## Council Ponders 9 For City Marshal Job Here

Cross Plains City Council met again in special session Thursday afternoon at one o'clock to appoint a City Marshal to replace Cranz Nichols, Jr., whose resignation becomes effective the next day.

An Austin youth was killed and three passengers in his 1957 Ford convertible were injured at 11:45 Monday night on State Highway 279, a mile and one-half south of here. The accident occurred on the curve just north of the C. M. Garrett farm.

Donald Wayne Baccus, 19 of 1010 San Antonio St. in Austin, driver of the car, was dead on arrival early Tuesday morning at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Clifton Charles Russell, 25, of the Baccus address, was listed

in "fair" condition Tuesday morning in Hendrick Memorial Hospital with undetermined injuries.

In the same hospital, Mrs. Barbara A. Everett, 25, of 1402 Alta Vista in Austin, was in "fair" condition Tuesday morning and her 5-year-old son, Michael Wayne, was in "good" condition. Both had undetermined injuries.

Highway Patrolman Jerry Mathews and Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson of Cross Plains investigated the accident. They said the car was a total loss. Its four occupants were reportedly enroute from Austin to Abilene.

A truck hauling ammonia to Abilene missile bases overturned on highway 36, eight miles east of here, late Monday night, injuring the driver and doing an estimated \$25,000 damage to the vehicle and equipment.

The driver, William Earl Landers, 33, of Genoa — near Houston — is in a Rising Star Hospital. His injuries, consisting of severe scratches and bruises, are said to be painful but not critical.

Landers reportedly dozed at the wheel just as he came over Hickman Hill, where pavement is divided. Where the highway narrows again to double lane he went off the road on the right side. The tank trailer overturned, however, the tractor remained upright. Landers fell from the cab, sustaining superficial injuries.

Two trucks were traveling close together in transporting the ammonia from Houston to Abilene. The driver of the lead truck stopped in Cross Plains, after losing sight of Landers' vehicle. While waiting here, he received news of the accident.

Local officers arrived on the scene only a few minutes after the accident occurred and took precautions to protect oncoming traffic.
