who tried to get Wisley to give himself up, finally got close enough to him to grab the gun. Wisley was easily brought under control then and both men were taken to the Callahan County jail.

The two men were wanted for robbery of a service station at the intersection of Highway 80 and 281, about 14 miles south of Mineral Wells in Palo Pinto County, and for kidnaping an attendant there earlier Monday night.

Sheriff Sommerfield said Louis Bennett, 16, son of the filling station owner, C. M. Bennett, was taken about seven miles north toward Mineral Wells and put on a dirt road. He said about \$56 was taken in the robbery.

Sommerfield said kidnaping charges against the two were dropped since they apparently only wanted to cover up their armed robbery and not to kidnap Bennett.

Texas U. Says Callahan's Population Upped In '61

Callahan County experienced a population growth of 4.2 per cent during 1961, according to figures recently released by the University of Texas Population Research Center in Austin.

Callahan's growth was reported larger than any neighboring county and second in West Texas only to Motley County with a five per cent increase.

According to figures released by the university Taylor County increased 3.2 per cent, Brown rose 1.6 per cent, Eastland fell .6 per cent and Shackelford lost .1 per cent. Callahan County's present population was estimated to be 8,265.

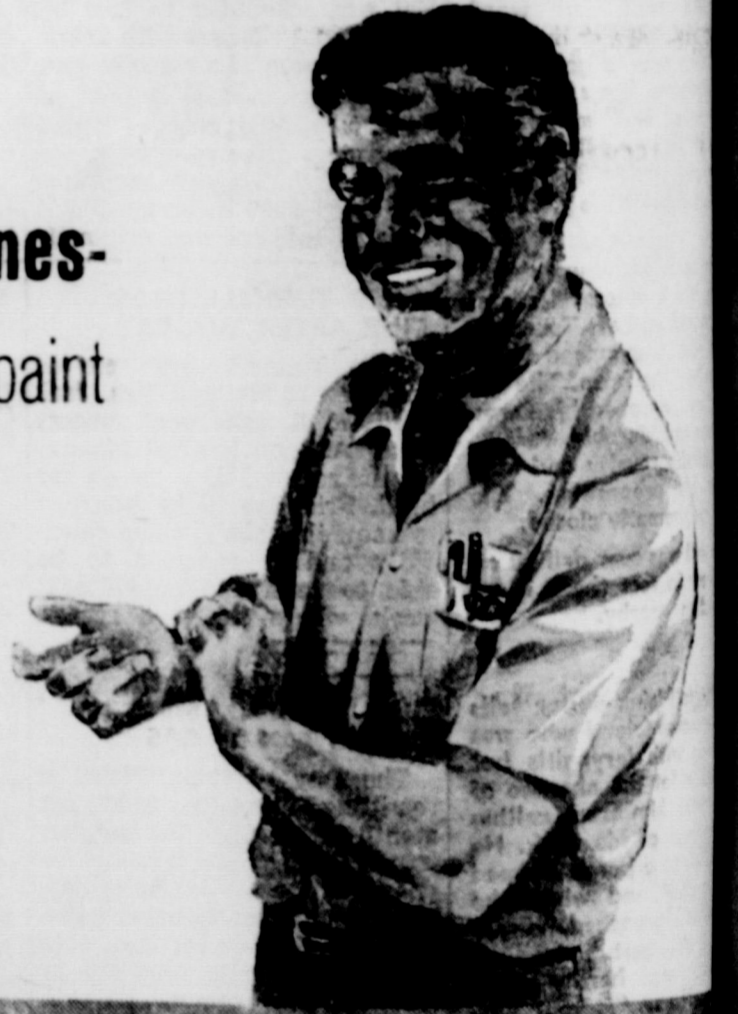

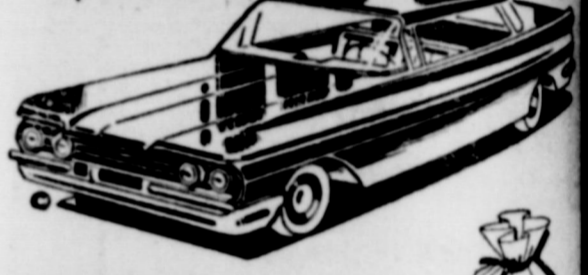

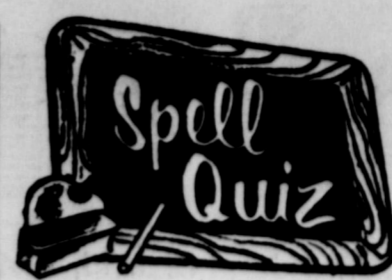

To The Voters Of Justice Precinct 6, Callahan County

There seems to be quite a number of the people who do not know the duties of a Justice of the Peace. A Justice sets the fine. The State Law sets the cost. If a person is brought in or given a ticket for a traffic violation by a county officer, and a fine is set at \$1.00, then the cost is \$19.50 which costs the violator \$20.50. If a state patrolman gives the ticket, the cost is \$15.50. There is no arresting fee charged.

The minimum fine is \$1.00. The maximum fine is \$200.00. A Justice is authorized to set a fine anywhere from \$1.00 to \$200.00. Most all the fines paid here in Justice Court range from \$1.00 to \$10.00, then the cost is added.

The fines are assessed according to the violation. It takes money to pay the law enforcement officers. You will have to pay them from your tax money, or let the law violators pay it, which they have done for the past three years, or since we have gotten officers here that will try to enforce the law.

Do you want to pay this expense from your tax money, or let them pay it? I say let them pay.
