City Dads Shuck Shirts And Become Nighttime Painters

City dads shucked their shirts here Friday night and became painters, working for free, to redecorate Cross Plains City Hall.

Mayor Ted Souder and his board of aldermen painted ceiling and walls of the rear portion of the building and regular employees of the city have been repainting all floors. All of the labor is being done in the evenings at no cost to the city.

"When citizens visit the City Hall to vote May 5, we believe they will be pleased with the improved appearance," Souder said.

Friday And Saturday Clean-Up Days Here

Friday and Saturday are clean-up days in Cross Plains.

To encourage wide participation by householders, Mayor Ted Souder declares trucks will be provided by the city to haul away rubbish. No charge will be made for this service.

"The trucks can be made available only two days," the mayor says, "and it is imperative that refuse be placed in accessible spots, either near an open alley or a city street."

The clean-up campaign is strongly endorsed by City Health Officer Dr. Carl J. Sohns and local civic organizations.

"I hope all accumulations of tin cans, rubbish and litter will be hauled away," said Dr. Sohns, "for shortly the city will be requested to spray throughout the municipality to destroy breeding places of mosquitoes, flies and other disease carrying pests. Spraying will be less beneficial if hindered by such spawning spots as trash affords."

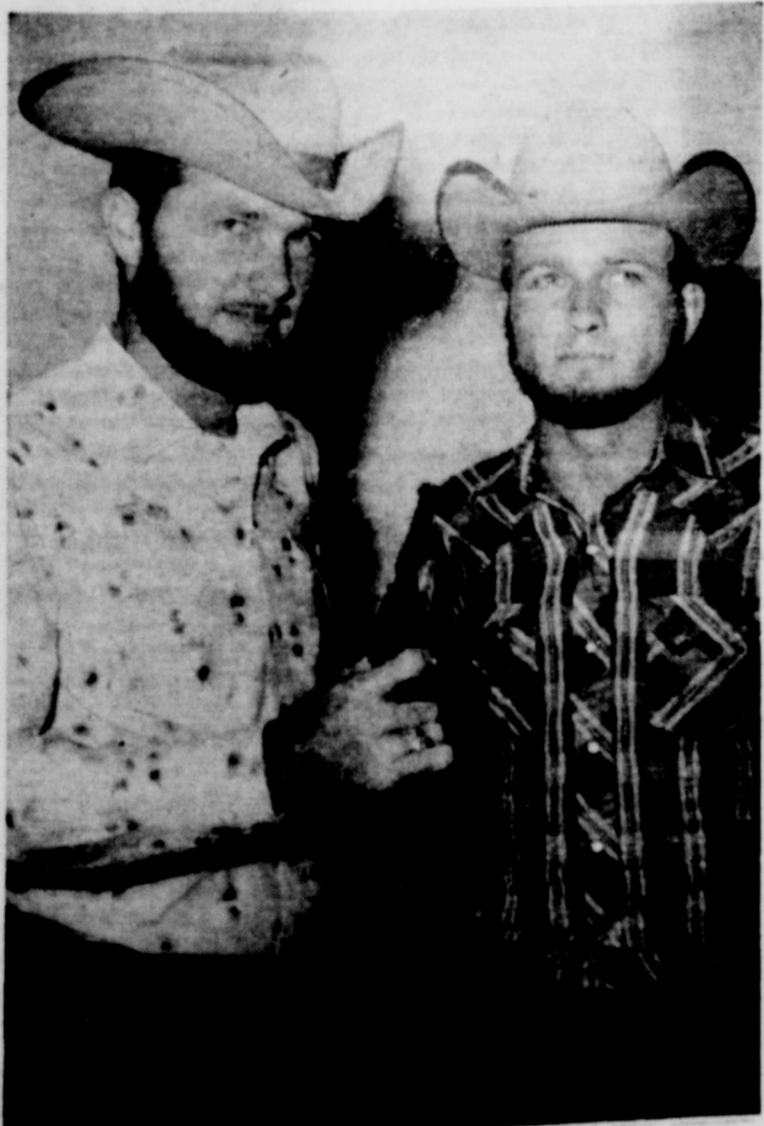

7 Local People Hurt As Cars Collide Near Ballinger; 2 Odessans Killed

Seven Cross Plains persons were injured, an Odessa man and his daughter killed and two others hurt in an automobile accident five miles east of Ballinger Sunday afternoon at 4:30.

Driver of the Cross Plains car was Darwin Anderson, 39. Riding alongside him in the front seat were Mrs. Anderson and their daughter Vanda, 13. Back seat passengers were Mr. and Mrs. Ben Atwood and Mrs. Jack

Watson and two-year-old son, Guy. Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. Watson are daughters of the Atwoods. Most seriously injured in the Anderson car was little Guy Watson, who sustained serious

head injuries and was later transferred to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, after first being taken to a Ballinger hospital. He is said to be in a critical condition.

Pronounced dead on arrival at the Ballinger hospital was J. C. Matthews, 39, driver of the other vehicle. His daughter, Karen, succumbed about two hours later. Mrs. Matthews, 31, was hospitalized as a victim of shock and another daughter, Janet Matthews, 2, received treatment for cuts and bruises.

Mrs. Anderson, 35, received deep lacerations about the chin and neck and severe body bruises. Both Mr. and Mrs. Atwood received cuts and bruises but were not seriously injured. Mrs. Watson, 21, also received superficial injuries, but remained at her infant son's bedside. The child's father rushed to Ballinger as soon as word of the accident reached here and is with his wife and son.

Both cars were engulfed in flames following the crash, and Mrs. Anderson was temporarily pinned in the inferno. She was removed, however, before being injured by the fire.

All occupants of the Odessa automobile were thrown out by the impact.

Ballinger Highway Patrolman H. H. Anthony said the Odessa car was traveling west when Matthews evidently tried to pass another auto and seeing there was not sufficient time applied brakes. He said the car skidded across the road into the path of the oncoming Anderson vehicle.

Anthony said Anderson's car hit Matthews' at the right rear fender.

Both vehicles were said to be total losses.

The Cross Plains people were returning from Crane, where they had visited since Friday in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Hughes and son, Mrs. Hughes is also a daughter of the Atwoods.

Many Cross Plains friends rushed to the Ballinger and Abilene hospitals this week as soon as news of the accident reached here.

School Bands Give Concert Thursday

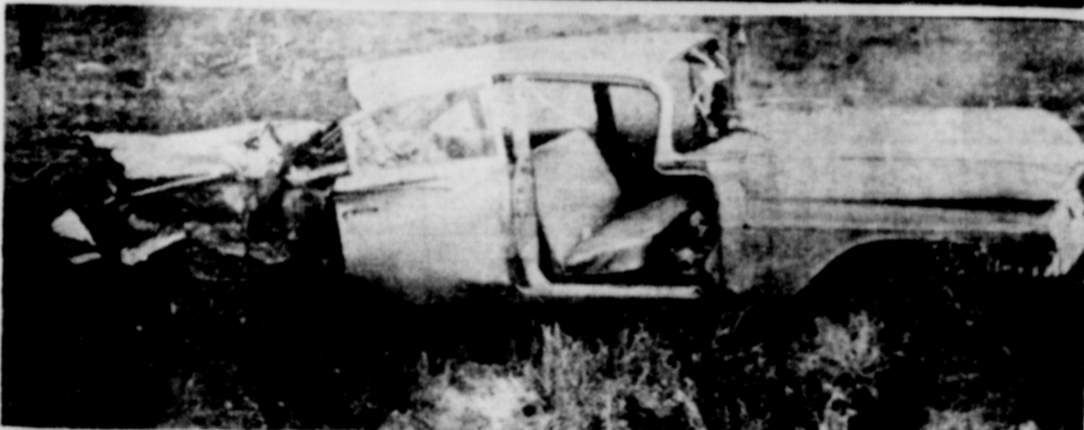
Cross Plains public schools' music department will present an "Evening of Music" Thursday night in the school auditorium, beginning at 7:30.

Cemetery working to haul away an accumulation of rocks, wire and rubbish will be held here Friday morning, beginning at nine o'clock.

Directors met this week and set the working as a means of getting much needed work done without straining the already- overtaxed treasury.

"We genuinely hope that several trucks and pick-ups will be available and sufficient workers on hand to accomplish this hitherto-neglected task," said Mrs. John Howard Balkum, secretary-treasurer of the cemetery association.

Regular maintenance at Cross Plains Cemetery costs \$125 monthly and recent contributions have barely equaled that sum.

Contract Pends On 2 More Dams

Bids were opened Friday at Soil Conservation offices in Temple for the construction of two more retention dams in the Cross Plains area.

The apparent low bidder had not completed requirements yesterday, however, and actual award was reportedly being temporarily withheld.

The contract now pending covers construction at sites numbered 10 and 12, both of which are just southwest of here in Brown County.

COUNTY GETS \$4,928 MORE FROM LICENSE

Increased car registration has netted \$4,928 for Callahan County.

Total registrations this year have grossed \$108,088.52 as compared with \$98,231.06 to the same period last year. The increase of \$9,857.46 is divided equally between the state and county.

Street Parade Tuesday Launches Little League

Little League baseball season opens in Cross Plains Tuesday, May 1.

In the Tuesday afternoon parade, uniformed players will march with their managers and sponsors. The high school band will also march.

No Wrecks 17 Days, Then Bang Bang

Hopes of passing the month of April without a serious traffic accident in the Cross Plains area were blasted last week.

Highway Patrolman Jerry Matthews reported the first 17 days of the month as being accident-free, then three occurred in rapid order.

First of the mishaps was late last Wednesday afternoon when Lonnie Gray of Pioneer and G. W. Newton of Houston were involved in a collision near Fore's Grocery, four miles east on

Highway 36. Gray received a broken collarbone and deep lacerations about the head. Estimated damage of the two automobiles was \$800.

A new pick-up truck, driven by Joe Munoz Rios, Jr., of Knox City, was extensively damaged when it overturned on Highway 36, two miles east of town, Friday at 1:15 p.m. The wreck was caused by a blow-out of a front tire. Rios, who was hauling cottonseed, escaped without injury. His vehicle sustained \$2,500 damage.

The third accident happened Sunday at 6 p.m. four miles south of town on State Highway 279. Beatrice B. Rutherford, a former Cross Plains school teacher, hit a slick spot on the pavement and careened into a ditch, the car overturning. Three Abilene women were in the car, however, only one was hurt. She was Mrs. J. B. Rutherford, who received lacerations about the leg. The third passenger was Maxine Banner. Damage to the wrecked vehicle was set at \$600.

What Is Literal Meaning of Justice of the Peace?

A Justice of the Peace is a person elected, or appointed, to keep peace and dignity of the State, and not simply a collection agent of fines to fill the Coopers of the State of Texas, or the county of Callahan.

While all law violators are punishable by fines, jail sentences, penal institutions etc, there are times when offenses are justifiable, even murder. There are often extenuating circumstances to be considered in offenses of any nature that should alter the punishment handed down.

ALL VIOLATORS SHOULD NOT NECESSARILY BE TREATED THE SAME

And therein lies the duty of a Justice of the Peace, to consider the complaint, determine if the charges are sufficient to warrant prosecution, AND GIVE THE DEFENDANT "HIS DAY IN COURT," called a hearing. Just because an offender is brought before a Justice does not mean he should automatically be punished to the fullest extent of the law.

Violations are sometimes accidental, unthoughtful, or unintended, a good Justice of the Peace will consider those things and not just say \$29.50, or up, or jail!

When I am elected Justice of the Peace of Precinct 6, Callahan County, I intend to promise to dispense justice to all, and not dispense with justice altogether.

If offenses merit harsh punishment, I propose to be harsh; if offenses merit consideration, I propose to be lenient. I alone will be the Judge and no complainant will be Judge for me, because a Justice of the Peace is the last word in his jurisdiction, and I promise to handle the job prudently, honestly, with integrity, and justice.
