Largest Crowd Ever Under One Roof Here Sees Lions Club Minstrel Show

A crowd believed to be the largest ever assembled under one roof in Cross Plains, packed Cross Plains High School auditorium Friday night for the Lions Club Minstrel Show.

"By actual count," reports

With 10,692 head of cattle already tested for brucellosis, the infected rate is running so low that certification as a "clean county" is expected for Callahan in the initial effort.

This prediction was made last night by County Agent Travis Allen, who reported the animal health in this county among the best in the state.

It was estimated by well-informed sources at the beginning of the testing program that approximately 20,000 animals would have to be checked in Callahan. Present indications are now that the number will not be far wrong.

Cattle owners, whose herds have not yet been tested, are being urged to contact line-up men and arrange for this service immediately. Work is expected to be finished in the Putnam area this week with the exception of a few isolated herds.

Drive Launched For 80 New School Band Suits

If Buffalo band boosters receive expected cooperation, Cross Plains High School Band may become one of the snappiest small-town musical organizations in Texas.

The adult booster club unanimously approved and immediately launched a campaign Tuesday night to purchase 80 new uniforms, enough to completely outfit the entire marching band.

Total cost of that number of new suits is \$6,000. Of this amount, Cross Plains school board voted to pay one-half from the local budget. Remainder, less \$800 expected to be available from the Band Booster treasury, will be raised by public subscription.

Parents of band students are being asked to contribute a minimum of \$10 toward the fund. A total of \$700 was pledged from this source in a public meeting held in the band hall Tuesday night.

Plans are to install a progress meter in the downtown area, which will be kept current and reflect day-to-day contributions. The meter will be divided into squares, each of which will represent the cost of one uniform. Persons contributing that amount will have their names inscribed inside a square. All donors of as much as \$25 will be acknowledged on the public sign.

Plans are now underway to stage a minstrel show in the Autumn with Cisco and Cross Plains Lions Clubs joining hands to provide the cast. That production would be presented in both cities.

Herman Heine Enjoys Reunion Of World War I Buddies Recently

Three mess sergeants who spent World War I within the confines of Camp Travis at San Antonio feeding Army inductees at a cost of 42 cents per day per man recently were reunited in Abilene for the third time.

Talking about the "good old days of 44 years ago" were the Rev. R. H. Campbell, pastor of the Grace Methodist Church of Abilene; Herman Heine of Cottonwood and Hanns Gottschalk of Winters.

Heine, who formerly lived at Paint Rock, and Gottschalk found themselves in September

of 1917 a part of the permanent induction personnel of Company 30, 8th Battalion, 165th Depot Brigade, at Camp Travis, as cook and mess sergeant. Campbell joined the KP crew in February of 1918.

The three fitted into a congenial team and all soon became sergeants, conducting operations in a kitchen that fed as many as 500 trainees three times a day.

During the flu epidemic in the fall of 1918 they gave up their barracks so the building could be used as a hospital ward, and cooked on the open field range.

Campbell was discharged Jan. 1, 1919; Gottschalk, Feb. 4, and Heine Feb. 17.

Each man returned to his respective community to rear a family. The trio of buddies lost contact with each other until 1961.

Through unusual circumstances, only a tie in the initial game. The Rev. Campbell lived at Abilene. He already knew that Heine had moved from Paint Rock to Cottonwood. After a series of correspondence, the three men were reunited last Nov. 11 — the anniversary of the World War I armistice — in Winters at Gottschalk's home.

Later the three "buddies" got together again in Abilene. The third visit was on April 24 in the Rev. Campbell's home, 1225 Wilson St. Gottschalk and Heine are retired farmers. The Rev. Campbell will retire from active pulpit duties in June.

Bailey Wayne Barr Drops Flowers In Atlantic Where Titanic Sank

A Cross Plains serviceman dropped a floral wreath in the turbulent waters of the Atlantic Ocean April 15 at the exact spot where the luxury liner, Titanic, sank 50 years ago on that date, claiming 1,513 lives.

A special flight was made by the Coast Guard to position 41° 46' north and 50° 14' west to hold a brief memorial service.

As the aircraft circled the location, a military chaplain spoke these words:

"We come to this position to commemorate the memory of the 1,513 persons who lost their lives here in the sinking of the Cunard liner Titanic after it had collided with an iceberg. The sorrow and personal tragedy wrought by this worst maritime disaster cannot be measured, yet as is often the case out of tragedy has come progress. The International Ice Patrol was organized to spot and track the great bergs which menace maritime traffic in the North Atlantic, and to help avert such tragedies in the future. So it is fitting that we commend on this day the skill and courage of those men of the United States Coast Guard who have carried on this endeavor under international auspices."

Following prayers, Aviation Structural Mechanic Bailey Barr cast the wreath from a hatch onto the still ocean.

The aircraft continued to circle the calm water after the service for a few minutes before beginning the return flight to Argentina.

Two thousand, four hundred and fifty homes have hot and cold running water; 2,597 have flush toilet, bathtub or shower and 31 have basements.

Don't Use Diverted Land, Farmers Told

Farmers were reminded today that acreage diverted under either the 1962 wheat or feed grain program may no longer be pastured.

Tommie Harris, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Callahan County Committee, said that May 1 was the deadline for pasturing such acreage. Acreage to be diverted under the programs is so designed by the program participant at the time a check is made of compliance.

Under the wheat and grain programs, farmers are seeking to bring production into line with needs through diverting to a conserving use acreage formerly planted to either wheat or corn, grain sorghums, or barley. Program payments are made under the programs to offset the loss of income which otherwise might have been returned from such crop production.

Farmers in Callahan County have signed up 305 farms for participation in the wheat stabilization program, and 233 farms under the feed grain program. Acreage signed up for diversion under the programs included 5,240 acres from wheat production, 5,136 acres from corn-grain sorghum production and 221 acres from barley production.

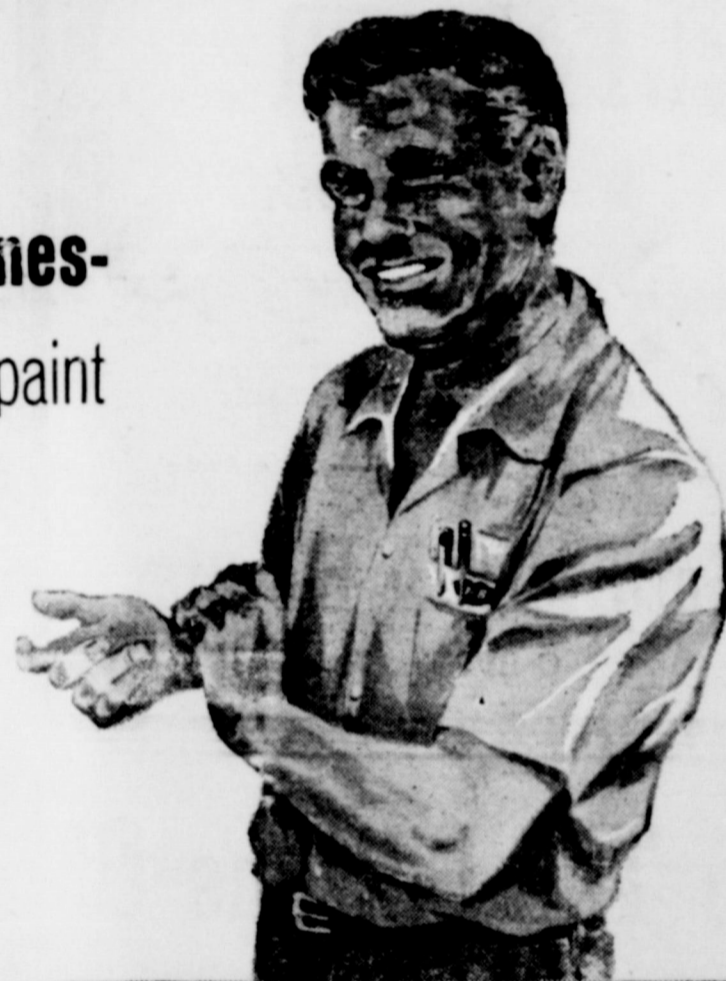

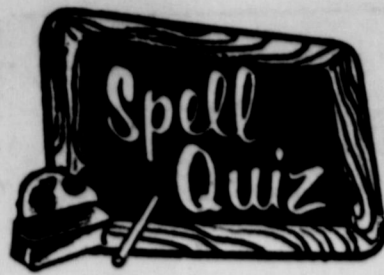

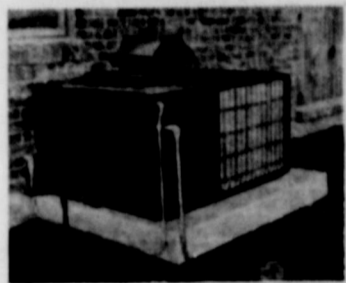
