## **Local Man Prefers Sting Of** Bee To Bite Of A Mosquito

"I'd rather be stung by a bee than bitten by a mosquito," says a Cross Plains man who tends 36 stands and gathers a ton of honey each

He is Troy R. Watson, local telephone lineman, who lives between here and Rising Star.

Watson likes to tend bees like others do to fish or shoot golf. He started in the business six years ago by robbing a tree. It is now estimated that the average bee population of his 36 hives is 10,000. He buys highly-bred queens and populates new hives with broods - sometimes called workers - from another col-

One of Watson's principal chores in tending bees is mov-

ing them from place to place for desirable pasturage. Vetch fields, sweet clover and blooming Mesquite trees are most desirable. All moving of hives and honey-taking is done on week ends. It provides for Watson a profitable hobby.

The 36 hives were robbed Sunday, yielding 600 pounds of clear, premium grade honey. Watson was stung 15 times, however, not a single place swelled.

One of the principal hazards to bees is poison which Watson says he is fortunate,

State Highway 206 between Cross Plains and Burkett will be topped and opened to traffic in October, said a representative of Border Construction Company Monday afternoon.

Construction of a bridge across Turkey Creek, two miles southwest of town, is now underway. Simultaneously the road bed is being readied for base materials. A fleet of 10 to 15 dump trucks will arrive here next week and begin distributing the crushed rock. Sixty men were working on the project this week, 30 were employed by the contractor, 20 in the bridge crew and four by the Highway Department.

The gap of 206 now under construction-that between here and Burkett-is the second of three contracts which will be let to build the road from Coleman to Cisco. The Burkett to Coleman section has been completed several months.

Third section of the route will be from North Main Street in Cross Plains to an intersection with Farm Road 569 in Eastland County, along which the highway will follow into

Although the Cross Plains-to-Burkett section will be opened to traffic in October, it will not be completed at that time. 


