## Arrowwood Sells First '62 Crop Grain

Load of wheat from the Arrowwood was sold in Cross Plains by Roy Arrowwood. The grower brought \$2 per bushel, the grower \$815 on his patch.

Price jumped Monday from \$2 to \$2.05. Oats unchanged at 70 cents a bushel, however.

Approximately 2,000 bushels had been sold to Gary Mill & Elevator Company in Cross Plains up to Tuesday noon.

Monday afternoon's showers delayed harvesting but are said to have resulted in no appreciable damage to crops. Some opinions were heard yesterday that the rain would hasten ripening of less mature crops.

No oats from the new crop had been marketed in Cross Plains at noon Tuesday.

### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETS TUESDAY NOON

Regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will be held Tuesday noon in the basement of the First Methodist Church.

Voters will return to the polls Saturday for the second Democratic primary to choose standard-bearers for the party at the general election in November.

Whereas the ballot for the first primary was abnormally long, the ticket Saturday will be short. Voters at the Cross Plains box will make selections in seven races; four are statewide and three are local.

Perhaps occupying most attention here are the local races: county judge, county clerk and county commissioner. In the judge's race Byron Richardson and Lowell Boyd are pitted; for county clerk it's Mrs. Beatrice Deal and Royce V. White, and in the commissioner race the surviving two candidates from an original field of 11 are Duke Mitchell and Doyle W. Cowan.

In Cross Plains voting will take place at the City Hall with the polls opening at 8 a.m. and closing at 7 p.m.

Alton E. Hornsby, local Democratic chairman, who serves as presiding judge in Cross Plains, anticipates a lighter vote than was polled in the May 5 first primary. A record of 778, including 26 absentees, was tabulated at that time. The turnout is said to have been an all-time high for any Callahan County voting box.

Hornsby, who almost exactly predicted the total vote in the first primary, forecasts 500 will be polled here Saturday. Hornsby's pre-election guess of the number of votes in the first primary, exclusive of absentees, was 750. The exact count proved to be 752.

An election party will again be held at the newspaper office in Cross Plains. A board will be installed and results posted as soon as received from over this county.

### Cottonwood Man Dies Of Injuries

Funeral services were held from the Cottonwood Methodist Church Friday afternoon at two o'clock for Tommy Davidson, 24, who died Wednesday night in a Brownwood hospital of injuries sustained in an automobile accident south of Cross Plains.

Last rites were conducted by the Rev. Marshall Tutt, pastor of the Cottonwood church, with burial in Cottonwood Cemetery under direction of Higginbothams of Cross Plains.

Davidson was returning home from Brownwood Lake Sunday afternoon, May 19, when his new automobile left the road and hurtled a field fence. The accident occurred just south of the Callahan County line on State Highway 279.

Davidson was an employee of General Dynamics in Abilene, commuting back and forth to work from the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Davidson, west of Cottonwood. He was born at Paducah Aug. 8, 1937, and had attended Abilene High School and was a graduate of St. Joseph's Academy.

Surviving are the parents and one brother, Lynn, of Abilene.

Pall bearers were: Joe Lang, Bill Harris, Gene Gest, Don Chaney and Monte Jones, all of Abilene, and Arnold Jawel of Dallas.

### PRISONERS PRESENT PROBLEM IN COUNTY

Prisoners now present a problem to Callahan County officers.

While the county jail at Baird is undergoing repairs, prisoners must be kept in either the calaboose at Cross Plains or boarded in Taylor County jail at Abilene.

Boarding costs \$1.25 per day, whereas 90 cents per day is customarily paid the Callahan County sheriff for supplying food to prisoners held in his jail.

## S. F. Bond Reminisces Of Spectacular Rainstorms

Your exposure of my fallibility in being able to tell when it is and is not going to rain, in last week's Review, brought to mind many pleasant memories and recollections.

Back in 1912 the old Bank of Cross Plains, the antecedent of our present banking institution, was manned by one Virgil Hart, an East Texan, the son of an eminent lawyer and a Cuban war veteran. Being a youngster and never having had to depend too much on his own initiative, having the guiding hand of an experienced father to rely upon, the management of the bank was giving him some real concern.

Having loaned out some \$100,000 of borrowed money, principally to farmers, late in the spring it was very dry and the farmers brought in unfavorable reports. It began to tell on Virgil's happy men.

At that time of our progress and development our morning Dallas News was due here at four p.m. if the peavine limited was on time. Closing his bank one afternoon with his Dallas News under his arm, he walked across the street where I was standing by the corner of the old Farmers National Bank and asked me what the weather condition was here 50 years ago. Without hesitation I told him it was too wet to plow.

The next morning he came by with his paper to show me that in the 50 years ago column there was an item to the effect that unless the torrential rain let up the farmers were going to lose their crops. As long as Virgil lived he never lost confidence in my weather guessing.

Early on a Monday morning Gene Atwood engaged in husbandry, a lover of the good earth, and a member of that innumerable horde of the chosen and elect, was in the bank and among other things he asked

me what I thought of the weather. I told him that I was quite sure that we were on the verge of open dry weather. Reaching home he put a good team to a mowing machine and began mowing his oats. At dinner time when the family was enjoying a noon meal, consisting of home cooked, garden-fresh vegetables seasoned with home raised corn fed, smokehouse cured hog meat, corn bread such only as a country-reared housewife can bake and with plenty of fresh churned buttermilk, there came in a vivid flash of lightning followed by a deafening clap of thunder and torrential rain.

Listening to the downpour Gene surmised that he might have been a little premature in cutting the oats and Sallie's reply was that I thought so when I saw you starting out with the mower. Gene replied that Foster said that it was not going to rain and Sallie's rejoinder was that if you don't quit listening to him you are going to lose

a crop.

When the rain was over the mowed oats were washed out of the field and the unmowed oats were washed down to where they could never be mowed. In Cross Plains we had only a sprinkle and no more until late August.

Another time out early on a bright clear June morning with a cool nectar laden breeze coming in from the southwest, perfumed with the aroma of wild flowers blooming on prairie's crest, I was passing Charlie Worthy's farm. He was in the field astride a two-horse single-row planter, planting peanuts. I stopped at the end of the row where he would come out. After the usual salutations our conversation drifted to crops and weather. He had tried to catch a time to plant that might allow his peanuts to come up before another rain that would bring peanuts and grass all together.

I told him that I thought that we were about to the end of the

rainy season and that it might be advisable to cover pretty deep in order that the seed would not dry out before they germinated.

That night he had a rain that leveled his ground down to where you could not trace a lister furrow across the field.

When the ground got dry enough to plow, he planted his peanuts and through a long, dry, hot summer the vines would never allow their tentacles to touch the soil until cool nights and showers in September.

All this preamble is for the purpose of emphasizing our right or privilege of being wrong which is next to the greatest privilege we have, the right to work which the good Lord granted to us when He pitched our antediluvian ancestors out of the Garden of Eden with the admonition that by the "sweat of thy brow shalt thou eat bread all the days of thy life", being the greatest.

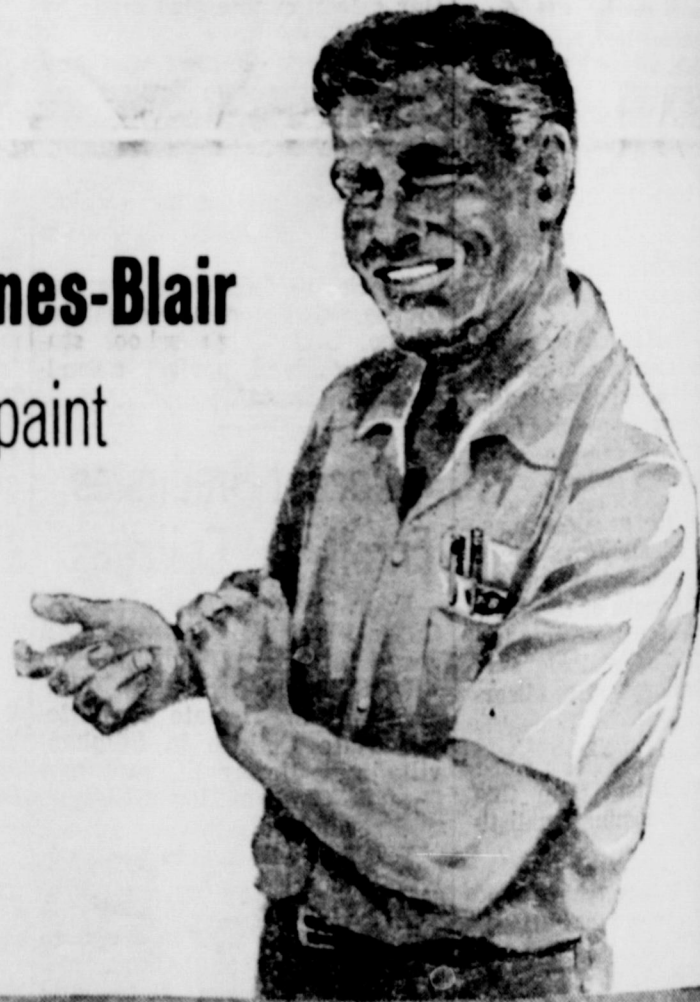

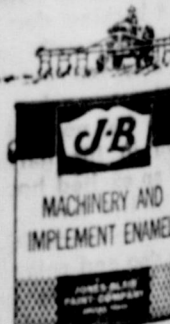

### 4 Dams Carded On Jim Ned Watershed

Four floodwater retarding structures on Jim Ned Creek watershed are being advertised for prospective bids to be opened June 14 to 19, in the State Soil Conservation Service Office at Temple, according to E. J. Hughes, area conservationist. The four expected contracts call for a total of 1,609,900 cubic yards of compacted earth fill material, 23,370 pounds of concrete reinforcement steel placed in 607 cubic yards of concrete for principal spillways. Salvaging and placing of top soil on dams and emergency spillways for growing of grass will amount to 67,390 square yards, and net wire fencing around dams and emergency spillways - 21,620 linear feet.

The four contracts being advertised are for construction of sites 11, 12A, 21 and 25, Jim Ned Creek Watershed. Construction time allotted for each of the jobs will be 312, 299, 417, and 204 calendar days respectively.

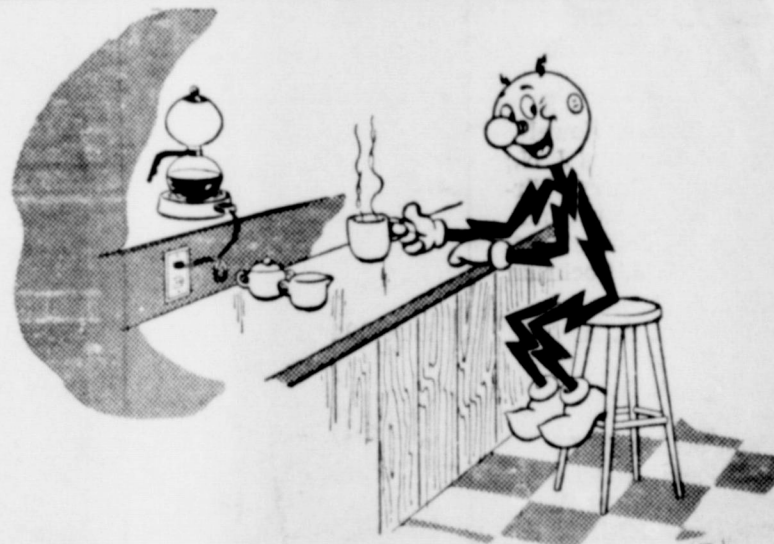

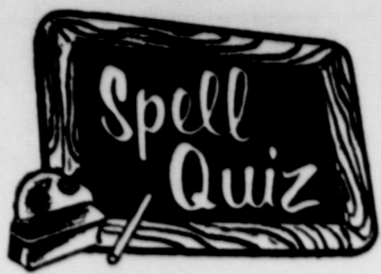

AN OPEN LETTER FROM THE  
Medical Doctors of Callahan County

MEDICAL  
AID FOR THE AGED

HERE'S WHAT WE FAVOR:

The doctors of America believe that our aged citizens who need medical care should get it, whether or not they can afford to pay for it.

We favor a program of medical aid for the aged sensibly designed to help those who need help.

Such a program was enacted by Congress last year. It's the Kerr-Mills law which has the enthusiastic support of America's doctors. Specifically, the law provides for Federal grants-in-aid to the individual states, enabling them to provide health care for those among the elderly who need help. The benefits of this locally administered program also include the 2 1/2-million Americans eligible for Old Age Assistance . . . and protect all other senior citizens who cannot meet the costs of a serious or long-lasting illness.

The Kerr-Mills law represents a common-sense approach to solving a problem that concerns us all. As doctors, we support it—because our first consideration is the health and life of our patients. As Americans, we endorse it—because helping those who cannot help themselves is the obligation of all decent people.

HERE'S WHAT WE REJECT:

As Americans—not simply as physicians—we are deeply concerned about the dangers of Socialized Medicine. And we are not crying "wolf" when we apply that term to the currently proposed legislation which would establish a COMPULSORY health-care program for everyone covered by Social Security (regardless of need). The Social Security itself calls this Socialized Medicine. And we believe they have a more expert knowledge of the definitions than do those who describe it as a method of financing aid for the aged.

This COMPULSORY health-care program is up to nothing more than Socialized Medicine controlled by a bureau of the Federal Government . . . paid for by increased Social Security burdens both present and future generations. Confined at first to the aged, it would eventually be expanded to cover all Americans.

Moreover, when the Federal Government takes the privacy of the examination room—both standards of practice and choice of physician—the cost includes loss of freedom, doctor's freedom to treat you in an individual manner. Your freedom to choose your own doctor. The physician is socialized, so is his patient.

IF YOU AGREE WITH US that a compulsory national health care scheme for any segment of our population would be bad for the nation, we urge you to write your Senator and Congressman. Urge them to reject Socialized Medicine in any form . . . to oppose the King Bill (H. R. 4222), the newest measure before Congress to establish Socialized Medicine. Urge your representatives in Washington to use our present program of health care for the aged—the Kerr-Mills Law—which is administered locally to help those who need help.
